Driver Roberts Left Etaples Hospital in Time.

LONG OVERSEAS SERVICE

Three Years in France—Had Good Trip Back to London.

Driver Norman Ross Roberts, who has just returned to London after nearly four years' service overseas, is a son of Norman A. Roberts of the Roberts Engraving Company, this city. Leaving for overseas with No. 2 Field Ambulance Corp. on October 29, 1915, he served for some time at the Canadian General Hospital at Etaples. Later he was transferred to the 3rd Battery, just escaping the great bombardment of the Etaples Hospital. He was over three years in France.

Passage Good.

In speaking of his transportation to Canada, Driver Roberts says that the conditions on board ship now are excellent. The food is good and everything is comfortable for the men, who are not overcrowded. There is no delay at the port of call, and the troops are carried on to their destination in comfortable trains to be discharged almost immediately on their arrival here. The return to civil life is most expeditious.

Clear by May.

"As far as we know, most of the Canadian troops, with the exception of those in hospital, will be out of France by the end of May," he said. "Units are now being brought home according to their length of service in France. At the present time, No. 1 Hospital is in England, and two others which served overseas in the early days. Old units are sent to Canada between the divisions, our unit having been sent between the third and first divisions. It is possible that No. 10 Western University Stationary Hospital will be sent between the first and second divisions, but more probably later, as other old units will come before it in length of service."

PTE. E. T. FOX NOW BEFORE COURT ON CHARGE OF THEFT

General Court-Martial Called For His Trial.

ESCAPED FROM CUSTODY

This Was Cause of Making Hearing of Unusual Seriousness.

A general court-martial, authorized by Major-Gen. E. C. Ashton, C. M. G., acting adjutant general, Ottawa, convened at Wolley Barracks this morning for the purpose of trying Acting Corp. Edward Thomas Fox, who is charged with the theft of whiskey and alcohol from the medical stores at headquarters some months ago.

The whole of the evidence for the prosecution and the accused's own evidence were given this morning, and at noon the court adjourned until 2 o'clock. On resuming, a number of witnesses for the defense were present. The whole of the evidence for the defense is still being heard at the time of going to press.

Fox, together with Pte. E. W. Smith, both of the A. M. C., were accused jointly of the theft of whiskey and alcohol from the medical stores at headquarters. Fox, however, made his escape from custody before the case came for trial. Smith was tried and acquitted.

Aggravation. Fox gave himself up voluntarily about two weeks ago, and the circumstances of the case and the fact of his previous escape while awaiting trial were communicated to Ottawa. The local authorities took this step, believing that the accused's escape had aggravated his offense, if he had committed the theft, to such an extent that a general instead of a district court should deal with him. This was the view also of Ottawa, and the general court was ordered.

Alleges Alibi. The accused, in his own defense, declared that he was not near the medical stores at the time of the alleged theft. He described his movements with some minuteness, and the witnesses for the defense, who were called to support his statement, declared that he was in various places, but not near the medical stores when the offense with which he is charged is said to have occurred.

Major G. N. Weekes is acting as judge advocate, and Lieut. R. N. Barron of the London Military Convoy is acting as prosecutor. The members of the court are as follows: Lieut.-Col. W. J. Douglas, headquarters (president); Major R. E. Emerton, headquarters; Major F. G. Stanbury, C. G. R.; Major Gordon, 7th Regiment; and Major W. H. McInnes, C. A. M. C.

INCREASED FARES FOR ST. RAILWAY ARE APPROVED

Council Sets Rate at 6 and 7 Tickets For a Quarter.

SEND TO LEGISLATURE

Majority in Favor of This Action Was Only One.

What the council did: Referred the question of school dues back to the board of education for another session. Decided to increase the street railway fares to six and seven tickets for 25 cents.

Decided to ask the Legislature for permission to purchase the street railway. Referred the peace celebration preparations to the reception committee. The question of a reception for Major Hugh Niven, C. M. G., was referred to the reception committee.

Appointed Mayor C. R. Somerville, Ald. E. S. Little and O. G. Keene a committee to recommend a commission to act under the housing act. Referred the motion to amend the principle of commission form of government to the council to No. 1 committee.

Referred the motion asking for the reinstatement of Thomas Tozer to the first department to No. 1 committee. Granted the G. W. V. the free use of Queen's Park for a carnival during the week of June 2 to 7.

Authorized Engineer H. A. Brazier to construct the additions to the rooms at bathing camp No. 1 at an estimated cost of \$700. Referred the question of paying the street railway north back to No. 2 committee.

Presents Railway Case.

President Charles Currie of Akron, Ohio, addressed the council. He presented the case of the street railway company, which had been granted a franchise to increase fares. The council decided to refer the matter to the Legislature.

No Watered Stock. In reference to the allegations that the company would have been able to pay dividends if it had not been for the watered stock, Mr. Currie emphatically denied that there was one dollar's worth of "water" in the capital stock of the company. The shareholders have paid in dollar for dollar, he said.

He pointed out that any surplus above the 5 per cent had been put into the road, and that as nothing had been set aside for depreciation, this would balance. He admitted that the company had made an agreement with the city, but he called attention to the fact that conditions have greatly changed since the time of the signing of the contract. That the cost of materials had risen by from 100 to 200 per cent was a statement. Last year the company had paid \$40,000 in increased wages alone. This year the same were asking another increase. "We have to use the roller to grind the men down until we can afford to pay," he said. "We are ready to restore the service and treat our men on a fair basis, but we cannot get relief from the city. We want to maintain the road so that it will be a credit when you take it over six years hence."

Mr. Currie urged that some action be taken at once, as the Legislature will have to pass on the question. **Would Take No Action.** Ald. L. S. Holmes, seconded by Ald. E. S. Little, moved the adoption of the report of the special committee, that no notice could be taken of the company's request as it had not offered any suggestions of improvements to the service in the communication.

Ald. W. A. Wilson pointed out that the company had just made an offer. He would favor doing something for the company under certain conditions. Ald. O. I. Cunningham thought that the people would be willing to pay extra for a good service.

He made a motion, which was seconded by Ald. John Colbert, that the company be granted the right to sell six and seven tickets for 25 cents instead of seven and nine at present, and that the seven for a quarter tickets be good till 8:30 a.m. When he made his motion he added the condition that this be done if the company restores the service. This was withdrawn, as it was thought it might prejudice the rights of the city.

Another Rate Suggested. Ald. Cunningham pointed out that the workers in the stores and offices downtown could take advantage of the cheap tickets under the motion. Ald. Wilson, seconded by Ald. E. R. Seabrook, moved that the fares be increased to six and eight tickets for 25 cents, and that the hours for the use of the tickets be extended.

Philip Pocock and Father O'Connor Named.

KNIGHT AND PRELATE

Investiture Will Be Made At Easter Monday Morning Service.

News has been received by His Lordship Bishop Fallon that high papal honors have been bestowed upon Philip Pocock, chairman of the public utility commission, and Rev. D. O'Connor, pastor of St. Peter's Cathedral at the solemn pontifical mass on Easter Sunday morning.

Following is a translation of the official documents by which these honors are conveyed:

"To Our Beloved Son, Denis O'Connor, Priest:

"Health and apostolic benediction. The Bishop of London, now present

in the curia, generously sounds your praises and relates to us that you, the director of the Theological Seminary of this diocese, attend with the utmost diligence to the formation in piety and science of the young men called to the priesthood. In the discharge of the weighty office of vicar-general you are active and proficient helper. In the administration of the diocese, in order therefore that in this year, in which your bishop happily completes the 25th anniversary of his episcopate, you may have a singular pledge of the esteem of the holder of the see, we have decided to bestow upon you the honor of knight and prelate, and in consequence you are held in high regard by them, and so he desires that we also should bestow upon you a well-deserved token of our recognition. Hence, gladly acceding to the wishes of your bishop, in order that you may receive a tribute in proportion

Weakens City's Case. The city solicitor expressed the opinion that the council was weakening its position by giving increased fares before the service had been restored. Ald. Little submitted that the difficulty was in the fact that the Legislature must pass on the question, thus no time should be lost. He thought that the company should have relief.

To Amend Requisites. Discussing the question of a deputation to the board of education, Ald. Harley, seconded by Ald. Colman, inquired, suggested that the board be asked to reconsider its decision. City Solicitor T. G. Meredith had said that the council had no power to amend the original requisition. In answer, Ald. Holmes and Ald. Wilson moved that the board be granted the full issue asked, \$185,000.

Salvation Army Gets It. R. H. Hessel and Seret. Fred Young addressed the council, asking that the remitted fine of a veteran which had been paid by subscription taken partly by the efforts of the trades and labor council be handed to the Salvation Army. This was agreed to by the council.

Secret. Young paid tribute to the work of the Salvation Army for the boys. "There has never been a returned soldier turned away from the hostel," said he, "and any person that is a friend of our pals is our friend. I am assured that none will ever want for a bed or a meal as long as the hostel exists." The statement brought applause from the audience.

Would Divide Contract. The question of paying Waterloo street between Harvard and Grosvenor streets, was referred back to No. 2 committee. Ald. Holmes wanted the contracts for the road divided between the Imperial Oil Company and the British and American Oil Company, in accordance with the recommendation of City Engineer H. A. Brazier.

Ald. Wilson, chairman of No. 2 committee, stated that the contract had not been given to the lowest tenderer, but that there was a difference of about \$50 in the two tenders. Ald. Wilson said that the Imperial Oil Company had donated land and paid taxes in the city for a good many years.

Ald. Holmes submitted that the Imperial had no claim on the city. The council approved the recommendation of the committee that the contract be given to the Imperial Oil Company.

Referred Back. Ald. Seabrook said that he understood that Tozer still has his uniform, and that the chief is willing to take him back. Ald. Harley had been told by Tozer that the chief was not willing to take him back until the charges which were made last year had been cleared up.

Referred Back. The question was referred to No. 1 committee. The preparations for a peace celebration were left with the reception committee with power. This committee will have to pass on the question.

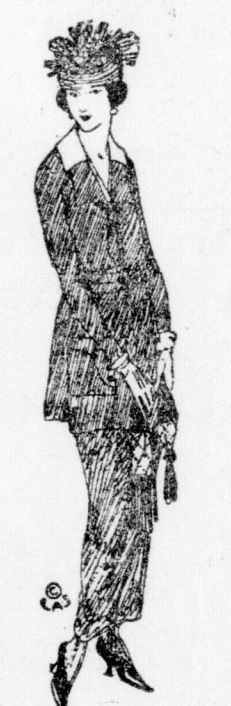

LABOR AND CAPITAL WORKING TOGETHER TO REACH SOLUTION

James Gray Says the British
Affairs Will Settle.

NO USE FOR BOLSHEVISM

Canadians Over There Have One Want—To Get Home.

"The British character is wonderfully solid underneath the unrest, and they have no use for Bolshevism over there. There is unrest at the present time, a great deal of it, but with war handling there seems every reason to believe that things will come out all right."

This was the opinion expressed to The Advertiser today by James Gray, who arrived last evening from England, accompanied by his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Roy Gray, widow of his eldest son who after coming safely through the whole war, died several weeks ago from influenza.

"The labor leaders are working with the parliament to bring about a settlement of conditions," he continued, "and so far as I could discover, the capitalists and employers of labor are largely willing to do the right thing, to meet labor half way and give it a fair chance. That is what labor wants, a square deal. Justice, a chance for improved conditions and opportunity."

"During the time I was in England the railway strike was pending, but things seemed to be getting pretty well settled so far as that was concerned before I left. I haven't seen any papers since."

"London is a wonderful city just now, filled up with soldiers, Canadian, Australian, from New Zealand, all eager to get home."

"Home is the big thing the men want now, the war is over. I talked to numbers of them at Witley camp, where they all told me the same story. There is nothing for them to do, and it naturally makes them restless. They want to get back home, and into civilian life again. They feel it a hardship to be kept away from home any longer than is absolutely necessary."

"You never saw such a happy crowd in your life. They were hilarious all the way over, and the reception at St. John was enough to warm the heart of any homesick man."

At Witley camp Mr. Gray spent a day with his son-in-law, Capt. (Rev.) Hugh MacFarlane, former assistant minister of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, whom he found in "the pink of condition." Capt. MacFarlane is now attached as chaplain to No. 3 Stationary Hospital, Boulogne.

Mr. Gray went over to the old country for the purpose of visiting the graves of his two gallant sons, Ronald Gray, who died as a result of wounds in France, and Capt. Roy Gray, who was killed in action. He also went for the purpose of meeting his widowed daughter-in-law, Mrs. Roy Gray, and bringing her to Canada.

LAPLAND WITH 78 LONDONERS ABOARD DUE ON FRIDAY

Transport Is Bringing 1,735
Canadian Soldiers.

Ottawa, April 8.—With 1,735 Canadian soldiers aboard, the steamer Lapland is now on her way across the Atlantic. She will probably dock at Halifax on April 11. FOUR CONSIDERABLE STATES WILL BE CREATED WHICH WILL RESTORE BALANCE OF POWER

Poland's Area 98,000 Miles, Population 23,800,000;
Czecho-Slovakia 53,500 Miles, Population 12,500,000;
Rumania 102,500 Miles, Population 14,350,000;
Jugo-Slavia 85,300 Miles, Population 10,750,000.

Last week I discussed the western frontiers of Germany, indicating that the Allies had substantially agreed that Germany should surrender Alsace-Lorraine and the Saar coal district to France outright, and that she would further have to consent to the creation of a Rhenish republic on the left bank of the Rhine. The permanent military frontier and the temporary political frontier of Germany on the west is thus fixed at the Rhine.

Since that time very great decisions of the old Prussian provinces of East Posen, and an area of between 10,000 and 15,000 square miles. In a word, it will have an area approximately equal to that of the modern Italian Kingdom, with a population in excess of that of Italy at the moment when the Savoy monarchy achieved its unity in the nineteenth century.

The second of the states to be re-created, that of Czecho-Slovakia, presents less formidable problems. Bohemia and Moravia, with Austrian Silesia, were a well-defined area, and Bohemia an Austrian province, preserved the frontiers it had enjoyed before the Thirty Years War deprived it of its independence. The whole serious question was as to German populations inhabiting the frontier districts. These populations would naturally choose to be German rather than Slav, but were they to be German, the new state would be deprived of all its natural frontiers, the all gateways to its territory would be in enemy hands, and this situation again the Conference of Paris has taken the logical course. It is resolved to preserve the historic frontiers of the Czechs. To these Austrian provinces it will add the Slovak counties of Hungary lying in the tangled mass of hills which constitute the south shore of the Carpathians.

Czecho-Slovakia, as constituted will be a state with an area of rather more than 40,000 square miles, that is about four times the size of Belgium, with a population of between 12,500,000 and 14,000,000. It will be perhaps the most curious state in Europe, extending from the new Rumanian frontier into the very heart of Germany, having the general outline of the observation balloon which the soldiers named a "sausage," but, despite its strange configuration, its population will be almost solidly Slav.

The Jugo-Slav State. The third of the states to be created is that of the Jugo-Slavs. Here a single difficulty had to be faced, and has not yet been fully resolved. From the Alps to the Danube the Drave River constituted a natural frontier, which substantially divided the Germans from the Slovenes in the West, and the Serbs and Croats from the Serbs in the East. Minor modifications to take in outlying such fractions beyond the Drave and the Danube, from the new Italian frontier, and the old Polish frontier at Widlin. On the east the old Serbian frontier will be maintained.

Along the Adriatic, with two exceptions, the sea supplies the natural frontier, but in the Dalmatian and about Fiume and Trieste, Italian and Jugo-Slav aspirations have clashed, and this clash has complicated one of the most difficult of the whole conference. These difficulties were enhanced by the fact that at the moment when Italy entered the war the French and British Governments had guaranteed to her the possession of Trieste and the Slav hinterland, and also possession of the northern half of Dalmatia and most of the Adriatic Islands.

What Italy May Get. Whatever may be the justice of the Italian claims as to Fiume, there is no mistaking the fact that the great mass of the people of Dalmatia are not merely Slav, but determined to become part of the new Jugo-Slavic state. At the present moment the problem remains to be settled, but there is a growing belief that all contentions will be referred to Italy, while retaining the Adriatic islands, will exchange most, if not all, of the province of Dalmatia for the whole Italian town of Fiume, which was not included in the regions guaranteed to her by the Allies, but constitutes an unmistakable fraction of Italian Italy.

The new Jugo-Slavic state will then have an area approximately as great as that of Poland and of Italy herself, with a population of between 10,000,000 and 12,000,000. This population will be almost without exception Slavonic, made up of three branches of the Southern Slav family, the Slovenes in the north, the Croats in the centre and the Serbs in the south. It will offer an opportunity for commercial advancement, and there is every reason to look forward to the rapid development of still another considerable nation in Europe, if only the present jealousies between the Slav and the Italian can be removed.

The Rumanian Situation. Less formidable than the task of creating a new Jugo-Slavia and a new Poland, or even a new Czecho-Slovakia, is the task of extending Rumania to include the Rumanians dwelling in Rumania, Austria and Hungary. These Rumanians made a solid block of something like 14,000,000 of people. Today the frontiers have been redrawn to include all but a minor fraction.

As it has been rebuilt, Rumania will consist in addition to the old kingdom of the Russian province of Bessarabia, the Austrian province of Bukovina, the Hungarian province of Transylvania, complete, and more than two-thirds of the Hungarian province of the Banat, and in addition, which after some dispute has been allotted to Serbia as well as a corner about the city of Szeged which has been allotted to Hungary. In addition, it is probable that many minor divisions of Hungary, inhabited by Rumanians, will be included within the new frontiers.

As it is delimited, the new Rumania will have an area of 105,000 to 110,000 square miles, which is approximately the same as that of Poland and of Jugo-Slavia, with a population of between 14,000,000 and 15,000,000, a population which given the Rumanian capacity for increase, will doubtless pass the 20,000,000 mark within a generation.

What Hungary Will Be. It remains to glance at the new Hungary, which will be left after the outgoing regions inhabited by Slovaks and Southern Slavs, and Rumanians have been subtracted. This state will have between 85,000 and 90,000 square miles of area, and a population of between 6,000,000 and 8,000,000, which will be purely Magyar and include by far the greater number of the races.

Such, in sum, is the new map of Europe as it has been made up to the present moment. The conference of Paris has decided to create four comparatively considerable states, three of them as large as modern Italy, out of territories acquired by Germany, and to restore to the world a balance of power by suppressing the liberties of the races inhabiting these lands. In the new European system and in the league of nations these four powers will play a considerable part. In a measure they will restore the balance of power in Europe destroyed when Russia collapsed under German attack. Combined, they will constitute a permanent and formidable obstacle to the German conception of Mitteleuropa.

Minor modifications may still come, but on the whole with these plans adopted, the outlines of the new Europe which is to come forth as a consequence of the recent war are now plain and shape up as follows:

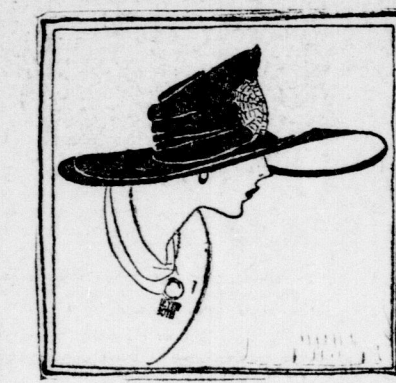

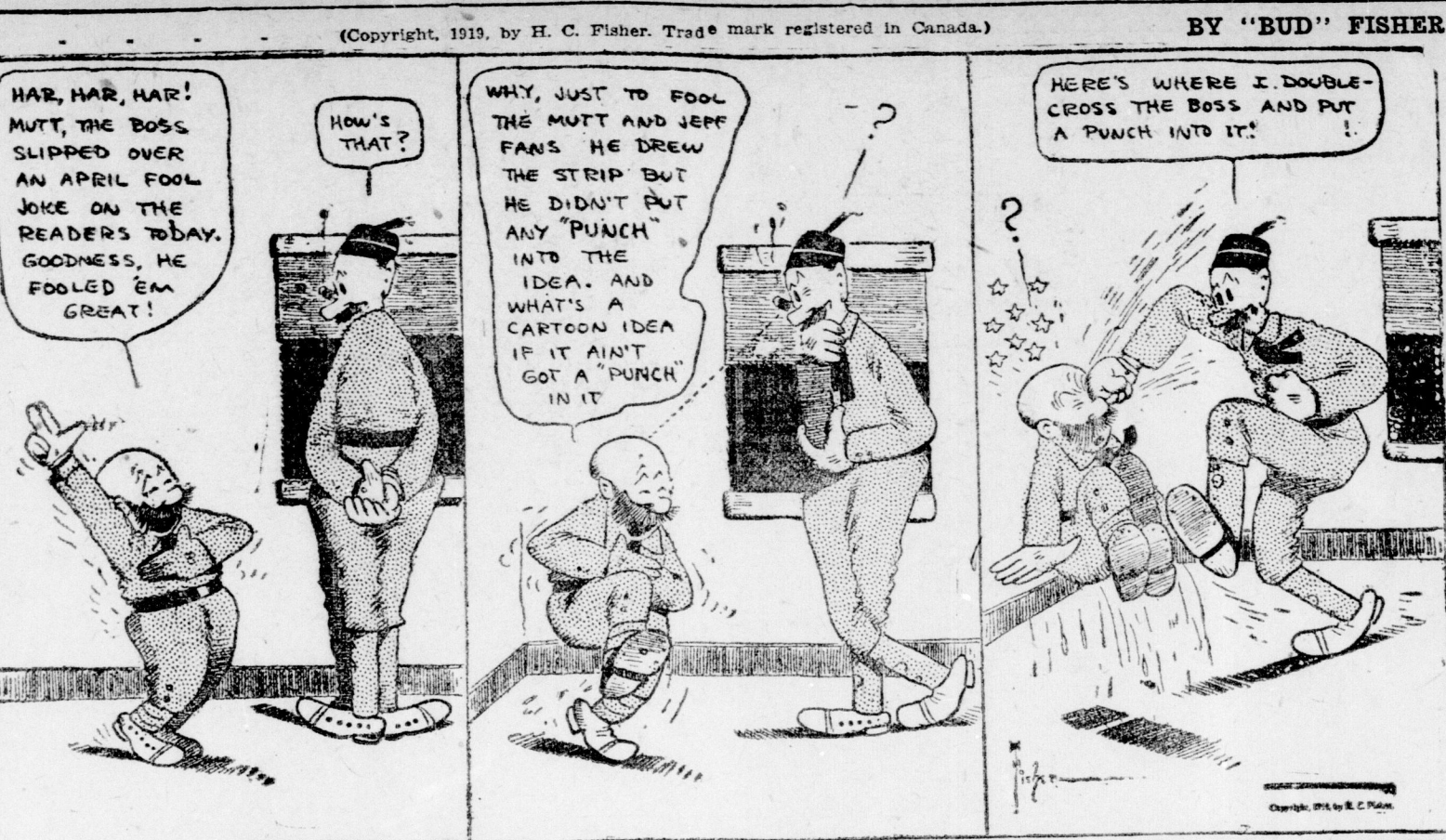

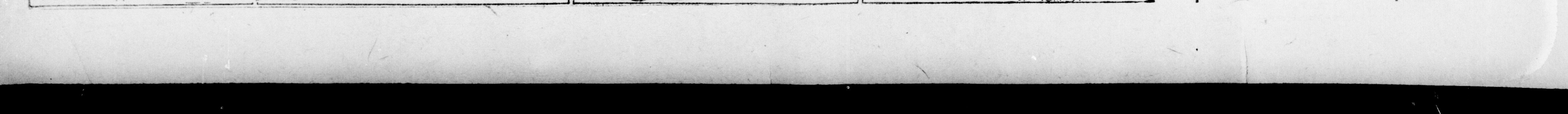

Returned Engineers Want Association Formed Here

Think This Should Be Done As in the Case of Battalions.

Men who have returned recently to Canada after having seen service overseas with the Canadian Engineers, have expressed a desire that an organization of returned engineers might be formed, similar to the associations established by men who served with particular battalions.

An engineer who reached here a few days ago with a party of men who were discharged through the dispersal station at Tecumseh Barracks, pointed out that a very large number of men who saw service with railways, bridges, road, telegraph and other departments of the engineers have already returned to London, and he thought these men would appreciate the opportunity to meet together occasionally, which would be furnished by the formation of a Returned Engineers' Association.

The engineers, he said, "did splendid and often gallant work, although they were not in the limelight to the extent that infantry and other fighting units were. The G. W. V. A. will keep alive the traditions of the Canadian corps as a whole, but I think it would be nice if we could also form a separate organization which would keep green the tradition of our own branch of the service."

Up to the present, so far as is known, no steps have been taken along the line suggested by this man, but he expressed his intention of talking the matter over with other returned engineers, and he thought that this might have the effect of initiating a movement which would gradually gain momentum as more men became interested.

GUILTY OF DESERTION

Pte. Arthur Fordham So Found by Court-Martial.

Pte. Arthur Fordham, a former member of the 34th Battalion, was charged with desertion from that unit before a district court-martial at Wolseley Barracks on Monday, and found guilty.

The evidence showed that he absented himself from the camp shortly before the 34th went overseas. Although witnesses testified that he came back the night before, and that he had moved out for the port of embarkation, there was no official record of his return, as he immediately went home again without reporting. He remained at liberty until a few days ago, when he was apprehended in Ingersoll and sent to London to be dealt with.

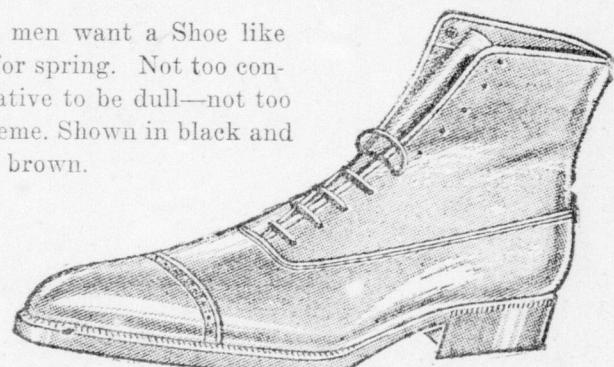
