"That Elizabeth Evans came to her death at Victoria Hospital on Friday, April 4, 1919, as the result of injuries said to have been sustained by falling from a chair at her home, 35 Weston street, this city, on Wednesday evening, April 2, 1919."

Above is the verdict rendered by the coroner's jury empanelled to inquinto the death of Mrs. William Eva after listening to the evidence gather by Cro'n Attorney J. B. McKillop. took the jury but 10 minutes to come conclusion. The 1918 wheat production of Germany, without Alsace-Lorraine, is 90,000,000 bushels, compared with 82,000,000 in 1917, and 139,500,000 the average for the five years 1912-16. The average of the five years before the war, 1909 to 1913, was 148,000,000 bushels. This year's production is therefore, nearly 40 per cent less than the average.

Washington, April 8.—Refusal of Ukrainian peasants to deliver wheat to the Bolsheviki together with the disorganization of the railway system in Russia, was blamed by Premier Lennin in a recent speech in Petrograd, for the desperate food situation in the former capital of the Russian Empire. Swedish Press reports transmitted to the state department today, giving a summary of Lenine's speech, quote the Bolshevik premier as telling his Petrograd audience that he had implored the Ukrainian' Soviet to send fifty million pounds of wheat to avert famulist forces in the Ukraine were too insufficiently organized to take the wheat forcibly from the peasants.

Lenine is further quoted as saying that half of that amount of wheat would be of great assistance in case it was impossible to get more, but that it seemed doubtful if they would he able to get even 25 000.000 pounds.

Canada after having seen service over-seas with the Canadian Engineers, have expressed a desire that an organ-ization of returned engineers might be formed, similar to the associations established by men who served with particular battalions.

An engineer who reached here a few days ago with a party of men who were discharged through the dispersal station at Tecumseh Barracks, pointed out that a very large number of men who saw service with railway, bridge, road, telegraph and other detachments of the engineers have already returned to London, and he thought these men would appreciate the opportunity to meet together occasionally, which would be furnished by the formation of a Returned Engineers' Association.


