necessary for the Russians to be in a position to repel a blow in this direction. In view of this development in the operations, General Kuropatkin decided to abandon his position on the left bank and to concentrate his whole army on the other side of the river. The position is of the strongest, both in character and in site. The great issue will be finally decided there. By withdrawing to this position the Russian army avoids the dan-ger of being divided by the river and enjoys the advantage of compactness. General Kuropatkin's move, therefore is not to be considered as a retreat, but rather as the carrying out of a well-defined idea.

The withdrawal of the Russians to the right bank involved the abandon-ment of Liao Yang, which is situated on the left bank. The Japanese took advantage of this to occupy the city, but the sternest part of the fighting is still before them unless General Kuropatkin decides at the last hour to again fall back to the northward. It is more than likely, however, that he will decide to fight to a finish. The determined pursuit by the Japanese of the Russian out posts when General Kuropatkin gave the first order to withdraw was probably due to their anxiety to keep the Russians south of Liao Yang until Keneral Kuroki should be able to advance from the northeast. General Kuropatkin, however, saw the trap, and cleverly avoided it.

Up to the hour of filing this dispatch, the war office has not given out the details of the fighting of Sept. 1, but it is believed that this fighting exceeded in fierceness that of any previous day. The absence of press telefrom Liao Yang on Sept. 1 aroused suspicions that changes of importance were proceeding which the military censors did not wish to be made known. A telegram from the Associated Press correspondent at Mukden, filed at 9:27 on the evening of Sept. 1 states that the train service between Mukden and Liao Yang has been interrupted, and that the roads are impassable, but the dispatch does not mention whether telegraphic communications are open.

### Crossing of the Taitse.

According to a dispatch from Liao Yang, General Kuroki made his first attempt to cross the Taitse River late in the evening under cover of a heavy bombardment of the extreme Russian The Japanese artillery, which been firing uninterruptedly for fourteen hours that day, ceased about 9 o'clock, and then suddenly reopened about 11, to conceal Kuroki's prefor crossing the river.
