After the exercises at the monument and an ciaborate dinner, the Emperor did not disappoint his audience, for in his speech he said, apeaking with great solemnity, "This festivity is in the midst of serious times. Eleven years ago my grandfather addressed to you most important words. Now we must This event has ago my grandiather addressed to you most important words. Now we must maintain what William I. created and secured—the future of our fatherland. Our army requires increasing and remodeling. I have summoned the nation to provide the necessary means. All the other questions were inferior to this most serious question—one upon, which depends the very existence of the fatherland. We need absolute unity in order to solve the question. Whatever separates us as Germans, whatever causes views to the question. Whatever separates us as Germans, whatever causes views to diverge, must now be put aside, because it perils the future of the fatherland. This speech made a profound impression, and was hailed with enthusiaim.

Canada Comes in for a Share in the Far-Reaching Destruction.

Quebec, May 18.—The recent spring tides have caused considerable damage around and in this city. The water rose two feet in the Lower Town cellars, and at Hedleyville and St. Roch's ward the flood surrounded buildings and destroyed much property. The Quebec and Montmorency Railway station track at this point was completely destroyed, and the damage will amount to many thousand dollars.

At Grand River, twenty miles below Quebec, Mr. J. S. Murphy, of this city, loses about \$6,000 by the breaking of dams, booms and loss of logs.

REORGANIZING THE ARMY

London To Be Made the Salvationists

Headquarters of Western Ontario.

—A Promising Arrangement.

Headquarters of Western Ontario.

—A Promising Arrangement.

Details of a plan relating to a thorough reorganization of the Salvation Army throughout Canada have just been perfected. By the new arrangement this city has been made the directoral station of one of the five divisions into which the army in Canada is now divided. These are: 1, the Eastern Provinces; 2, Eastern Ontario, including Quebec; 3, Toronto; 4, Western Ontario, and 5, Winnipeg, which embraces the Northwest Territories and British Columbia. Formerly the army was broken up into seventeen sections, over which was a commanding officer, who gained his support from the district at large. Now a directing officer is placed as commandant at the central station in each of the five districts enumerated, and derives his pecuniary maintenance from this focus station only, leaving the outlying posts unembarrassed and free to meet their own peculiar liabilities.

A great advantage which will accrue from the new arrangement will be the ease with which local difficulties can be settled.

A great advantage which will accrue from the new arrangement will be the ease with which local difficulties can be settled. Instead of having to refer such matters, as was previously the case, to headquarters at Teronto, the commandant of each of the five divisions, who is expected to visit five divisions, who is expected to visit his subalterns at least once in every three months, will have full power to adjust such complications. The new arrangement will greatly facilitate the workings of the organization as well as rendering its governmental machinery less cumbersome. Those who form the staff in London are Brigadier Holland, Adjt. Miller and Capt.





The great park reservation is a step in the right direction, but the Government must keep up and extend its policy of providing a timber supply for the future.

NEW CURE FOR CONSUMPTION. Most important news was brought from Japan this week by Prof. Clay McCauley, of Tokio, who arrived at San Francisco by the steamship Oceanic. Since the time when Dr. Koch made known his wonderful discoveries, which failed to accomplish all that was hoped from them, no such interest has been developed in any medical revelation as that which is likely to flow from the statement of Dr. Kitasato regarding his cure for consumption by means of a modified application of Koch's remedies for consumption. Prof. McCauley announces that Dr. Kitasato, who studied under Koch in Berlin and discovered the bacillus of typhus, has been granted by the Japanese Government \$45,000 this year and \$15,000 for each of the next two years to prosecute the study and treatment of cholera, abdominal typhus, diphtheria and consump-tion. During the last winter Dr. Kitasato has accomplished some remarkable results with consumption. Four out of five patients who had been treated two months were discharged cured, and 125 who had been in hospital only a few weeks showed marked improvement. PROPHECY AND FULFILLMENT. In all ages, and at all times, the oppon ents of reform in the existing state of affair have been filled with fears-at least, they always profess to be so filled. When the Reform Bill of 1832 was brought in, it was opposed as a revolutionary measure, tending to red republicanism. When the second Reform Bill was brought in, equally dire calamities were prognosticated as a result of extending the franchise to the working classes. And now that the first step towards the relief of the congested Imperial Parliament is about to be taken by the conferring on Ireland of the right to manage her own local affairs in a legislative assembly at Dublin, the fearful prophets are at it once more. They tell us that the change will kill the Ulster flax industry. Surely it is not seriously contended that the Irish will cut off their noses to spite their faces. Who is it that cultivates the flax? Why, the Ulster farmers, at least one-half of whom are decidedly in favor of the change proposed. And so one might go through the whole of their objections, and prove how frivolous, in the light of very recent history, they are. As illustrating this contention, we are tempted to give our readers a striking instance of the direful tales of woe and desolation to come that were poured into the ear of the susceptible elector in the campaign of 1868-69, when the disestablishment of the Irish Church was the issue. At that time the dreadful-ness of the situation was set forth on every Conservative platform. It was maintained that if the church of the minority were no continued in Ireland at the expense of the majority, Popery would be rampant, and Protestantism would speedily be a thing of the past, while the persecu-tions that both sides indulged in during the intolerant times of previous centuries would be revived to the utter ruin of the minority. Take, in illustration, an address delivered in 1869 by a very clever Irish Conservative, Right Hon. David Plunket, M. P. for Dublin University.

LINCOLN QUOTED.

We who have taken up politics believe there are grand principles which must inspire "a government of the people, by the people and for the people," and when properly inspired to reform and elevate it. (Applause.) We look upon those who tollow politics to a personal end as traitors to a cause. (Applause.) We cannot do our duty until we have accomplished this mission. Any of us who know anything about the lives of the poor know the honest necessities of politics. We know the needs of educating the poor, of housing the poor, and we must direct our efforts to elevate the question of politics so as to compass these occessities. We should help each other to understand this power when the time comes for exercising it. We must not give way to the theory that what is right in private life is wrong in public life and what is right in public life is wrong in private life. (Applause.) We must not believe that what is right for one nation is wrong for another.



"Molo-ko-da" is a typical Kaffir song—a representation of the effect produced by a gradual approach and passing of a body of traveling native Africans who always sing when traveling in parties.
