The water rose so fast here on Friday that no one conversant with the lumber busi-ness was at all surprised when word reach-ed here yesterday that the South West boom had broken, emptying its contents into the swollen river. The loss to the owners will be heavy as a large quantity of the logs has been swept away and can-not be recovered. the emergency and a dozen of them ventured out on the moving mass of logs under the south span with heavy lines, which they made fast to the logs in the second span of the bridge and around the base of the pier.
