Food Controller Takes Strong Measures to Provide People With Meat.

London, Jan. 2.—Many butcher shops throughout London were without their usual supply of meat today, and some were forced to close. Almost no beef arrived at the Smithfield market. The scanty stocks were exhausted long before the retailers, who stood in a line from 5 o'clock in the morning until noon, could be supplied.

The Government relieved the situation somewhat by releasing from its stores 2,000 carcases of mutton, but this was soon taken, and many retailers were compelled to go off empty handed.

In the fish market conditions were much the same. The recent stormy weather has resulted in almost total disapearance of certain kinds of fish, and prices are very high. 


Steadfast Courage Is Surely Winning Struggle for World Freedom.

Controller Shaw, as a mayoralty aspirant, polled just 746 votes less than he did a year ago, when he ran for the board of control.
