Doctor Says Illness Greatest Ally of Health.

HE IS MUM AS TO CANCER

Many Other Affections, He Declares Are Nature's Means of Destroying Bacteria.

London, Nov. 7.-Sir Frederick Treves delivered a remarkable address at the inaugural meeting of the session of the Linburgh Philosophical Institution, his subject being "Medicine a la Mode." He said the prevailing idea of disease was that it is something that is woeful and malignant, evil in origin, evil

in intent, and evil in effect. "The popular view," he said, "claims that disease is a calamity, that its end is destruction, and that it is purposeless except in one direction-that of doing harm. The popular terms bear testimony to the prevalence of that

Nitti deems that a terrible mistake is being made that Italians at this juncture should court the praise of others or waste energy in questionable boasts. 





The motorman did so, and when Flexsaw that he was being overtaken he left the line of the railway and for the river bank. Opposite to the place where he made the break for the bank the car was stopped, and Smith jumped off, still in hot pursuit of his man.

"Look out, there he is," someone shouted. Glancing in the direction indicated, Smith saw Flexen crouthed down be-low the steep bank of the river.
