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BISHOP INGHAM IN REPLY TO PROTESTS OF CANADIAN CLERICS

A Montreal Star London cable says— Bishop Ingham sends me a vigorous rejoinder to the protests of Canadian Anglican bishops and clerics as published in the Montreal Star. He says he did not expect his ecclesiastical viewpoint to be popular, but that he had no intention of sheltering behind an anonymous attack.

"It is a great mistake," he declares, "for the Church leaders in Eastern Canada to take the chapter as an attack on the Church of England in Canada. Every other word in the entire book contradicts that thought. In my simplicity I thought that the story of a few blunders, or, as we will say, mistakes of past experience, would not have been resented by the authorities of a great church that has a tremendous task before it, and which is only now laying down lines of advance."

"Those who make no mistakes make nothing. I cannot believe that one single true clergyman, after reading the book through, will mistake the good, even kindly, intention of those who sent it forth."

Bishop Ingham says he himself suppressed the name of Canada's cleric whose attack aroused so much heat. He wrote at Bishop Ingham's instigation in the midst of a strenuous ministry about as far from East Canada as East Canada is from England. He only wanted to help, not to hinder.

The further protests of the Bishop of Fredericton, Dean Bidwell, and Dean Dowell, published here, evoke regret among many Anglicans that an English bishop should have occasioned so much ill-feeling and such a sense of injustice among Canadian brethren.

HARRIED DOE KILLS HERSELF AND CAPTOR As Wildcat Clings to Her Back She Leaps in Front of Train and Both Die.

A large doe, harried by a wildcat which clung to her neck and back, brought on her death and that of the cat near Clearfield, Pa., the other day by running in front of a fast moving freight train and dropping to the track to await the end.

The doe was first seen by the trainmen as she swam Moose Creek and crossed the rails of the New York Central railroad a few miles below there. At that time the cat was not in sight, but the doe was evidently very frightened. After the freight train had rounded a sharp curve about a quarter of a mile from where the doe was first seen the engine driver saw the animal emerge from the woods with a giant cat clinging to her back.

For an instant the doe, on seeing the train thundering toward her, hesitated, and then with a bound she reached the rails and dropped in front of the oncoming train. Before the train could be brought to a standstill the lives of the doe and her captor had been crushed out.

Daily Hints For the Cook

CHOCOLATE DOUGHNUTS One-fourth cup of sugar, 2 eggs, 1-4 of butter, 1 teaspoon of soda beaten in 1 cup of sour milk, 1 teaspoon of castor, 1-2 teaspoon of ginger, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla, 1 1-2 squares chocolate, 4 cups of flour or enough to handle easily.

DRIED APPLE CAKE Soak 2 cups of dried apples one night in warm water, chop fine and stew three hours in 1 1-2 cups of molasses (slowly on back of range). Beat together 1 cup of sugar, 2-3 cup of butter, 2 eggs, add 1 1-2 teaspoons of soda beaten into 1 cup of sour milk, then the apples and spice, 8 cups of sifted flour. Sift once before measuring. Beat thoroughly.

GROCER MAN'S BORROWED NAME

Gets Into Trouble With Noted British Writer

COSTS PUBLISHER \$750

Dickens' Son One of the Counsel in the Case and Authors of World Fame Witnesses—Barrie an Admiree of the Stories of Ballentyne

(Times' Special Correspondence)

London, June 18.—That deservedly popular British story writer, W. Pett Ridge, is \$750 richer, an English magazine as much poorer, and a seaside resort's assistant named Gubbins is a celebrity for the moment as the result of a law case, tried this week, that was as full of humor, both real and alleged, as one of the witty Pett Ridge's own best chapters.

Here is how it all came about. Picking up a copy of "The English Illustrated Magazine," one day, Pett Ridge, whose stories are mainly concerned with the poorer classes on this side of the water, discovered therein, signed with his name, a tale which he never had seen in his life before.

He communicated with his literary agent, who pointed out the "English Illustrated Magazine," and the latter made an investigation. This resulted in the discovery that the real author of the story was a grocer's assistant at Bournemouth whose real name was Gubbins but who explained, on being faced with literary forgery, that he had "taken the nom de plume" of W. Pett Ridge.

The editor of "The English Illustrated Magazine" it appears corresponded with the author of "The Man Who Had a Conscience" without discovering his real identity. Pett Ridge's usual rate for a story of this length would, it was said in court, have been twenty guineas, or \$100 but the editor had himself able to offer only \$10 for the supposed Pett Ridge story, which sum his sender accepted.

Barrie likes in a while we get a hint of the literary tastes of the new baronet, Sir James Matthew Barrie and invariably the hint is uncommonly interesting. A year or so ago Barrie testified to his admiration of Henry Sydney Harcourt's "Queer" and now it seems that he is among the keenest lovers of

the tales of R. M. Ballentyne. BULGARIANS BROKE FAITH IS GREEK KING'S CHARGE (Continued from page 1) London, June 3—War is to be declared by Serbia against Bulgaria at Uskup for which King Peter and Premier Pachitch departed from Belgrade this morning.

Accounts of the fighting between the former Balkan Allies in Macedonia coming from the various capitals of the nations concerned are very conflicting. The Serbians and Greeks are issuing conflicting reports of the defeat of the Bulgarian troops while the latter state just as emphatically that they are advancing toward Salonika which is in the possession of the Greeks and in the same time against the Serbians along the whole line.

There is a general disposition here to blame Russian assumption and bungling for the present unfortunate turn of the allies in the Balkans. The Czar's letter to Serbia and Bulgaria created a considerable amount of discussion and speculation in Vienna, where the Russian emperor's assumption of the position of umpire between the two Balkan states is still regarded with considerable misgivings.

The New Freie Presse says that at the time of the Czar's intervention, the Slav cause was, indeed, in grave peril. "The revelations of the history of the Balkan league," continues the Vienna Journal, "show that Russia not only furthered, but helped to create it. War between Bulgaria and Serbia would have smashed this work of Russian statesmen. A worse mockery of the Slav cause than the reciprocal carnage among the Slav people can hardly be conceived. Every battle has afforded a proof that, politically and racially, united Slav is merely a name."

In the opinion of the newspaper the Czar was absolutely bound in these circumstances to make a supreme effort to prevent the outbreak of hostilities, but in commenting on his allusion to the responsibility toward the Slav cause the "New Freie Presse" points to the fact that the Slavs are not confined to the Balkans or to Russia and that there are millions of Slavs who would by no means welcome any relation between themselves and a foreign ruler. In view of the anti-Slav policy which of late years has been followed in the dual monarchy, the present tendency toward a recognition of many of the pan-Slav ideals is viewed with considerable concern.

Massacre by Bulgarians. Salonika, July 2—According to a current report the Bulgarians have burned the town of Guegheli and the village of Stogracot, Soho and Berovo, massacring the old men, women and children. New York, July 2—A cable from Athens says: The Bulgarian government feigned ignorance of fighting between the Greek troops and a Bulgarian detachment at Salonika. The Bulgarian minister at Athens yesterday requested Mr. Venizelos, the premier, to order the Greek army to advance and suggested that the Bulgarian attacks, the Greeks can no longer remain inactive and will be ordered to drive back the Bulgarians.

Casualties Heavy. Geneva, Switzerland, July 2—The casualties during the fighting in Macedonia between the Serbians and Bulgarians have been much heavier than the published figures would indicate, according to the Serbian Red Cross Society, which telegraphed today to the Swiss Red Cross Society asking it to dispatch doctors and nurses to the scene of hostilities. The telegram stated that 8,000 wounded had been already brought from the front and that fighting continued.

Mark Godfrey, who has died at Carlton, England, at the age of 92 years, had completed eighty years' service in the employ of one company. When he became ninety years old, the firm urged Mr. Godfrey to retire on a pension, but he was unable to stand the inactivity and returned to work.

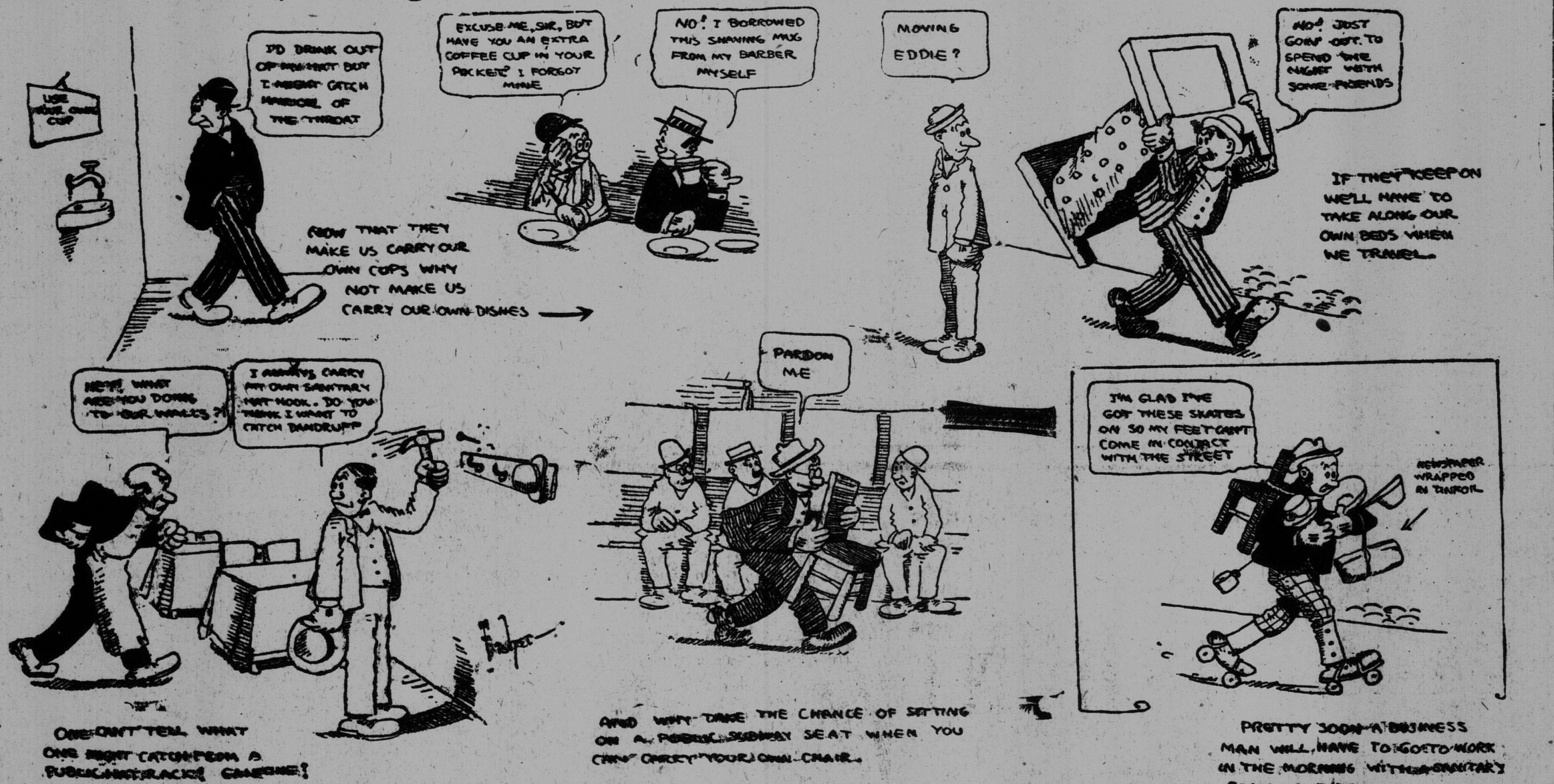

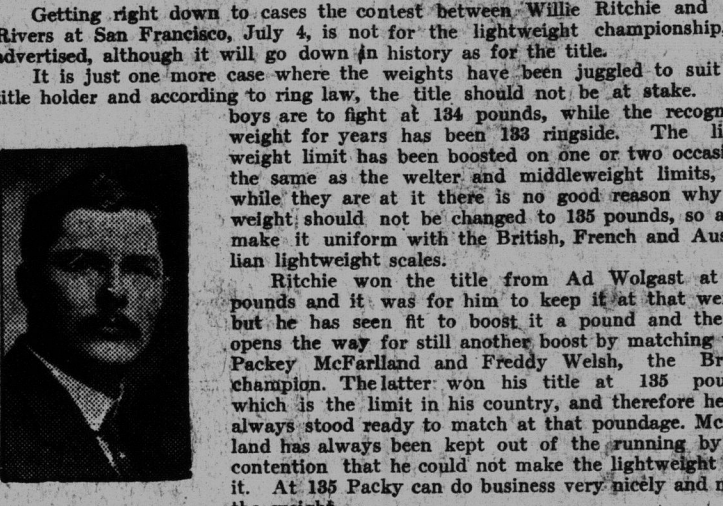

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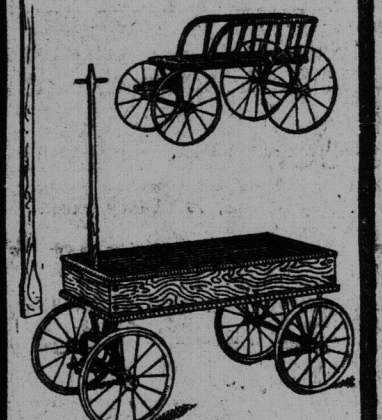

A Farmer Wanted Premier Fleming to Ride Over Some of Them—The Beauty of The River Appealed to Edwards

For example, when Messrs. Edwards and Rhodes, M. P., were landing by way of a scow and some planks from the steamer May Queen, they and some others narrowly escaped being thrown into the water.

"Just think what Pugsley would say if we had fallen in," said Dr. Edwards. While Mr. Rhodes was in the midst of his address a bench on which were seated Premier Fleming, Messrs. Dickson, Tilley and other members of the legislature completely collapsed, and they all fell sprawling to the floor of the speaker's stand.

Mr. Fleming did not accept, and as a matter of fact there are few stretches of road more in need of repair than those between Belyea's and Public Landing.

Great difficulty was experienced in getting the people off and on the steamer, as there is no wharf and the vessel lay off and on while a motor boat and scow lighted the passengers. A graceless toady wanted to know what better they could expect while Mr. Hazen was minister of marine.

A score or more of socialists, each wearing a red ribbon, were a feature of the picnic. As soon as the last Conservative speaker had been heard, J. W. 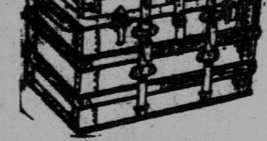
