"Death's Corner" On Gondola Point Road



THE photo above is that of the viaduct at Fair Vale, considered by motorists as one of the greatest menaces to safety in the province. It shows the steep gradient to be negotiated before entering the narrow viaduct on the outward journey to Gondola Point, and the hazard when cars meet at this spot. From the driver's seat it is impossible to see an approaching car until it reaches the spot depicted by the car in the picture. The road switches sharply to the right immediately through the viaduct, thus doubling the menace for motorists unacquainted with the road.

At this point the main highway passes under the railway tracks by means of a viaduct, the massive stone walls of which are 23 feet apart. Besides her parents she is survived by seven brothers, James, Willard, Henry, Edward, Howard, Leo and Joseph, and three sisters, Kathleen, Elizabeth and Josie. tion prevails on the way towards the city.

THE hazard exists primarily on account of the fact that motorists, approaching the crossing, are unable to see traffic coming in the opposite direction until they are almost into the opening. The danger is greatly increased owing to the crossing being located on a rather stiff grade, which usually results in car drivers accelerating considerably in order to negotiate the rise without having to change gears. Visibility of the road on the other side of the culvert from which the driver is approaching is cut off, not only by the structure, but by the high embankment on which the railway tracks are supported for some distance on both sides.

INTIL a few days ago the hazard was made still greater by the presence of a ditch, six feet wide, extending along one wall of the viaduct, thus reducing the roadway between the abutments to 18 feet. On the recommendation of the Fair Vale Outing Club, this ditch has been filled in at the expense of the Provincial Government, and in addition the wall of the viaduct has been whitewashed sufficiently to aid visibility

at night.

While this work is very commendable, it is recognized only as AN EMERGENCY—to reduce somewhat the terrible hazard of night motoring at this spot. If the conditions at this corner are not drastically improved, the unfortunate accident a few days ago, in which a motorist crashed into the viaduct wall and sustained a fractured skull, will by no means be the last. In its present state it is a perpetual menace to motorists, especially those who are not familiar with the road, narrow opening and sharp turn.

DURING the last few years the automobile traffic on the road to Gondola Point has grown to large proportions, and a count made by one resident of Fair Vale revealed no less than 125 cars passing along the road less than a half-mile from the viaduct, within a space of 55 minutes.

FOG OBSCURED THEM

Anxious watch was kept upon all the fishing ports up and down the coast, Lunenburg, Mahone, Lahave, Riverport and Liverpool, as the vessels appeared in the harbors and were all questioned regarding the missing men. First word came when a schooner arriving at Liverpool reported that the men had been taken aboard the Lucille Smith and were being landed at Canso. A few minutes later the Lucille Smith entered the harbor here and the news was at once conveyed ashore that news was at once conveyed ashore that all the men were safe on board.



80,000-Lb. Catch Reaches Bathurst in Twelve Schooners

BATHURST, June 27.—Gloucester county fishermen are enjoying a banner season. On Friday last a fleet consisting of 12 schooners brought in a total catch of 80,000 pounds of mackerel, salmon, shad and cod. One boat had a catch of 15,000 pounds which brought two cents a pound. These were all for the Monarch Cold Storage Company, Limited, which operates a large ammonia freezer at Shippegan.

The above company have wharf privileges on which is built a large warehouse where the fish are placed in ice as they come from the boats. They are given a thorough washing in this building and are then carried on a large endless belt a considerable distance to the freezer. Thus handling of the fish is avoided.

OTHER FREEZERS.

P. O'Leary also has a large freezer and general store at Shippegan and his boats are also securing a record catch. Mr. O'Leary has carried on a successful fish business at this point for many years.

W. S. Loggie & Co., Ltd., have a branch at Shippegan also and report an encouraging season.

LARGE FLEET.

The fishing fleet of Shippegan is the second largest in the Maritime Provinces, being second only to Lunenburg. These boats go out on Monday and Saturday evenings and it is a wonderful sight to see the harbor lined with masts as the fishermen are making their way back to port. The fishermen are so numerous that for many years, under a special act of the legislature, provincial elections in Gloucester county are always held on Monday to enable the fishermen to exercise their franchise.

In the vicinity of Bathurst large quantities of salmon are being caught A record run is reported at Salmon Beach where the Nepisiguit salmon are taken. There is also a heavy catch in the vicinity of Petit Rocher, these are the Restigouche salmon.



TODAY'S RECIPES. Stewed Dried Peaches (Spiced)—
—Make a syrup of sugar and water, using one cup of water to every three-quarter cup of sugar. When syrup is boiling, add skinned dried peaches and cook gently until tender. Add powdered cinnamon, cloves and allspice to suit taste. To skin peaches let them stand in boiling water for two or three minutes. Remove and the skins come off very easily.

Spaghetti—Boil one-half box spa-ghetti until very tender. Pour in sieve and let cold water run over it and let and let cold water run over it and let drain. Then prepare three-quarter pound of round-steak ground with one large onion, five buttons of garlic and one can of tomato paste. Fry the meat with the onion until tender. Pour tomato paste over this and simmer. Add the spaghetti and garlic and cook fifteen minutes. Serve hot.

Pot Roast—Take three pounds beef, flour, salt pork or suet, one-half bay leaf, six peppercorns, salt and pepper, one-quarter cup diced carrot, turnip, onion and celery. Fry out the fat and remove the scraps. Dredge the meat generously with flour and brown the entire surface in the fat. Place the meat on a rack in the kettle. Surround it with the vegetables and spices and season with salt and pepper. Add three cups boiling water. Cover closely and simmer for four hours. Turn after the second hour. Serve hot surrounded by vegetable sauce.



2—Cakes, unless baked in a regulated oven, should be put in a COLD oven. For a loaf or sheet cake, requiring approximately a one-hour baking period, the rack should be placed in the CENTRE of the oven. Turn ONE burner on slightly less than half-way for the first quarter of the baking period. Then turn gas down until burner is on about onequarter way. Leave at that height for the remaining three-quarters of the baking period.

Layer cakes, requiring approximately a thirty-minute baking period, should be placed in a cold oven and the burner turned on half-way for the first half of the baking period, at which time it should be lowered to one-quarter way.

This gives the gases in the leavening property (the eggs, soda or baking power) an opportunity to work gradually as the heat increases gradually. The heat reaches the maximum desired at the end of the first quarter of the baking period and the gases have, for the most part expended themselves before the batter actually starts to cook.

The oven door SHOULD NOT BE OPENED during the SECOND and THIRD QUARTRS of the baking period, for the cells at that time are not firm and a slight jar may cause them to settle. The warm expended air which makes the cake light has already been evolved, and there is nothing present to lighten it again.

3—Angel-food cakes may be put into a cold oven and the heat allowed to come on very gradually, or should be put into a very slow oven that has not been pre-heated more than three or four

more than twelve to fifteen minutes at the most, and should be baken with a very hot oven, at the top-

ly. The oven should be pre-heated at least ten minutes before the meat is put in, but the broiling pan should be removed from the oven before the heat is turned on.






