

In heathen lands the union had 1,184 churches in the same year, with 305 ordained preachers and 125,993 members. There were 10,367 baptisms for the year.

There were six administrators and but two at a time engaged in the ordinance. They relieved eath other as it appeared necessary. The time occupied was nine hours. Everything was done in an orderly manner and without haste. In all 9,606 persons were baptized among the Telegus in that year.


