





The illuminations in Windsor were very general; nearly every shop and private house had its separate design in coloured lamps, transparencies, and devices, many of them exceedingly tasteful and well executed. The Townhall was illuminated with rows of coloured lamps around the cornices and windows, while the banks and other large establishments were likewise appropriately illuminated. Across Thames-street, but more especially Peas-cood-street—a narrow, sloping street and busy thoroughfare—so numerous were the flags and banners suspended over the roadway that the streets were almost darkened in the latter part of the afternoon. At night, in spite of the unceasing rain, the town of Windsor presented a perfect blaze of illuminations. It was not till an extremely late hour that Windsor finally settled down to the quietness of a country town, after the greater part of the visitors brought down by the Great Western and London and South-Western Railways had returned home, though many remained in spite of the scarcity of beds in the town.

#### FROM NEW ORLEANS.

To make room for the following interesting news from the latest Boston papers, we are obliged to give up the space reserved for editorial comments:—

#### CAPTURE OF A STEAMER WITH A DETACHMENT OF FEDERAL TROOPS.—NEWS FROM THE RIO GRANDE.—INVASION OF MEXICO BY TEXANS.

The gunboat *Diana* has been captured by the Confederates at Pattersonville, La. Capt. Peterson was killed, Lieut. Allen, of Gen. Weitzel's staff, wounded and taken prisoner, Master's Mate, Dolliver, killed, Boatswain's Mate, Mumford, killed, Capt. Jewett, of the 168th N. Y., wounded, Lieut. Hale, of the *Diana*, wounded, Lieut. Francis, of the 12th Connecticut, mortally wounded, and several privates killed and wounded. The soldiers on board the *Diana* were Capt. Jewett's Company of the 168th N. Y., and Co. K, 12th Connecticut. Ninety-nine of our men were paroled by the Confederates.

The steamer *Honduras* had arrived at New Orleans from the Rio Grande with 260 Texas refugees. They report that on the 15th of March a Confederate force of 150 crossed into Mexico at the mouth of the river, and captured Col. E. J. Davis, of the 1st Texas cavalry, and Capt. Montgomery of the same regiment. The Mexican authorities demanded their release, and Col. Davis was given it, as also three soldiers taken at the same time. Capt. Montgomery had not returned, and private advices say he was hanged by the Confederates, which is undoubtedly true. Davis and Montgomery were taken from the house of the Mexican Commandant. Three other officers narrowly escaped falling into the hands of the Confederates. They, with half a dozen Mexicans, drove fifty of the Confederates to the river, wounding three or four, of whom two died. The U. S. bark *Arthur* threw two shells into the Confederate quarters on the night of the 25th. The Confederate Captain Benavides had also crossed into Mexico and burned a town near Guerrero. The Confederate authorities were evidently in a state of great alarm lest these violations of neutrality should involve them in hostilities with Mexico. Their troops are now concentrated near the mouth of the Rio Grande.

A Yankee schooner and cargo, valued at \$25,000, had been captured by the Confederates near Rio Grande.

An immense trade is carried on over the Rio Grande. The *En's* informant says a train of 600 carts was on their way to

Brownsville. These carts average six bales of cotton each.

Governor Lubbeck of Texas, in a message to the Legislature, declines a re-election, and says he will take a more active part in the war. Some people affirm that he will leave the Confederacy as soon as his term expires. He states that Texas has furnished 87,000 troops for the Confederate army, and that the conscription law adopted by the Legislature will add 27,000 thereto. Under this law there are no exemptions. Every man who can stand upon his feet will be forced into the army.

Most of the refugees who came to New Orleans in the *Honduras* have enlisted in Col. Davis' regiment, and 75 Confederate deserters are awaiting transportation at Matamoros in order to do likewise.

There were 80 vessels at the mouth of the Rio Grande.

#### MULTUM-IN-PARVO.

SUCCESS OF THE RAILWAY BILL.—As was confidentially expected would be the case this measure has passed in the Lower House by an overwhelming majority, and there is no doubt that the same good fate awaits it in the Legislative Council. The yeas and nays in the Assembly were known almost to a certainty a fortnight ago, and the speeches since made by many of the members, for and against the bill, have been expressively called "bunkum" speeches.

We derived great pleasure in seeing and hearing her just a year ago in the operatic spectacle of the *Enchantress*, at Niblo's Garden, New York. Her voice and style are most bewitching, and we advise all who go to Boston on Monday not to lose the opportunity of a very enjoyable evening's recreation.

A NEW Theatre is about to be built on Essex Street, Boston.

THEATRE-GOERS will remember the name of Rachel Johnston a worthy young actress who won their good opinion in this city last summer. She was to have taken a benefit at the Howard Athenæum, Boston, last night. The selection of plays comprised "The Awkward Arrival, or my wife's Daughter;" "Noval Engagements;" and the farce of the "Irish Lion."

A BELGIAN GLASS BLOWER has lately blown two large bottles, each of a capacity of sixty-two and a half gallons, and weighing fifty pounds. They were blown at the glass-works of Lefevre & Co., at Lodelingart, and are nearly double the size of the largest bottles heretofore made.

A LETTER from Athens says:—"A company has been formed in Greece for cutting through the Isthmus of Corinth, and thus avoid the long and dangerous coasting of the shores of the Peloponnesus. The width of the canal would be 112 feet, and its depth about 20 feet. Its length would not exceed three miles and three quarters. For vessels on their way for Marseilles and the Mediterranean to the Piræus the distance would be shortened by ninety miles. The saving to vessels from the Adriatic would be still more considerable."

MESSRS. Redding & Co. have published, in a neat pamphlet of twenty-three pages, the graphic account of the marriage of the Prince of Wales, as written by Mr. Russell for the *London Times*. It occupied 11 columns of that paper, and the recital is prepared with extraordinary skill. The pamphlet is well worth having for preservation.—*Boston Courier*.

# THE AMERICAN WAR.

## By Telegraph.

BANGOR, April 10.

Attack on Charleston commenced on Tuesday. Four iron clads engaged in morning. Ironsides was ashore, but subsequently got of. Nine Monitors and the Ironsides in the afternoon concentrated on Fort Sumter. Ironsides and Keokuk withdrawn at 4 o'clock.

Charleston dispatches say that both were disabled, and the Keokuk sunk on beach off Morris Island.

SATURDAY, April 11.

Nothing from Charleston.

There are rumors reported coming from Confederate pickets on the Rappahannock of the loss of one fort, but they are without foundation.

Van Dorn's whole force attacked Gen. Granger yesterday at Franklin, Tenn. After severe fighting, Van Dorn retreated leaving his dead on the field. Casualties not known.

200 Confederates attacked a passenger train on the Nashville and Chattanooga railroad, near Laverne, killing twelve of the train guard, destroying the train and track.

It is also reported that the Confederates attacked and ran a train off the track on the Louisville road.

North Carolina papers report women's bread riots at Raleigh and Salisbury.

The governor of California, by proclamation, warns traitors there of certain doom for any overt acts.

### THE LEGISLATURE

FREDERICTON, April 10. AFTERNOON.

Tilley proceeded to sustain arguments formerly advanced as to paying qualities of the road, advantages of the scheme, and prospect that there will be no increase of taxation.

Smith followed, declaring province now in a state of financial slavery. Canada has practically withdrawn from an agreement by offering survey, and nothing has been done in Nova Scotia. Complained that Government had not answered question as to what decided route, and what

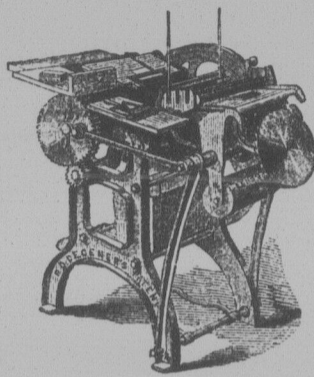

**THE PRESENTATION OF THE DIAMOND NECKLACE.**—The Lord Mayor and Corporation of the city of London arrived at the Castle on March 9th, to present the diamond necklace and earrings, of the value of £10,000, to the Princess Alexandra of Denmark. The Corporation assembled in the Waterloo Gallery, from whence they were conducted to the presence of the Princess Alexandra in the Throne or Garter Room. The Princess was accompanied by the Prince of Wales, who stood by her side, and also by her Royal Highness's parents, the Prince and Princess Christian of Denmark. They were attended by the Court. The Lord Mayor, addressing her Royal Highness, said:—

May it please your Royal Highness—As the Lord Mayor of the city of London acting in the name and on the behalf of the Corporation of that ancient city, I have the distinguished privilege of tendering, for the acceptance of your Royal Highness, whom we justly welcome as the affianced bride of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, this token of their esteem and admiration. The Corporation of London rejoice in the opportunity which is thus afforded of expressing the deep interest felt by the citizens of London, in common with all classes of the subjects of our beloved Sovereign, on the arrival of your Royal Highness in this country, and their earnest wishes for your future welfare and happiness.

**NEW YORK, April 6.**—The *Times*'s Washington dispatch says our relations with Great Britain are considered by those conversant with them as extremely delicate.—The correspondence between Earl Russell and Minister Adams with relation to the fitting out and sailing of the pirate *Alabama*, contained in the English Blue Book, but not yet published in this country, and the correspondence still going on touching the construction and equipment in British waters of other piratical craft, have been conducted on the part of John Bull in a tone which is undeniably if not menacing and provocative of war. Russell plants himself on the strict letter of the statute applicable to the case, and refers our Government to that statute, and in effect refuses to take steps to remedy the grievance complained of. The matter has recently been seriously discussed in the Cabinet. It is thought in some quarters that with the capture of Charleston apprehensions on this score may be dismissed. The Ministers here of the principal foreign powers are believed to be of the opinion that its capture is impossible.

**M. GODARD, the Celebrated French Aeronaut,** has recently constructed an immense balloon of 4300 metres. The car is provided with an apparatus which enables the aeronaut to ascend or go higher up at pleasure. This apparatus consists of a kind of stove formed by three cylinders, separated from each other by insulating substances, whereby all danger of fire is averted. The flame is completely under the control of the aerial traveller, and is prevented from rising too high by a cap of wire gauze. M. Godard asserts that he can inflate his balloon in 30 minutes, and load it with from 600 to 800 kilogrammes over and above the weight of his person and his accessories; and, moreover, that his balloon may be pierced with a bombshell without endangering the aeronaut, who can himself cast projectiles of any kind with impunity. Should this new invention succeed, this balloon may be of considerable service in time of war.
