They could then offer inducements to brokers and buyers to purchase from storage in Saint John for immediate shipment from one of the nearest points to Europe on the Atlantic seaboard."

Commissioner Wigmore said that in his opinion this attitude of Mr. Lodge was altogether wrong. The duty of providing facilities here was up to the government and it was the duty of the C. N. R., of which road Mr. Lodge was a director, to get after the government to provide them. Before the C. N. R. could become a real factor in shipping grain through this port, he said, they needed an elevator of at least 2,000,000 bushels capacity, and this should be built at once.

The people of Saint John had spent over \$2,000,000 of their own money to build wharves and sheds for the benefit of the rest of the Dominion, and it was not up to them to build elevators for the storage of grain. ASSERTING that Maritime ports are being starved, contrary to the A public interest, and demanding that the Transcontinental be put to work to haul grain to Maritime harbors, the Manitoba Free Press again comes forward with powerful editorial support for Maritime claims. 
But bad as the woman is, I do not think that she is as blameworthy as the man who wrecks his home with his own hand.





MORE GRAIN BOXED.

More Grain Board.

APPLETON'S STATISTICS.

We have already moved 504,163 bushels of grain into East Saint John this season and 101 cars to West Saint John. Revenue loading on this region during the month of November increased 1,800 cars over same month last year and for the first two days of this month revenue cars were being loaded at the rate of 100 more per day than for the same dates last year.

COST OF HAULAGE. "To move this amount of grain on a sub-division 100 miles long with ruling grades of four-tenths of one per cent would require approximately 714 trains or 5.9 trains per day for 120 days, containing 70,000 bushels per train, requiring the labor of 60 train and engagements." quiring the labor of 60 train and enginemen per day; average pay \$500 a day or \$36,000 for 120 days. Coal used on these trains would cost about \$630 a day, or \$75,600 for the full period. This movement would involve a total of 1,200 train miles per day at an approximate total cost of \$4,800 a day, or \$576,000 for the 120 days.

BENEFIT FROM MOVEMENT. "You will readily understand the great benefit to be derived by our Canadian train employes from the movement of 10 trains per day in and out of Saint John over the Transcontinental Railway, besides the incidental advantages to the merchants of Saint John. We must add to this statement the elevator employes' salaries and wages of dockyard employes, to say nothing of the money spent by the steamers in the City of Saint John during the transportation of this grain.

GAINS TO SAINT JOHN. "While the advantage named in our opening paragraph in favor of Portland over Saint John, may seem a large amount, it is nothing in comparison to that gained by Saint John and the employes of the Canadian National Railways and other labor in connection with the shipment of this grain, together with the great advantage to our merchants, shippers and citizens of the whole province; for what benefits Saint John directly is of equal importance to every merchant, manufacturer, farmer, laborer or other employe of New Brunswick. We wish once again to call the attention of the public to the fact that the freight rate from any point in Canada to Saint John and Halifax is on the same level as to Portland or other American ports.

"Therefore, why not investigate immediately the shipment of grain from the Georgian Bay ports to the Atlantic ports of Saint John and Halifax?







"The line was built for one main specific reason; if anyone doubts this all they have to do is to read some six assorted volumes of Hansard in the years 1903-04 and to recall the millions of words uttered in the course of the federal election campaign of 1904. The line was built so that, in the winter months at any rate, grain could be hauled over it to the Maritime ports at a figure which would be pretty nearly com-petitive with summer lake and rail rates, and thus avoid using United

"The line was to be built at a high standard with a minimum of curves and a minimum of grades. It was built in this manner and it set the people of Canada back, to use a colloquialism, the tidy sum of \$170,000,000 as afore-

"Except for a brief period in 1916, when the line was taken over from the contractors, practically not a single bushel of grain has been hauled over it. For one very good reason. The line could haul grain at a low figure and when it showed how low it could the government put the rate up to a figure which put the line as a hauler of grain out of business. The rate was raised 400 per cent.

"The people of Canada are beginning to ask why. Especially in the Maritimes where there is need for grain hauling as a business for their ports in winter; and where their railway lines among other things are being starved for the lack of freight from upper Canada.

"The Free Press feels at this stage like asking a few why nots on its own account and on that of the people of the Maritimes and of the West

"Why not put the line to the use for which it was built? "Why not put in a rate which will enable the large carry-over of the western grain this season to go out through Canadian ports instead of by Buffalo in the spring?

"Why cannot parliament either put in such a rate as a statutory figure or extend the Crows Nest rate eastward? "Above all, why can the government not see that this is a way of keeping faith with the people of Canada, who authorized an immense expenditure to have this line built up to a high standard for a particular pur-

"The people in Canada would, we think, like to find out just whose sheltered interests are so needful of protection at the hands of the Railway Commission that faith has to be broken with the people of Canada, the

Canadian ports have to be starved of their legitimate trade, that \$170,000,-000 has to lie neglected and that the port of Buffalo has to be built up. It is indubitably time for a show-down."

"Grotesque" says the Toronto Globe.

The Toronto Globe makes a striking reference to the Transcontinental

and Maritime ports. It says: "It would appear that the Provinces by the sea are at last making some impression on the other parts of the Dominion. The endorsation of their resolutions at the recent Dominion Boards of Trade meeting at Winnipeg was a start, though it must be said that the practical side of the issue—the only side which can bring results—has yet to be settled by the Dominion government. With the Cabinet may be coupled, perhaps, the Canadian National Railway, which operates to the Atlantic both through

Halifax and Saint John in Canada and through Portland in Maine. "The shorter distance by the Portland route imposes a physical handicap on the Maritime ports, but if Vancouver has a right to a freight rate no higher per mile over the mountains than the charge to the eastward, as is contended by the Railway Commission, though opposed by the railways, surely there is something to be said on national grounds for fair treatment for Halifax and Saint John.

"It is a grotesque condition that a great railway system should be built through the Canadian hinterland to connect the grain fields with Eastern ports and its rails left to rust for lack of traffic which seeks

other and too often foreign outlets. "Mr. Baxter does well to meet the leaders of the other Provinces, and though it may not be possible to grant all the requests of the Maritimes, who, after all, have a considerable obligation to help themselves, a temperate statement of the Eastern case is bound to bring results in the long run."

Square, or thereabouts. I was trying hard at the time to get the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association to start one on their grounds but I was meeting with much opposition, chiefly because of the fact that the theorists said the ice would spoil the grass entirely."

"I told him of the objections in Montreal and asked him if he would write me a letter, setting forth how beneficial this community-

owned rink was and what a great boon to sport followers it was proving, adding that no harm at all was done to the grass underneath.
"Mr. Skinner replied that he certainly would write the letter. 'The only thing is, Taylor,' he said to me, 'there is no grass underneath

"'Well, write me the letter, anyway. You can truthfully say that

the grass was not harmed.' This was agreed and the letter written.

I carried it back in triumph and overcame all objections. That is how Montreal started its open-air rink system. They have dozens of them up there now. Ours proved a financial success from the start and in some years we have made as high as \$5,000 on it. But the municipality went into the búsiness also and our profits have sunk considerably."
