





England Preparing For Next Olympiad

London, Aug. 25.—Britain has set out to win the next Olympiad and, if the trick is not pulled off, it will not be the fault of the English public in general which is giving its money to send a crack team to the games in that the has been generally admitted 1924. It has been generally admitted that England has lost much of her athletic supremacy during the last decade, and to regain this a leading London newspaper has started a campaign for \$200,000, the sum estimated as neces-

\$200,000, the sum estimated as neces-sary to get together a team and send it to the Paris games next year. The campaign has been on only three weeks, but the flood of small checks has been continuous, and many of the large English firms have sent in donations. Efforts already are being made to form the Olympic team, the training of which is to begin at once under the supervision of the best Eng-lish coaches.

MAN HELD PISTOL Dover, N. J., Aug. 24.—Willis Jones and his wife, Margaret Whitmore Jones, were found shot to death in their room at the Mansion House here. A pistol was held tightly in Jones' hand. The bodies lay interlocked on the floor, in positions which suggested that the wife had struggled, either to save her own life, or to prevent her husband from taking his. The pair had quarreled frequently. Dores, who was 26 years old, was employed by the Columbia Salvage Corporation of 233 Broadway, New York, at the Picatinny Arsenal. Mrs. Jones, a native of Dover, where she graduated at the top of her high school class in 1915, worked as a stenographer at the arsenal. Some months ago Jones strained a ligament, in consequence of which injury Reconstruction Hos-pital in New York put a plaster cast on his hip, which compelled him to use crutches. He had not appeared de-spondent over his condition, however. The shooting is believed to have been done early in the evening soon after the Jones returned, separately; from work. 


