STILLMAN ESTATE LEFT TO FAMILY

Will of Broker Disposes of Propery Estimated at About \$45,000,000 -Trust Funds for Children

The last will, testament of Jan Stillman, chairman of the Board of Directors of the National City Bank, New York, who died on March 16 last, was filed for probate this week. Disposing of an estate estimated to be worth from \$40,000,000 to \$50,000,000, the will creates five trust funds to be administer by four trustees for the benefit of Mr. Stillman's five children. Each of his two daughters, Elsie G. Rockefeller, wife of William G. Rockefeller, and Isabel G. Rockefeller, wife of Percy A. Rockefeller, is to have a life income from a trust fund of \$8,500,000. These funds having been provided for, the trustees are then directed by the testator to divide all the residue and remainder of the property, both real and personal, into as many equal shares as Mr. Stillman had sons living, each share to constitute a trust

living, each share to constitute a trust fund from which each son shall be paid a life income.

Mr. Stillman's sons are James A. Stillman, Charles Chauncey Stillman, and Ernest G. Stillman. Although the will does not specify the exact amount of the funds to be held in trust for the sons as it does in the case of the daughters, it was understood that the three trusts funds for the sons on the equal division of the residuary esate, after the funds for the sons on the equal division of the residuary esate, after the payment of the state and federal tax, would amount to about \$7,500,000 each. Should the value of the estate prove to be not more than \$40,000,000 the Federal tax will amount to \$9,222,000 and the New York State tax to \$1,600,000. 000. If on the final appraisal of the state, which is to take place within a year after the death of the deceased, the estate is valued at \$50,000,000, the Federal tax will amount to \$11,722,000 and the New York State tax \$2,014,000.

No Bequests to Charity. The testator's widow, Mrs. James S. Stillman, is not mentioned in the will. It was said that Mr. Stillman more than It was said that Mr. Stillman more than a year ago had made a settlement on her which was more than equal to what her dowry would have amounted to in the present estate. No provisions are made for charity or to persons outside of the testator's five children. With the exception of \$8,000, which the deceased directs the executors to expend in the proper preservation and care of his burial plot in Woodlawn Cemetery, the will keeps all the property of the estate, real and personal, in the possession of Mr. Stillman's immediate family. The personal property of Mr. Stillman, including personal effects, jewelry, and pictures, &c., is to be distributed according to the terms of the will personal effects. cording to the terms of the will per stirpes and not per capita, among Mr. Stillman's five children.

KEEP A PIG

It will help keep you, or pay for a Victory Bond

During the summer of 1917 conferences were held at various points in Can-ada for the purpose of discussing in-creased bacon production. Farmers and breeders were everywhere urged to keep live stock commissioner reports that we may confidently expect the number of hogs to be increased by 25 to 30 per cent during 1918. The first step towards an increase in our bacon supply has thus already been taken.

The next step is to see that these extra pigs are fed and fattened. The feed situation is acute. Many farmers who have been able to breed and winter an extra sow or two will not be in a positon to feed to a proper finish all the extra pigs. There are numerous householders in Canada who could help relieve this situation by keeping one or two pigs, which could be bought at weaning time, fed during the summer largely upon the garden and kitchen refuse, and finished off in the fall upon

an increased meal ration.

There are thousands of people around towns and villages and in small settlements who could, and should, help in this way. It is past the time for "doing your bit;" it is now time to "do your utmost." Do not allow kitchen refuse, or garden weeds and waste to go unused. Feed them to a pig. A properly cared for pig is not a menace to public health. What you do in this matter may mean life or death to somebody "over there." Decide now and begin to get a place to keep a pig.

SOCIALIZATION METHODS

Enormous Changes by State Undertaking Work Formerly Left to Individuals-Silent Revolution and Its Para-

(Special Correspondence of the Toronto Globe.)

(By Lacey Amy.)

London, Mar. 5—War has effected many changes in England, but none more revolutionary than the socializing of the institutions related to war operations. And yet few of the influences of war have met with less opposition.

Although Socialism is the power that has consistently fought conscription from the beginning, conscription is a form of Socialism. It is the enforced direction of individual effort and ability to the benefit of the state—the very text of Socialism. Its repugnance to the Socialists was in its very completeness; for the Socialist, while loud on theory, is unwilling to recognize the widest application of his principles, seeing therein the limitation of his energies by moulding them to the services of the state.

But even before conscription, came the control of munition factories. Today there are something like 5,000 factories in Great Britain under the direct authority of the state. In these factories the former management are merely the representatives of the people's government.

Wealth is conserinted, may overlap, but it covers everything.

The munition factory is run to all appearances only with two aims: to smooth the path of the worker and to obtain output.

When the armies in France called for more men, the state appealed to the labor unions, under the influence of Socialistic leaders, instead of proceeding to take advantage of the privilege by would or not. And the Socialistic element has uniformly voted against the government proposals, thus violating their own principles by placing the wishes of the individual above those of the state.

Imports have been under state control for varying periods. Petrol, leather, wool, cotton—all these are absolutely in the hands of the state in importation and manufacture, and to some extent in sale to the public.


