

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL HOLDS MEETING

Accounts Passed and Other Business Transacted at Dalhousie.

A meeting of the Restigouche Municipal Council was held at Dalhousie on Tuesday, Warden Dittie presiding.

The following Councillors were present:

Dalhousie—Couns. A. Murchie, Paul Doyle, Colborne—Couns. Jackson Miller, Alex. S. Arsenau, Balmoral—Warden Dittie, Coun. Ed. Savoie, Dalhousie—Couns. John Dickie, P. Dugas.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed. Sec-Treas. announced that Paul Doyle of Jacquet River had been duly elected for Durham in place of Coun. J. Lawlor, resigned.

Coun. John Dickie moved that the vote on the Valuation of the Country taken at the last session, be reconsidered on account of the fire of St. Quentin and destruction of other property along the L.N.R.—Carried. The Council adjourned until 2 o'clock.

The Council reassembled at 2 o'clock. The minutes of the forenoon session were read and confirmed.

The Secretary-Treasurer read a lengthy communication from Dr. A. G. Ferguson, containing several charges against the Sec-Treas.

Coun. Arsenau moved that the communication be not entertained, but returned to Dr. Ferguson.

Coun. Duncan moved in amendment that the matter be held over until the January session.

In speaking on the amendment Coun. Duncan said that some of the charges had to do with the Council and he thought the Sec-Treas. should be given an opportunity of answering them.

The amendment carried. Frank Senette, jailer, requested the rate of meals increased from 45 to 90 cents per day. On motion the rate was increased to 75c per day per prisoner.

A communication from Hubert Adams, a returned soldier, asking the Municipal Council to endeavor to arrange a loan for him under the Housing Scheme was read.

The Legal Adviser was asked to explain the Housing Scheme which he did.

Coun. John Dickie did not believe in the Council making in this matter. Let the government loan the money direct.

Coun. Firth moved that the matter be not entertained.—Carried.

Coun. Duncan said that if forty or fifty returned men had made a like request the matter would not be so speedily settled. This young man, and others in the country had fought just as valiantly as the soldiers from the towns yet they were discriminated against.

The council concurred in the proposal of Premier Foster to increase the annual grant per pupil to the Halifax School for the Blind.

Coun. Dickie again brought up the matter of the taking of the valuation. He said that it was not advisable to proceed with the valuation because of the destruction of St. Quentin, and other property along the L. N. R.

The Warden asked the Legal Adviser if the Council acted legally in ordering a valuation.

The Legal Adviser stated that the Council had not acted legally. Two fifths of the Councilors had not voted for such valuation.

A resolution was adopted dividing Balmoral parish at the church for municipal election purposes.

Dear Sir:

Complying with the request of the Temperance Committee as to my views regarding the results of the present Prohibitory Law, as compared with the old License System, in connection with the Industries of the Company, I beg to say:

That in the closing of the saloons liquor has become very difficult to obtain, and consequently very much less consumed.

That the men who indulged in it are now more regularly at their work following the closing of the mills on a holiday or for a special celebration than was the rule before.

That the wages of these men, which went very largely to the saloons, are now spent very much more for the requirements of the wives, the children and the homes than was the case in the old days.

That altogether the interest of those directly concerned are very much better off than was the result under the old License Law.

Rev. W. D. Wilson, Dear Sir:

Now that the date is fixed for holding a Plebiscite in the Province on the liquor question, every effort should be put forth to retain the intoxicating liquor Act, 1916.

Only the heads of the Police Department can fully appreciate these benefits, for with our noble brave boys coming home after the stress and strain of war, with relaxation of discipline on their part, what would have been the result had we open bars in place of prohibition? We cannot afford to lose what we have gained, and only when too late will we realize the loss, should the law be repealed. What will it be—PEACE, CONTENTMENT, and PROSPERITY with prohibition, or misery and war with open bars?
