There was much damage all along the river but the New Brunswick Contracting and Building Co., engaged in rebuilding the Hartland bridge were the largest individual losers. Practically the whole of four or five weeks work was swept away and a large portion of their plant has gone with the tide. A huge coffer-dam containing many thousand feet of humber went adrift along with a scow and much other material. Two large hoisting engines, derricks and dredges are omewhere in the bottom of the river. The loss may exceed \$20,000 and will delay work for weeks. The public will feel the loss of the foot bridge. 

### TWEEDDALE and WEGINSKIN FOR VICTORIA

For the purpose of providing larger areas for settlement purposes in the development of the county it was necessary to secure more land. For that purpose a large portion of the New Brunswick Railway land was acquired. The difficulties involved in the undertaking were found in the fact that it became necessary to compel that company to sell and to induce the government to take over the ands. Time has shown the wisdom this course, since the purchase price was \$38,000 and already from the revenue of these lands upwards of \$200,-000 have been paid into the excheqper of the province. At the same time large area has been settled and more is available to accomodate prospective settlers apon these, which are among the best agricultural lands

in the province. Hon. Mr. Tweeddale's experience and his political record in the legislature have won for him a place in the councils of the government and for this county the important portfolio of

agriculture.
The benefits of his progressive policies in aid of agriculture are recog nized throughout New Brunswick Among the policies of his department for the utilization of the natural resources of the province may be mentioned the purchase of the large deposit of pure time, with the installation of the most modern lime-grinding plants on the continent which are now supplying the farms in every part of the province with finely ground pure agricultural lime for which the delivered price is \$5 per ton, thus saving to the farmers in the remote sections from \$5 to \$7 per ton. The generous use of this time will mean an increased production of twenty-five per cent in the field crops of the

Of the co-operative creameries established in the province, one Mono ton, now in operation for only two years, has this year paid in cash for the cream within the radius of its supply a very large amount of money In order to supply wheat mills of the most modern type the bonus has been raised from \$500 to \$1,000 for a mill of fifty barrels per day capac ity. Six such mills have been erected during his administration of the de partment and the province is now quipped with a sufficient number of allie to meet all the requirements of he farmers throughout the province thes important policies too numerou to mention have been inaugurated by

Damask derives its mame from the city of Damascus; calleo from Callcut, a town in India formerly ole-brated for its cotton cloth, where also calleo was printed; cambric from Cambray, a town in Flanders where it was first made, and tweed from a fabric worn by fishermen upon the river Tweed.
