

"Moreover," having accepted President Wilson's programme as the basis of the entire peace work, Dr. Solf continued, "we will loyally and in the sense of complete justice and fairness fulfill the programme in all directions and at all points."

MILITARY HEADS GATHER AT PARIS

Basel, Oct. 25—(By the Associated Press)—The German war cabinet considered President Wilson's reply ta long session yesterday, according to the Frankfort Zeitung.

It was decided not to answer at the present time, but to wait until it is learned what the Entente armistice conditions may be.

Washington, Oct. 25—Arrival in France of Colonel House, President Wilson's personal representative, and Admiral Benson, the highest ranking officer in the American navy has cleared the way for the beginning of such deliberations by the supreme war council at way for the beginning of such deliberations by the supreme war council at Versailles as may be necessary to frame the draft of an armistice to be submitted to Germany. The premiers of the Allied countries, who make up the political elements of the council, can be assembled at short notice, but it is presumed that their presence will not be necessary until the military and naval members have completed their work.

It was 'said today in official quarters that Colonel House would not be a member of the council, at least for the present; that he simply is the eyes and cars of the president in Europe charged with ascertaining the exact state of public ascertaining the exact state of public ascertaining the exact state of public and private feeling in regerd to all matters connected with the war. Possessed of full knowledge of this nature, it is believed that the president will be even better prepared than heretofore to deal with every complex problems that will arise as soon as negotiations for an armistice and peace are fully under way. -BUY-VICTORY-BONDS-

The Quebec board had prepared an itinerary. The local board council thought that the time was inopportune to take the proposed trip, more particularly as the federal government had already outlined and decided upon its shipbuilding policy.

Inspector Storey said he saw Granger at the Cannon Row police station on Friday, Sept. 20, and charged him with the attempted murder of Constables Williams and Richardson of the Metropolitan police force, by shooting them with an automatic pistol at Waterloo station that day.

He replied, "It was an accident. I did not mean to shoot them."

Witness produced a statement which, he said, was made by Granger and signed by him, but which was not read to the court.

Answering the magistrate, the inspector stated that the constables were both wounded, and were at present in hospital. One was shot in the knee and the dangerous.

Granger's Statement.

In his statement to Detective Sergeant

In his statement to Detective Sergeant Farrant, Granger said he deserted from Witley Camp about three weeks before. He went into a cottage just outside Guildford, and, having received permission to wash himself, he stole some food. He explained that he was not in uniform at the time, as he had bought a suit of civilian clothes a week previously, and that he had the automatic pistol, having purchased it from a soldier who had just returned from France. Proceeding, he said:

"When I left the cottage where I got

"When I left the cottage where I got the food, I walked to the railway station, and left by train about 12 o'clock for London, and arrived at Waterloo station about 2 o'clock. When I was leaving the station I was stopped by two men, who I thought were constables. One of them said to me, 'We are looking for you,' or 'We want you.' I asked them to show me their cards, but they did not do so. There were two soldiers hanging on to the constables, and they (the police officers) threw me down.

"As I fell the revolver came out of my hip pocket. I think as it struck the ground the trigger was forced back. I picked it up, and it went off three or four times. One of the officers fell down. I afterwards saw them both lying on the floor. I think one of them got up and ran after me. I held the revolver in my hand all the time. I ran down out of the station into a road, and through the hallway of a house, into the back garden and gut into a shed. A cigarette case and a policeman's warrant card I threw into a tub of water outside of the shed. I was not there above ten minutes before I heard someone outside. I then came out and gave myself up to a sergeant of police. I am very sorry that this has occurred."

t Waterloo. Constables Williams and Richardson were dispatched to the station to meet No. 9 platform. They recognized him from the description given them, and told him he would have to accompany

from the description given them, and told him he would have to accompany them to the police station for inquiries. At first Granger made no demur, and walked with them until near the station exit. He then suddenly raised objection to his detention, exclaiming, "I want to see your authority."

The constables insisted, whereupon Granger stepped back, whipped a service revolver from his hip pocket, and fired at the legs of the constables, both of whom fell to the ground.

Before any of the startled passers-by could stop him, Granger had bolted down the approach slope of the station.

A corporal of the military police immediately gave chase, meanwhile blowing his whistle to summon the civil police, and a military police sergeant also raised the alarm at another point.

Revolver, in hand, and with only two shots of the magazine expended, Granger raced his hardest, keeping up the advantage which his start had given him. He turned to the left into York street, and cut across into Lambeth square, which, unfortunately for him, has but one approach.

Finding himself held up, he crossed the square, and ran through the open doorway of No. 25, stumbling along through a passage, then descending half a dozen stairs, and entering the back yard, which is flanked by seven feet walls.





Inquiry Into Death Of Late George Kimball


Had no Explanation for Suicide When Arrested "Fell Asleep and Woke up in Hospital"; Doctors and Police Officials Give Evidence Before Coroner

"I could not tell you, sir, all I know is that I fell asleep and woke up in the hospital. It is all a mystery to me." Thus spoke the late George Hartley Kimball to Detective P. F. Biddiscombe in the guard room of the central police station on the morning of October 16, the day before he passed away, following a series of rather tragic circumstances and an investigation of which Dr. F. L. Kenney, coroner, last evening, held the first session of an inquest. Kimball attempted suicide in September, recovered, left the hospital, was arrested on October 16 and died the next day. Six witnesses were examined, Dr. H. F. Abramson, chief of the Provincial Laboratories of the Public Health Department, who made the post mortem examination; Dr. T. E. Bishop, who attended Kimball in the jail and Detective Patrick F. Biddiscombe, of the local police force.

The evidence of Dr. Baxter probably proved the most interesting. He said that in his opinion Kimball's wounds in the throat had not been healed and his condition as he found him in the jail was no place for a man in his condition," said Dr. Baxter. BUSY WINTER

Prospects Point to Tremendous Increase in Steamer Traffic During Coming Season-New Schedule of Port Charges

Indications are that seventy-five per cent. more ships will call at the port of St. John this year than during the last winter port season. It will be remembered that St. John's export trade last year alone totalled \$200,000,000.

For the last four years the export trade of the port of St. John has risen by leaps and bounds. In 1915 it totalled \$43,000,000; in 1916, \$120,000,000; in 1917, \$190,500,000; and in 1918 the peak load was reached when the port's exports reached \$200,000,000.

With a total of thirty-five ships per monthe this year in comparison with an average of twenty ships a month last year, or more than one ship per day, those who are conversant with the export trade of St. John feel that a conservative estimate of the export trade during the next winter season, allowing for smaller steamers now in the trade, will be \$250,000,000.

London, Oct. 25-The liberation of Rumania has begun by Entente forces after a year's occupation by the Germans. Crossing'the northwestern portion of Bulgaria at Lom Palanka, southeast of the Iron Gates, French patrols have forced a passage of the Danube and entered upon Rumanian

Huns Resist Stubbornly But Give Ground

New York, Oct. 25-The Associated Press tonight issued the fol-

lowing: The Germans in Belgium and France still are stubbornly resisting the attempts of the Entente Allied forces to break through their lines and bring about a collapse of their defensive positions.

On the whole they are succeeding, but nevertheless on all salient posi-tions under attack the enemy line gradually, but slowly, is being forced backward.

backward.
On the northern Italian battle front between the Brenta and Piave rivers the Austrians are being put to the test in a new attack by British, French and Italian troops, while in Mesopotamia the British again have gone on the offensive against the Turks and at last accounts were making considerable progress. In Albania and Serbia the operations of the Allied forces are tending toward the slow but sure evacuation of the invaded districts by the enemy forces.

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In the northern French theatre, the British are centering their efforts south of Valenciennes to cave in the salient between that city and Le Quesnoy and move on toward the important junction town of Maubeuge, with the two-fold purpose of finally encompassing Valenciennes and reaching the Belgian border. Everywhere the Germans are offering the stiffest of resistance but nevertheless they have been compelled to give up the town of Maing and most of the intervening points southward along the railway to Le Quesnoy, which was all but in British hands.

Between the Ose and Serre rivers American naval gunners with sixteen inch guns have joined the French in their efforts to hammer their way northeastward toward Hirson, one of the important points in

the German line. American shells from these guns are being hurled against both Vervins and Rozoy. Some further progress has been made by the French in this region, but only after the hardest kind of the third. fighting.
