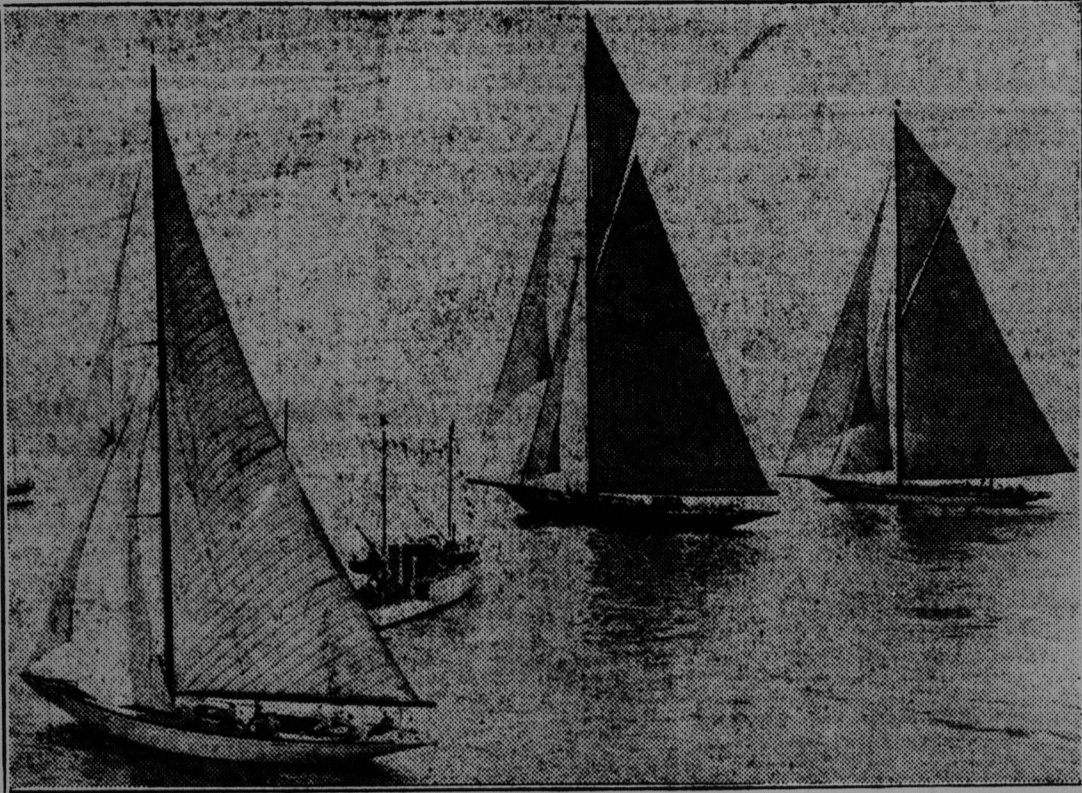
Prizes Awarded to Fortunate Winners—Day Proved a Gala One

Lloyd Ripley Rounds up N. Y. Thug After Being Badly Wounded

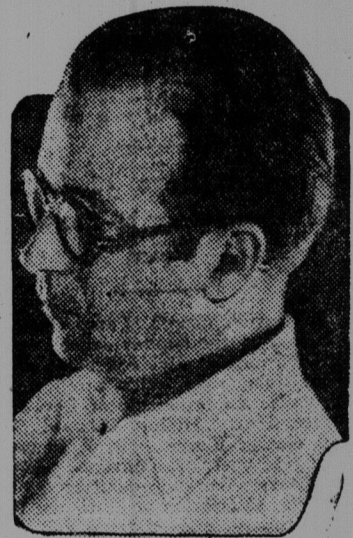
