## DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN IN THE LORD,

As it is ouz duty to use every laudable means in our power to stir up your pure minds by way of remembrance, we your unworthy Brethren, think it meet to send you a few thoughts for your consideration, and we hope for your benefit.
