Vigorously pressing their great offensive on the Arras-Lens front, the British have pushed further into German-held territory behind the ous "Hindenburg line."

Today's official statement from London reports the capture of the village and heights of Monchy-le-Preux, nearly five miles southeast of Arras, and just north of the Arras-Cambrai main road. Satisfactory progress along other sections of the fighting line is announced, one of the points taken being the village of La Bergere. FIRST RUSH OVER.

Apparently the first swift rush of the forceful offensive is over, but the reports from correspondents indicate that the work of consolidating the ground won was taken up speedily and done thoroughly, while during the progress of this task there was no interruption of the pressure on the retreating Germans. Already more than 11,000 prisoners and guns in excess of 100, many of them heavy pieces, have been taken by General Haig's victorious troops.

The minimum advance has been effected in the sector of Vimy Ridge, the northern pivot of the Hindenburg line, now turned by the British, where the German resistance was naturally stiffest in view of the importance of the commanding hill positions. Nevertheless the British accounts show further gains against the Germans there.

CONSOLIDATING GAINS.

London, April 11.-2:11 p.m. British troops yester. day advanced north of the village of Louveral, in the direction of Cambrai, to the extent of a quarter of a mile along a front of 2,000 yards and consolidated this gain during the night, telegraphs Reuter's correspondent from the British army headuarters in France.

The official statement from British headquarters, describing the operations now in progress on the Arras-Lens line reports the capture up to this evening of 11,000 prisoners, including 235 offi-cers, more than 100 guns, including

heavy guns up to eight inches, 60 trench mortars and 163 machine guns.

Regarding the heavy fighting on the western front today's army headquarters' statement reports that the "battle near Arras continues."

"In stubboraly resisting the superiority of the enemy," adds the statement, "two of our divisions suffered considerable losses."

URGES TEACHERS TO TRAIN THE MEMORY

Stevenson of Normal School Recommends Fine Passages of Prose and Poetry.

At the meeting of the Ontario Educational Society at Toronto yesterday, an address on "The Improvement of the Memory" was given by A. Stevenson of the London Normal School, in which he said:

"In the case of the normal adolescent and adult, improvement in ability to remember is mainly a matter of improvement in the method of getting hold of the facts in the first place. Clear, forcible, graphic presentation of the facts is fundamental as a preliminary condition of retention and recall.

Cucumbers he advised planting six to the hill one and a half inches deep, and allowing three of them to mature. He dealt also with beets, cabbage, lettuce, onions, parsnips, peas, tomatoes and potatoes.


