Syracuse, N. Y., June 6—In an address after the baccalaureate sermon at Syracuse University today, chancellor Day apped the educators and men of the business world who have attacked the college on the ground that the young men and women of the country are being overeducated. In his remarks he said:—

"I cannot explain attacks upon the colleges only upon the ground that such persons as have discussed these matters were in a very narrow horizon, and thinking only of farming and domestice economy and such things, and not thinking of them tustly or adequately They had not gotten the horizon of man's opportunity belore their eyes; a marvelous horizon.

"No college graduate has ever gone out from any university with such sublime opportunities as open up to the graduates of inniversities and colleges this spring, and the greater opportunities will open up be fore those who will go out next spring. The world, as never before, is waiting for men and women thoroughly equipped."
