The returns to the United States Department of International Affairs of gress, to vindicate and preserve the the steam railroads operating in Pennsylvania show that 1,538 persons were killed and 10.607 injured by them during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1895. Of those killed 29 were passengers; 447 employes, and 1,107 other persons. The passengers injured numbered 612; employes, 8,346; other persons, 1,649. 

Some cago Record, which has a story which appears for the first time in print (and was known but to a few of his Royal Highness' most intimate friends) of a meeting with an old hag who has predicted for him a violent death.

"Although the Prince of Wales saw little of the late Duke of Hamilton during the last ten years of the latter's life and was to all intents and purposes estranged from his friend and boon companion, yet he is greatly perturbed by the death of Scotland's premier peer and shows signs of falling once more into that species of melancholia and depression which followed for a considerable time the demise of his eldest son, the Duke of Clarence, causing him to keep on harving in conversation on the probability of his own early death.

The reason for the revival of this state of mind is attributed to the circumstances of the duke's death, which now turn out to have been not inflammation of the lungs, as stated, but a pistol shot, self-inflicted, in a moment of intense physical agony, caused by gout, coupled with mental depression, resulting from the effects of the banting system carried to excess.

Now, the duke is the third of a memorable party of four who has died a violent death, and the survivor is no other than the British heir apparent. A few months before the young Prince Imperial of France started for South Africa, whence he never returned, he paid a visit of five days to the Duke of Hamilton, in Scotland, his fellow-guests being Crown Prince Rudolph of Austria and the Prince of Wales. The most memorable event of that visit was a meeting of the Duke of Hamilton and the three princes with an old crone who had been evicted from her hovel by the duke's father for non-payment of rent. The Duke Rudolph suggested that they should have their fortunes told. To all four she said they would die a violent death, and that, too, within a given period, giving a number of details both in regard to the past and future of the party. They all affected to laugh away the predictions. But a gloom settled on each of them, the party breaking up the following day, and all four traveled south with faces, manner and conversaton which showed that there was a weight on their minds.

"The tragic death of the Prince Imperial of France and Prince Rudolon are well known. The news that the Duke of Hamilton has also met with a violent death greatly depressed the Prince of Wales."

All the Powers Agreed in Turkish Affairs.

Rumors of a British Ultimatum Unconfirmed.

The Sultan Gets No Satisfaction From Any of the Powers-A Surprise Expected.

Constantinople, Dec. 4.-The Eastern question is passing through a period of rumors, sent adrift to test the temper in which this or that movement would be received by the powers. Thus a few days ago a story was floated to the effect that Great Britain had proposed the dismemberment of Turkey to Russia, and that the latter had refused to take part in such a partitioning of the Ottoman Empire. Soon after this story had been digested, it was denied from a number of sources. Then it was reported that Russia, after the Sultan had made a direct appeal to inst. On the week following the stuthe Czar, had consented to waive her demands for an extra guardship in the Bosphorus, and that this had been one of the causes of Great Britain withdrawing the Dryad from the entrance to pass in.

Yesterday, after the meeting of the ambasadors, it was rumored that Sir Philip Currie, the British ambassador, had notified the Porte that Great Britain gave the Sultan until Saturday next in which to issue the firmans demanded, and that if they were not forthcoming by that time an extra British guardship would pass the straits without the Sultan's permission. This report was coupled with the statement that Italy indorsed he action of Great Britain in the matter. Some color was given to this report by the unprecedented activity in the Italian arsenals, and by the fact that the same rumor was current at Rome, Berlin, Paris and this city; but diligent inquiries here among the diplo-matic corps and in Turkish Govern-ment circles failed to obtain a confirmation of the report. But Sir Philip Currie undoubtedly seems to have made some important communication, the nature of which is not known to Tewfik Pasha, the Turkish Minister of Foreign Affairs. It was intimated in these dispatches, however, that this is an era of surprises, and it was hinted that another one is in store. This The Sultan turns out to be correct. has all along believed, and the palace coterie has been apparently equally convinced, that Russia would not act in accord with Great Britain, and that therefore Russia, France, and even Germany, might be counted upon, if it came to a decisive crisis, to oppose any active interference upon the part of Great Britain in the Turkish Empire. It became known today, howpowers to have order restored throughout the Turkish Empire and measures of the Sultan. The details of the developing of this little surprise are as

follows: When Great Britain threatened to force the passage of the Dardanelles if the firmans for the passing in of the extra guardship were not granted, the Sultan appealed personally to the Governments of Russia, Austria, Germany and France, begging them not to press their demands for extra guardships in the Bosphorus, calling their attention to the efforts of the Turkish Government was making to restore order and prevent further outbreaks and dwelling strongly upon the danger of an uprising of the Mussulmans throughout the empire if he, the Sultan, was subjected to such a slight, holding that the mere fact of sending the additional warships to the Bosphorus would tend to intimate beyond doubt that the Sultan was not considered by the powers to be capable of maintaining order in his own dominions. In no case did the Sultan meet with success. To his representations, Prince Lobanoff-Rostovsk, the Russian Minister for Foreign Affairs, replied at first that he would sound the Cabinets of France, Germany and Austria on the subject. The Russian Foreign Minister did so, but, receiving nothing but unfavorable replies, he later informed the Turkish ambassador at St. Petersburg that he could see no reason to separate himself from the course followed by the other powers in regard to the Eastern question. The Austrian, French and German Governments replied in a similar

tone. Thus, apparently, the Sultan was shown that he no longer has a backer in Europe, but the question of admitting the extra guardships is still unsettled, and this would still leave

An Oneida Row in Which an Indian Fared Badly-Edward Ellis Convicted of Assault-Middlesex's December Sessions.

The highly satisfactory results of the ban-quet were largely due to the untiring zeal of Chief Skirving, the secretary of the association, and the hearty man-Daisy; Who Can Deny It?" showed the esteem in which they held the subject of the song, Chief Skirving.

THE BANQUETING ROOM The room in which the feast was spread was tastily decorated with the national colors. On the walls and over the windows, and looped from the center of the ceiling to the corners, were strips of bunting, red, white and blue. At the head of the room was a large picture of Queen Victoria. The tables were six in number, arranged in rows of three across the room, at each end,

with an aisle in the center. At the head of the center table at the west end of the room, and under the picture of her Majesty, appeared the familiar face of James Brady, sheriff of the county of Oxford. At the head of the other center table, facing the sheriff, was the vice-chairman, J. C. Hegler. To the right of the sheriff among others sat Win. Watterworth, Chief Skirving and High Constable Tisdale; while on his left sat Rev. A. Murphy, Joseph Gibson and Rev. Mr. Hazlewood and others.

THE TOASTS. After the guests had shown in a practical way their satisfaction at the

pressed his great pleasure at being to-night back again in his old native town; also that he had the honor of acting as chairman of the meeting. He said he saw before him the best men of society from the county and towns. Continuing, he stated that he could heartily say, "Ingersoll, with all thy faults, I love thee still." He suggested a little music, and as the crowd arose and drank the health of the royal family, the orchestra played "God Save the Queen," while all the people sang

the national song.
"For He's a Jolly Good Fellow," folfollowed the toast to the Covernor-General, with whom was coupled the Lieutenant-Governor.

"The Army and Navy and Volunteers" was next proposed, and Major Hegier was asked to respond. He believed that while we have no need to supplement the work of the constabu-lary by means of the militia, that still volunteers would be found ever ready when called upon. He stated that Great Britain achieved all her greatness by the aid of the army and navy. To defend our country, Great Britain can place on the field 1,000,000 men who have received more or less training. If called upon, our own volunteers will be found willing to do their duty. They always do their duty, both in times of war and times of peace. Yet we pray that they may never be called upon to defend our country from war. The orchestra played "The Maple Leaf Forever" and the British Grenadiers.

Capt. Vance was called, but was not present. The sheriff then asked A. H. Skirving, secretary of the association, to read some letters and telegrams he had received from different prominent persons who were unable to be pres-

The chairman then asked all to fill

their glasses and drink to "The Oxford and Visiting Constabulary." This called forth songs to the tune of "He's a Jolly Good Fellow" in words like "They Are Daisies," "Get Your Handcuffs," and "They'll Arrest You Just Now." This was responded to by Rev. A. Murphy, who probably delivered the best speech of the evening. He spoke at some length on the objects of the association, namely, mutual help throughout the county and province in the arrest of criminals; also to effect provisions in the way of insurance for the family of any member in case of disability or death. He then spoke of the two positions in which the constables stood, and referred to the attitude of the people toward the constables, and their attitude towards the people. He believed that the police officers did not receive the legal protection which they should have, nor the financial support to which they were entitled. He thought much more effective work would be done if the salaries were larger. Further, he thought a law ought to be enacted that the families of officers who are killed while in the discharge of their duties be granted a respectable sum. Those who depend upon the officers who are martyred should be looked after by law. He referred to four desirable qualities which should be had by every officer. First, education; every one should at least be able to write his own name before being appointed a police officer. Second, physique; see what longitude and tude you have in your chief here. You need big men and powerful. Third, character. "Oh, I do think if there is any man who ought to have a genuine good character, it is the policesaid he. "Treasure your character like the little ermine treasures its fur of spotless white." The one great essential was character. Fourth, faithfulness. And he closed with a stirring appeal that all police officers of the association make faithfulness their motto.

High Constable Tisdale next delivered a brief address. He was followed by Chief Skirving. of Irgersoll, who gave a short address

on the work of the association.

Detective McRever, of Chatham, arose to the occasion and expressed his pleasure at being present. After some remarks relative to the Oxford Association and the Dominion Association, which was organized in Toronto s few years ago, Chiefs Pow and Wills were called upon, but did not appear. Regarding the former, the sheriff re-marked that "Archie" was bashful. He was from Tilsonburg. He was the only man from the south he had ever met who was bashful.

Dr. Lucas, Dr. Rogers and J. B. Jackson and the Rev. Mr. Hazlewood briefly replied to the toast of "The

Learned Professions." "Our Guests" was ably handled by Mr. Joseph Gibson, who highly approved of the great necessities referred to by Mr. Murphy. Continuing, he referred to the recent criminal trials and highly complimented the state of our country in recognizing as just and binding the verdicts rendered by our courts of justice, although private opinions may differ widely. He be-lieved that this respect of justice was the basis of England's greatness. His patriotic references evoked loud applause, amid which he took his seat. Messrs. Stevens, Watterworth and King delivered brief addresses, and each expressed his satisfaction at being present, and complimented their entertainers on the success which had attended their efforts.

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

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
