Montreal, May 5 .- The legal conflict in the Gaynor-Greene extradition case was continued today, and resulted in another adjournment. A week ago the case had adjournment. A week ago the case had got to the stage where the prisoners were ordered by Judge Lafontaine (extradition commissioner) to put up their defense or be extradited. In the meantime, their lawyers had appealed to the Quebec court on several points, all of which have since been thrown out. The prisoners had secured adjournment until today in order to await the Quebec decision. The lawyers for the defense put up a strong fight for liberation on bail, which was strongly opposed by the representatives of the United States Government. HAILSTONES INCHES THICK

Sudden Downpour Does Great Damage to Grand Rapids, Mich.

Grand Rapids, Mich., May 5 .- Damage estimated at over \$100,000 was worked at noon yesterday by the most terrific hailstorm that ever visited Grand Rapids and vicinity. Thousands of dollars' worth of glass in greenhouses and in skylights and windows in down-town buildings was shattered by the downpour. The hailstones were larger than ever before fell in Grand Rapids. Many were picked up that measured several inches in diameter. Almost an inch of rain fell in the space of about eight minutes, and the thermometer dropped 13 degrees in as many

London, May 5. — The Tokio correspondent of the Times gives features of the Battle of Mukden, which must rank as one of the greatest feats of arms in history. The Japanese official report of March 7 contained the following: "This day our troops took about two-thirds of Likwanpau. In the afternoon a division of the enemy made a counter-attack, but after a evere fight our men held their

These few words refer to one of the nost desperate conflicts of the war. Likwanpau is a village west of Mukien nine miles. Its capture formed part of the programme assigned to Gen. Oku's army of forcing the Russians back from all their positions arything, it was slightly in favor of the southwest of Mukden, thus masking crown, Mr. Justice Meredith pointing the turning movement of Gen. Nogi's army. A brigade of the Nagoya division, under command of Gen. Nambu, attacked Likwanpau. The district is flat, affording no cover, and the ground, frozen hard, defied entrenching tools. They then saw hemselves threatened with a complete failure of ammunition. They had their fallen comrades, and had used even the rifles and ammunition of ion headquarters, but the regiment was surrounded. Its fellow-regiment, upon which the maintenance of comnunication depended, had been borne back by sheer weight of numbers. It is taken for granted by the press and public that Hon. C. S. Hyman will be offered the vacant portfolio of the public works department. We do not know whether this is so or not, but it would be surprising if the choice did not fall on the member for London, who was discharged the duties of the office during Mr. Sutherland's long illness and has become his logical successor. Mr. Hyman long ago proved himself of cabinet rank, and as acting minister of public works has acquitted himself admirably in the estimation of the House of Commons. No suggestion is heard from a Conservative quarter that he has not earned promotion. Excepting the premiership, the Minister of Public Works has probably the most important place in the cabinet. He is head of the great spending department of the Government, and the character of the work calls for the practical ability with which Mr. Hyman is supremely endowed. He is an admirable type of the businessman in politics. He had been engaged in industrial operations on a large scale before he entered public life, and brought to parliament the kind of training which makes a useful member in a body which is principally occupied with business questions. For this reason, no department could bem ore congenial to him than the public works. Members of the House of Commons have admired his ready grasp of the duties of the office and the skillful manner in which he has handled his estimates. Prompt decision, firmness, businesslike methods and a capacity for hard work-these are qualitles which are demanded by the position, and which Mr. Hyman possesses in a pre-eminent degree.

Some Conservative newspapers throw out the taunt that Mr. Hyman will be afraid to ask re-election in London, if he receives a portfolio. They allege will seek the nomination in the safe Liberal constituency of North Oxford. Such statements are utterly base-His bitterest opponents cannot say that Mr. Hyman is a coward. A man less courageous would never have tear out the leaf? braved the odds which confronted him in the old days of Tory supremacy in London, or kept up the struggle for 20 years. When Mr. Hyman is called to higher things at Ottawa he will come to London for re-election, and come confidently. There is nothing in the situation here to warrant the insinuation that he will desert his old constituents. His opponents point to the smallness of his majority in the general election. Everyone in London knows the Liberal party suffered from overconfidence in that contest, while the Conservatives worked with unwonted energy, not because of the popularity of their candidate, or with any hope of winning, but merely to save Mr. Gray from a Waterloo, so that the result would not react on the party in the provincial election. But he Provincial Secretary and the Government cannot evade responsibility for this state of affairs. They have en-

couraged the spoilsmen of the party by vesting in them the patronage in each riding and by the wholesale dismissal of license inspectors. Even the poor fishermen cannot have their icenses renewed without the sanction of the local party bosses. The Provincial Secretary and his colleagues no doubt deplore the condition of things in West Kent, but it is the outcome of the spoils system which they have permitted under pressure from office-seekers. 



Assessment Commissioner Grant is being besieged with queries regarding the workings of the new assessment act in respect of taxation for income. The commissioner has sent out blank forms to be filled in by employers, and those who are assessable for income. The employers, besides giving all information as to their own means of revenue, must also tell the salaries paid

to their different employes.

As regards this latter provision of the act Mr. Grant points out that all employers, under pain of a fine of \$100, are compelled to furnish the assessment department with a full list of its employes, and the salaries paid them within a period of ten days from the receipt of the notice and an additional penalty of \$10 a day may be collected for each day the statement is dlayed after the ten days allowed have On one other point Mr. Grant wishes

to make the business public clear. Under the act, the assessment books and all statements as to income, etc., received by the assessment department, must not be shown to any person or persons except by order of a court of law. 
