EPSOM, Eng., May 28. — A heavy downpour of rain which commenced early this morning and continued until noon, with threats of showers during the afternoon, kept thousands of the casual race-goers from journeying down to Epsom Downs today to witness the historic Derby. Interest in the race, however, remains undiminished, and His Majesty's Minoru is still the favorite. The rain chiefly affected the crowd which usually comes down by road. The customary costers' turnouts, the tradesmen's wagons, wagonettes and hansom cabs still were to be seen on the road, but the procession was diminishing noticeably. A feature of the parade this year was the taxicab. This vehicle enabled the busy man to leave his office after his morning's work and get down here in time to see the big race. There were few coaches out, but prominent among those that did come down were A. C. Vanderbilt's Venture, which was chartered for the day by Clarence MacKay, who had with him a party of American friends. The Venture was driven by Mr. Vanderbilt himself.

OLYMPIC GAMES WILL NOT BE HELD AT BERLIN

Will Go to Stockholm in 1912 - Germans are Too Busy Building Airships.

NEW YORK, May 28. — A special cable despatch from Berlin says: "The question of holding the Olympic games here in 1912 has been settled in the negative, there being practically no chance of completing the stadium in time. It will therefore be proposed at the conference of the Olympic committee to hold the next games at Stock-holm.

The delay in finishing the stadium here is ascribed to the indifference of the big German cities, which are all devoting their interest and subscriptions to building airship stations.



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

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations. Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intending ilomesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to carn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres

A hemesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Dutles.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200000.






