Soap Bubbles.

How Some Pretty and Marvellous Effects May Be Produced by Soap Bubbles.

There are degrees of skill in all pastimes, but one would hardly think that there were specialists in the art of blowing soap bubbles. An article in the Windsor Magazine by Meredith Nugent, however, shows that some very pretty and marvellous effects can be obtained by the exercise of care and patience with soap and water.

The first step is to make a solution by rubbing pure white castile soap into a bowl partly filled with water until a lather has been formed. Then remove every particle of lather. Dip the pipe into the clear solution and start to blow a bubble.

If you can blow one six inches in diameter so that it will hang suspended from the pipe and will allow your finger covered with the solution to be pushed through into the bubble without breaking, then the mixture is ready for use.

Six bubbles may be blown, one inside the other. This is performed by dipping the end of a straw in the soapy water and after resting the wet end upon an inverted glass, blowing into the glass, which should have been previously wet with the solution, blow a bubble six inches in diameter.

Then dip the straw into the solution again, carefully thrust it through into the center of this first bubble and blow another. Continue this manner until all the bubbles are in position. Great care must be taken that the straw is thoroughly wet with solution for fully half its length before each bubble is blown. With practice ten or twelve bubbles may be placed inside of one another.

VOLCANOES.

They Are Not Burning Mountains as We Understand That Term.

"What are volcanoes?"

None out of every two persons would immediately have an answer of some sort to the question above, for have they not a lively remembrance of having learned in their schoolbooks that "a volcano is a burning mountain, from the summit of which are sent out smoke and flames?" This popular fancy has been exploded by scientists, whose work is to explode popular fancies.

In the first place, volcanoes are not necessarily mountains. In reality they are just the reverse—that is, holes in the earth's crust. Out of these are thrown the materials which, accumulating, form the heaps which we popularly call mountains.

These are, then, the result and not the cause of the action. Neither are they "burning," as we understand the term. There is no combustion nor any action we might reasonably call "burning."

The action need not necessarily take place at the summit, for eruptions are just as frequent at the sides or even at the base. The so-called "smoke" is nothing more or less than the clouds of condensing steam which are formed on every occasion when an eruption occurs.

Lastly, the "flames," so called, are merely the reflection of the mass of molten rock and material inside the crater on the clouds of steam above, thus appearing as a glowing light. The friction, too, set up by the motion of the materials caused by electricity, and hence the lightning discharges which add to the illuminating effect.—Pearson's Magazine.

DIED FROM EFFECTS OF CARRIAGE ACCIDENT

Napoleon H. Roy of Petit Rocher Came to an Untimely Death.

PROMINENT CITIZEN.

PETIT ROCHESTER, Mar. 18.—On the 4th inst. at half past 10 o'clock p. m. died at his residence here, Mr. Napoleon H. Roy, one of our leading citizens at the age of 53.

Mr. Roy began his career in mercantile business when but a very young man and by his persevering and energetic efforts had succeeded in raising himself to a high standing in commercial circles. His unselfishness in affairs, affability with his fellowmen and kindness to the poor, have secured for him the love, esteem and respect of those with whom he came in contact.

He was for several years municipal councillor for the Parish and in that capacity he discharged his duties faithfully and dutifully.

His funeral, held on the 12th was attended by a very large number of his co-citizens and also by a goodly number of friends who came from adjoining parishes. Of these latter we mention the Rev. Father Carlier, Messrs. J. Y. Pym, S. Leger, and A. Sornay; Messrs. P. J. Veniot, Custom House agent, N. A. Landry, Cashier, and Dr. N. Michael, Messrs. John Leger, Thos. Chute, Honore Duguay and many others.

The funeral service was celebrated by Rev. Father Carlier, pastor of this parish and attended by Messrs. Varley, Barthelemy, and Rev. Father Sornay, P. J. St. Thomas.

There is a gloom over this parish for the sad loss of one who was so well and favorably known and who had a foremost place among his fellow citizens.

REVOLVER SOUGHT BUT NOT FOUND

Was Ethel Kinrade Out When the Murder Called?

ADDITIONAL EVIDENCE.

HAMILTON, Mar. 18.—Search for the revolver with which Miss Ethel Kinrade was shot was continued yesterday, when the sewer in front of the Kinrade house was opened but this proved futile, and the detectives were to look elsewhere for the weapon.

The work was done by employees of the Board of Works, a number of officers, reporters and the Kinrade family. Two holes were made in the pipe, but the men were unable to find the trap, and later a chain was run through the sewer for the purpose of any kind was found. The question, what became of the revolver, is still unanswered. If the police had discovered it, a valuable clue would have been given them, but they are as much in the dark as ever.

The chief cause of the still enveloped mystery, the only tangible clue being the evidence of Miss Kinrade's Kinrade that her sister was murdered by a man who demanded money from her.

Additional evidence is forthcoming to show that Miss Ethel Kinrade was seen on the street at 3:20 p. m. on the fatal day, and that Mrs. Kinrade was seen leaving the house at 3:20. This would fix the hour of the tragedy about 2:25 or somewhere between 2:25 and 3:20.

Now, Kinrade's sister, Miss Kinrade and Mrs. Rudd. It is stated the former will testify that she saw Mrs. Kinrade, passing her home at 2:30 o'clock. It is not likely to be a case of mistaken identity, because Miss Kinrade has lived in the neighborhood for a number of years and knows Mrs. Kinrade. Mrs. Rudd, who lives at the corner of Charles and Jackson streets, says she saw Miss Ethel Kinrade pass her home at 2 o'clock. The young lady was walking west on Jackson street.

That fatal day is that the murdered girl was not in the house at all when the man called, although her sister might have thought she was in the house, but that the girl entered when Miss Kinrade was upstairs getting money, and that the man shot her then.

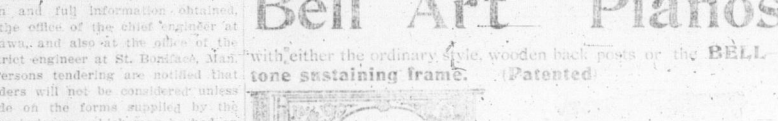
