## OPENING OF THE NEW GRAMMAR SCHOOL

One of the Most up-to-date Buildings in  
the Maritime Provinces.

The Campbellton Grammar school was opened on Monday with a record breaking enrolment.

This handsome school deserves more than a passing word as it is today one of the finest public schools in the province and a credit to the new Campbellton. The building is of concrete and brick and is one hundred and forty eight feet long by sixty-eight feet, eight inches wide, two and a half stories high.

The basement which is of concrete has a ceiling ten feet high and is well lighted by many large windows. In this are situated the following rooms which are entered from above by wide main stairs.

The boiler and fuel storage room is of fire proof construction near the centre of the building. The walls and floor are of concrete while the ceiling and doors are protected by asbestos. In this room are placed the two forty-five H. P. return tubular boilers which supply steam for the low pressure steam heating and ventilation system. These boilers are so connected that in extremely cold weather both may be used, while in milder weather only one is necessary, which will mean a large saving in fuel.

Mr. Daniel Currie who has had a long experience in the handling of steam boilers has been appointed Janitor and is giving his work careful attention.

The basement is divided into boys and girls sections. In the boy's side are large play rooms for use in stormy weather, lavatory fitted with automatic flush closets and urinals, and also a number of basins with hot and cold water so that no boy need go into his class room with dirty hands or face.

Here also at a later date will be the Manual Training department, a large airy, well lighted room being set aside for this purpose.

In the girls' end are large play rooms, toilet room fitted with automatic flush closets and wash basins with hot and cold water etc. Here also a room has been set aside for a domestic science department which will be fitted up at a later date. The main floor is reached from the street by a handsome and striking entry, with easy steps. At the head of these steps entering into a spacious hall is erected an arch, with massive colonial columns. To the right and left along this hall are situated the following rooms:—Three rooms for the primary department, teachers cloak room, grade III cloak room, office of the school board where all meetings will be held. Class rooms for grades IV, V, VI, VII and VIII.

In the hall which is wide and spacious are on each side of the main entrance automatic sanitary drinking fountains. Wardrobes are also erected here for the use of the different grades. These wardrobes are ranged along the walls and are ventilated by large pipes which assure the clothes being well aired. The wood finish in this hall is of birch, hard pine and cypress, finished in the natural with dark green varnish. Flush doors and in each class room which have in each a small observation window through which a full view of the class room is obtained.

The two stairways which lead to the second floor, are wide and massive, and are constructed of brick with cypress finish and birch

lap wainscoting.

On the second floor are class rooms for grade IX and the Principal's room in which grades X and XI are mustered. These rooms are all finished in the same style while two extra rooms have been provided for emergencies.

On the second floor is situated the laboratory which will be fitted up with all necessary appliances for lectures, demonstrations and experiments. Perhaps the most noteworthy feature of the new school is the fine assembly hall 63 feet by 68 feet and 21 feet high.

Here will be held the closing exercises of the school, from this platform will be made the valedictory addresses of the brightest scholars, and hard earned prizes and diplomas will be presented here. It is the hope of the Board that many social functions will also be held in this room, which may be the means of brightening the social life of teachers and scholars and also bring the parents and friends in closer touch with school life and ideas.

This hall is large, well lighted and airy and has an ample stage with two dressing rooms. In the rear of the assembly room, provision is made, should occasion demand it for two additional class rooms. In the south end of the building are the two spare class rooms already noted, while near them is a room set aside for the teacher's private use. Here they may meet in their spare moments, and in this room will be kept the books of reference and the library.

The halls on this second floor have also wash basins with hot and cold water for the convenience of teachers and pupils.

Stand pipes with hose connections are placed where they can most easily be reached in cases of emergency or fire and a special company will be organized to take charge of the fire fighting appliances.

Regular fire drills are now compulsory in all public schools.

The building throughout is finished in the plainest and most substantial manner. The floors are of polished birch and the finish of cypress and hard pine. The ceilings are of embossed metal painted in pleasing and harmonizing tints. The class room furniture is of the best, individual seats and desks being provided in all the departments.

Messrs. Lutz and Cripps of Sussex were the contractors and they deserve every credit for the way in which the work has been carried along to completion in spite of the many difficulties which

It is thoroughly up-to-date and the School Board are to be congratulated upon so successfully grappling with this momentous question, and having the work completed in so short a time. Proper provision has been made for the increasing requirements of the town and the trustees have safeguarded the people in every way.

The building when properly equipped throughout will cost in the vicinity of fifty thousand dollars which is really a low figure considering the fine building which we now possess.

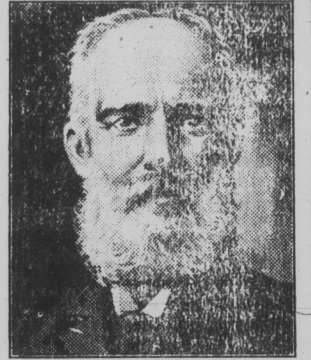

## ENGINEERS' EXAMINATIONS

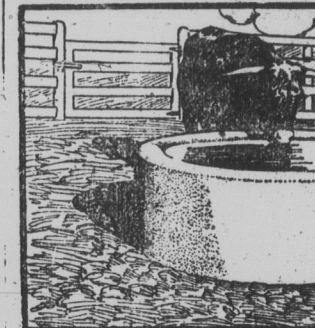

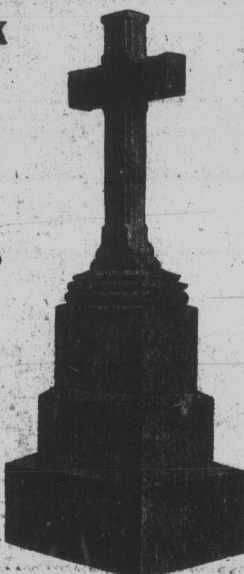

ALMOST A  
CLEAN SWEEP

Conservatives Carry a Tremendous  
Majority of P. E. I. Seats.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Jan. 3.—The elections today resulted in almost a clean sweep for the Conservatives. When the new house meets Premier Matheson will have twenty-six if not twenty-seven supporters, whilst the opposition will be represented by two or three members only.

In today's elections only two Liberals have safe majorities. Hon. John Richards their leader and his colleague A. McWilliams in second district of Prince who are returned by 165 and forty-nine respectively.

In the second district of Kings R. N. Cox, Liberal is one vote behind A. E. Simpson, Conservative. The result will not be known till declaration day when the special votes put in for these men all over the Island are counted. They will likely increase Simpson's majority judging by previous elections.

At last general election in 1908 seventeen Liberals and thirteen Conservatives were elected. These were changed by bye-elections to sixteen to fourteen and on Nov. 15 last the Conservatives by capturing seats in the third and fourth districts of Queens obtained the government.

The city of Charlottetown where two Liberals were returned by acclamation in 1908, and by a large majority in 1904 made a big turn over, the Conservatives winning by overwhelming majorities.

Christian Church  
Should Help Poor.

Chancellor Lloyd George Points to  
Early Christianity.

Lloyd-George spoke in London the other day, with the faith that is in him and in impassioned accents and incidentally he furnished his adversaries with a new weapon of attack. The chancellor was addressing a church meeting in Wales.

"Poverty," he said, "is not the fault of Providence which provides in abundance. There are millions of men, women, and children, in this country, the richest in the world, who through no fault of their own, row up in life sudden in poverty, wretchedness and despair."

"You cannot deal with a problem of this magnitude, by mere spasmodic appeals to the charity of the benevolent. That is hopelessly inadequate. You might as well try to run the army and navy by voluntary subscriptions. It is the community alone that can command the resources to drain this morass of wretchedness, so as to convert it into a verdant and fertile plain. I don't agree with the view that the church is concerned solely with spiritual things. Those who take that view, reflect on the career of the Master. They repudiate the prospects and doctrines of the greatest disciple whose first act on founding a church was to establish a fund for the care of the poor and they were the first poor law guardians ever established."

CHATHAM MEN  
CHARGED WITH BURGLARY

A Chatham dispatch says that 3 men, John Cribbs, Herbert Gannon and George Walker, it is charged, broke into James McLeod's grocery store, Hill street, Saturday night and just as they were effecting a neat and clean getaway, Officer Thompson came along. The men saw him and ran, but he gave chase, firing his revolver to stop them. He succeeded in collaring one. Later in the morning a second was traced to a home below town and arrested, and yesterday morning Cribbs, under the impression that he could not be arrested on Sunday, drove boldly up Water street. The police took him into custody. The men will probably come up for examination on Wednesday.

LOCAL OPTIONISTS  
GAIN IN ONTARIO

Over Half of Ontario Now Under no  
License.

Toronto, Jan. 3.—Returns of the local option contests throughout the province gave cause for rejoicing among the temperance forces. The comparative standing of the results is as follows: 18 local option victories, 80 licenses abolished, 15 municipalities sustained local option on by-laws to repeal it, 46 defeats, including 18 defeats by the three-fifths majority requirements; total dry territory, 460 municipalities; Wet territory, 362 municipalities.

351,595 NEW  
CANADIANS

The department of the interior has compiled figures showing immigration in 1911 to have totalled 351,595, as against 311,084 in 1910. The British immigration shows a particularly large increase, reaching 141,035, in comparison with 123,013 for the year of 1910. The American immigration increased some four thousand, the figures this year, December excepted, being 125,399. The continental immigration jumped six thousand, totalling this year 72,478.

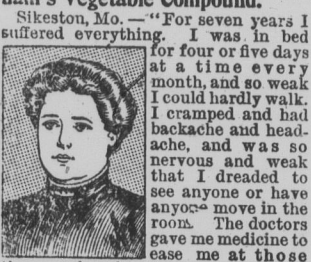

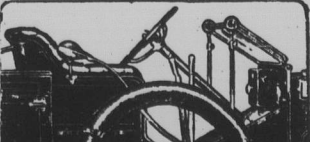

**RICHESON CONFESSES TO  
MURDERING MISS LINNELL**

**No Assurance of Leniency—Law Was  
Allowed to Take Its Course.**

Boston, Jan. 6.—Yesterday Rev. Clarence V. T. Richeson under indictment for the murder of Miss Linnell, his eighteen-year-old sweetheart, by whom he was about to have a child born, but whom he had deserted to marry Miss Violet E. Emond, an heiress, sent for his lawyers yesterday, and confessed everything, crucifying himself upon the cross of his conscience. His statement read as follows:

"To John Lee, Esq., Wm. A. Morse, Esq., and Phillip E. Dunbar, Esq.:

"Gentlemen—Deeply penitent for my sin and earnestly desiring, as far as in my power lies, to make atonement, I hereby confess that I am guilty of the offence of which I stand indicted. I am moved to this course by no inducement of self-interest or leniency, Heinous as is my crime, God has not wholly abandoned me, and my conscience and manhood, however depraved and blighted, will not admit of my still further wronging, by a public trial, her whose pure young life I have destroyed.

"Under the lash of remorse I have suffered and am suffering the tortures of the damned. In this I find a measure of comfort.

In my mental anguish I recognized that there is still, by the mercy of the Master, some remnant of the Divine spark of goodness lingering with me.

"I could wish to live only because within some prison's wall I might in some small measure redeem my sinful past, help some other despairing soul, and at last find favor with my God.

"You are instructed to deliver this to the district-attorney or to the judge of the court.

Since he mutilated himself with a piece of jagged tin in the Charles street jail a few days before Christmas, Richeson has been on the verge of a nervous and mental collapse. His lawyers received no assurance of any recommendation to mercy.

Boston, Jan. 9.—Rev. Clarence V. T. Richeson stood to-day at the bar of justice, declare his guilt of the premeditated murder of his former sweetheart, Miss Linnell, and heard without a tremor the words of Judge Sackerson that condemned him to death in the electric chair on the week beginning May 19.

**CHINA TO BE ROBBED AGAIN**

**Russia Excludes China From Mongolia,  
and Prepares to Take Charge Herself.**

Peking Jan. 9.—Two important developments yesterday intensified the interest in the situation in China. These were a renewal of hostilities and the demand of the Russian government that China recognize the independence of Outer Mongolia. Revolutionaries from Shan Si and Shoo Si, having recaptured the town of Shao Chow, are advancing on Ho Nan, while reinforcements have been dispatched to the imperialists. The armistice has not been renewed and there is a deadlock in the peace negotiations so that early fighting may be expected between the opposing forces. In addition to requesting China to recognize the Katuktu of Urga as the monarch of Outer Mongolia the Russian government has notified China that the independence of Outer Mongolia must be recognized as concerns internal affairs.

The note adds that Russia will assist the Mongolians in maintaining order and that she intends to build a railway from Kiakhta, Siberia, to Urga. Henceforth China will not be permitted to maintain military forces or send contingents to Outer Mongolia but may retain control of external relations. To this note China has as yet made no reply. To the other powers, however, the Chinese government to-day communicated the substance of the Russian demands.

China is unable to defend herself with reference to Mongolia. Hereafter the Desert of Gobi will mark the Chinese boundary on the northwest.

The statement that Russia will assist in maintaining order in Outer Mongolia probably means that she will increase her troops in that territory, which heretofore has served merely as consular guards. It is believed that several railways will follow the Kiakhta Urga line and that much of the country will be developed.

Russia's permission to China to retain control of its external affairs is meaningless because practically there are no dealings with any country except Russia. The general opinion held here is that the Chinese government really suffers nothing from the loss of Mongolia, although Russia and the Mongolians will probably be greatly benefited. Peking officials look for British action in Tibet at a later date as it is believed unlikely that Russia has taken the present step without previously consulting with Great Britain and Japan. Inner Mongolia, so far, has been left undisturbed.

**Labor Leaders College Socialists  
and Temperance Meet**

The most ascetic party in the House of Commons are the Labor men. This used not to be the case in the old days. To-day the Labor men can be seen in a row at table with glasses of water beside them. Keir Hardie is a teetotaler; Ramsay MacDonald, the present Labor leader, is a teetotaler. Thomas Burt, the first Labor member of the House of Commons, and still the most universally respected is a teetotaler and so one might go through the list—T. P. O'Connor in London Public Opinion.

New York, Dec. 28.—Delegates from forty colleges and universities, representing a three-fold increase in membership the past year, were in attendance at the third annual convention of the Intercollegiate Socialist Society, which met in this city to-day. The convention speakers included Congressman Victor L. Berger of Milwaukee, Mayor-elect George R. Lunn of Schenectady, and several other prominent representatives of the Socialist party.
