THREE carloads of potatoes were forwarded from Sackville to New York by B. W. Beatty.—one from Pugwash, one from Amherst, one from Baie Verte. The branch railway gives Pugwash and Wallace the advantage of winter trade in potatoes for the first time, and three carloads have gone from Pugwash this season. Mr. Beatty has shipped 10,000 bushels so far.

The eight months old colt "Jack Wilkes," sired by the Government stallion "Harry Wilkes" Dam the fast road mare "Duchess" owned by Mr. Geo. McSweeney, and sold some time ago to Mr. Oliver Jones, was sold last week for \$175. He is to be kept for stock purposes. This colt was pronounced by Attorney General Blair to be the largest Wilkes colt foaled this season.—(Transcript.)

Some of England's Imports

The London correspondent of the Montreal Witness, under date of Dec. 24th, writes that the British public has received a very welcome Christmas message from the government in the shape of a two hundred page volume crowded with "figures." This is the annual return showing how the British farmer is getting on. Most of the farmers' troubles in recent years is due to their extravagant living in times of abundance. Certainly, the continuance of the agricultural depression has been helped by the slowness of the recovery with which the British farmer has changed his methods to suit the changing circumstances of his country. He has lost his old wheat, and more and more has turned to farming fruit and vegetable growing, and stock raising. In the latter respects, you will say he has been somewhat successful. Last year we imported 555,222 head of cattle, 677,968 sheep, 324,432 pigs, 428,432 tons of mutton, 1,301,016 tons of butter, 62,084 tons of "margarine" 95,399 tons of cheese, 1,131,900,360 eggs, 3,612,316 bushels of apples, 95,221 tons of potatoes, 3,554,453 bushels of onions, and other raw vegetables to the value of over \$2,000,000. Other food imports included 39,401 tons of fish, 67,853 tons of meat, 3,305,000 tons of game and poultry and 59,632 tons of lard; of wheat 2,927,504 tons; and of wheat flour 733,604 tons; of oats 791,558 tons; of main 1,800,016 tons of barley 870,045 tons; of rye 29,750 tons; of buckwheat 6,482 tons; of beans 178,978 tons; of peas 84,755 tons; of various kinds of pulses 1,130,016 tons. All this we eat, and yet we want so much more that our farmers have increased the area under cultivation in these old islands by 114,500 acres last year. There are to be paid for out of the revenue of this year, it is important to learn where the money is to come from for this year's roads and bridges.—St. John Sun.
