BISHOP INGHAM IN REPLY TO PROTESTS OF CANADIAN CLERICS

A Montreal Star London cable says:— Bishop Ingham sends me a vigorous rejoinder to the protests of Canadian Anglican bishops and clerics as publish-ed in the Montreal Star. He says he did not expect his ecclesiastical viewpoint to be popular, but that he had no inten-tion of sheltering behind an anonymous

attack.

"It is a great mistake," he declares,
"for the Church leaders in Eastern Canada to take the chapter as an attack on
the Church of England in Canada. Every
other word in the entire book contradicts
that thought. In my simplicity I thought
that the story of a few blemishes, or,
we will say, mistakes of past experience,
would not have been resented by the authorities of a great church that has a
tremendous task before it, and which is
only now laying down lines of advance.
"Those who make no mistakes make
nothing. I cannot believe that one single
true clergyman, after reading the book
through, will mistake the good, even
kindly, intention of those who sent it
forth."



CHOCOLATE DOUGHNUTS One-fourth cup of sugar, 2 eggs, 1-4 of butter, 1 teaspoon of soda beaten in 1 cup of sour milk, 1 teaspoon of cassia, 1-2 teaspoon of ginger, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla, 1 1-2 squares chocolate, 4 cups of flour or enough to handle easily. DRIED APPLE CAKE

Soak 2 cups of dried apples one night in warm water, chop fine and stew three hours in 1 1-2 cups of molasses (slowly on back of range). Beat together 1 cup of sugar, 2-3 cup of butter, 2 eggs, add 1 1-2 teaspoons of soda beaten into 1 cup of sour milk, then the apples and spice, 3 cups of sifted flour. Sift once before measuring. Beat thoroughly.





THE SALE OF CIGARETTES

An increase of 200,000,000 in the consumption of cigarettes in Canada during the past year is a discouraging fact, especially as it is well known that many children help to swell the total. The twinkle of those electric signs unfortunately appear to have more effect than the well-meant efforts of those fighting this growing evil.—Hamilton Herald.

CANADIAN NORTHERN MAY BE PURCHASED

BY THE GOVERNMENT

Ottawa, July 2—The acquisition of the Canadian Northern system, main line and branches, in every province of Canada by the dominion government will be considered at a conference in Ottawa late in the summer or early in the

A conference of provincial representa-tives has already been arranged for. It was originally intended that the chief matter to be considered was that of federal representation and dominion aid. However, an intimation has been received of an informal character from some of the provincial governments and from British financial interests asking that the question of taking over the Canadian Northern companies and completing the system from coast to coast should also

be dealt with.

Premier Borden has more than once expressed himself in favor of government control of public utilities. It was one of the planks of his Halifax platform. Other members of the federal government also have expressed themselves in sympathy with this view.

It has been frankly admitted by parties in the confidence of the government and the railway that the \$15,000,000 grant given last session by the federal government will by no means be the final measure of aid necessary to carry the Canadian Northern project to completion as a transcontinental system.

When the question of control and operation comes to be considered at the conference, it will be suggested that the conference and their interests will be represented by men of their own selection. A joint board is not unlikely to be the result.

GROCER MAN'S BORROWED NAME

Gets Into Trouble With Noted British Writer

COSTS PUBLISHER \$750

Dickens' Son One of the Counsel in the Case and Authors of World Fame Witnesses-Barrie an Admirer of the Steries of Ballentyne

(Times' Special Correspondence)

London, June 18-That deservedly opular British story writer, W. Pett Ridge, is \$750 richer, an English magazine as much poorer, and a seaside grocer's assistant named Gubbins is a celebrity for the moment as the result of a law case, tried this week, that was as full of humor, both real and alleged, as one of the witty Pett Ridge's own best chapters. It brought what a press agent would describe as a "brilliant galaxy" of writers into court, including Pett Ridge himself, his close friend, Jerome K. Jerome, Barry Pain and Edgar Jephson, an author and dramatist who adapted Arsene Lupin for the English stage, and last but by no means least, Henry Fielding Dickens, K. C., the eldest son of the famous novelist, who appeared on behalf of Pett Ridge.

The latter's name by the bye, is pronounced as if it were hyphenated, with the accent on the Pett, and his work often has been compared, and not entirely to its disadvantage, with that of the author of "Oliver Twist." Perhaps the main facts regarding Pett Ridge's action may have been cabled to your side of the water, but the details of what happened in court are entertaining Ridge, is \$750 richer, an English maga-

The author, meanwhile, considered that his literary reputation had been damaged by the appearance of so feeble an effort as "The Man Who Had a Conan effort as "The Man Who Had a Conscience." and accordingly sued the magazine, the case being tried before Mr. Justice Darling and a special jury.

Asked by the judge to what extent he had been injured Pett Ridge replied that this was problematical, declaring that he could estimate the exact harm done only if he went to all the publishers in the British Empire and America and asked them if they were refraining from accepting his work because of this story. In his allegation of damage he was backed up by both Jerome K. Jerome and Barry Pain, who, it may be mentioned, are among his most intimate friends, the former of these authors remarking that all magazine editors watched the work of all authors to see whether it went up or down.

"A man might have an illness," said Jerome, "and his work fall away, and if I had been an editor and read "The Man Who Had a Conscience,' I should have said, 'Pett Ridge evidently has had a long illness. He is not going to be worth in the future what I have been paying him." Jerome added that the publication of such stuff under his friend's name was like a man going about drawing pavement pictures and calling himself J. S. Sargent.

Barry Pain gave similar evidence, declaring that anyone reading the story
