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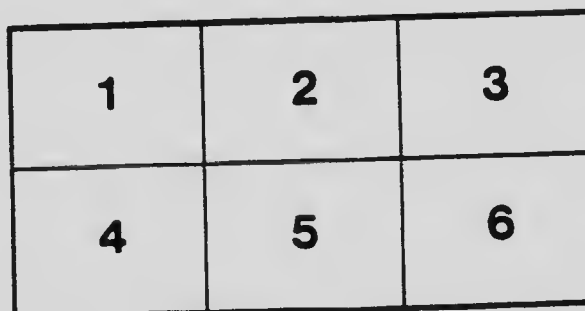
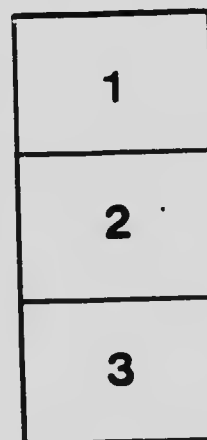
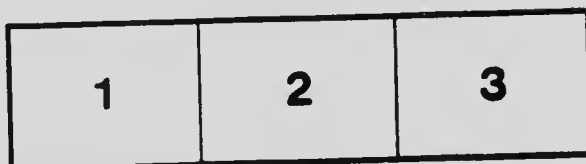

Our History



A POPULAR CORRIDOR

MYCLIFFE COLLEGE was founded 37 years ago by a group of earnest Evangelical clergymen and laymen who realized that the spiritual life of the Church of the future depended on the maintenance and propagation of the principles in which they believed. They felt that the surest safeguard of the Church was in the thorough training of its ministry in the doctrines of religion as set out in the Book of Common Prayer and based absolutely on the Word of God.

The work began in 1877 with six students in the school-house of St. James' Cathedral, under the leadership of the first Principal, Rev. Dr. Sheraton. The College was incorporated in 1879, and in

1882 a building was erected on College Street to meet the growing needs of the work. By 1885 it was necessary to enlarge this building. Again in 1890 further addition was needed, but it was deemed wiser to arrange for a new building and a new site. This was the beginning of the present College structure. Further additions have been necessary from time to time. In 1902 the Library and Convocation Hall were added. In 1908 and again in 1911 more necessary student accommodation was provided. In the latter year the handsome new chapel was built and also a residence for the Principal.

All this development has gone on without incurring any debt, and the equipment as now complete for present needs, stands without any financial liability. We are however, dependent wholly upon public support for the carrying on of our work, since government funds provide for less than half the annual cost of maintenance.

In the 37 years of our history nearly two hundred and sixty graduates have been prepared for the sacred Ministry.



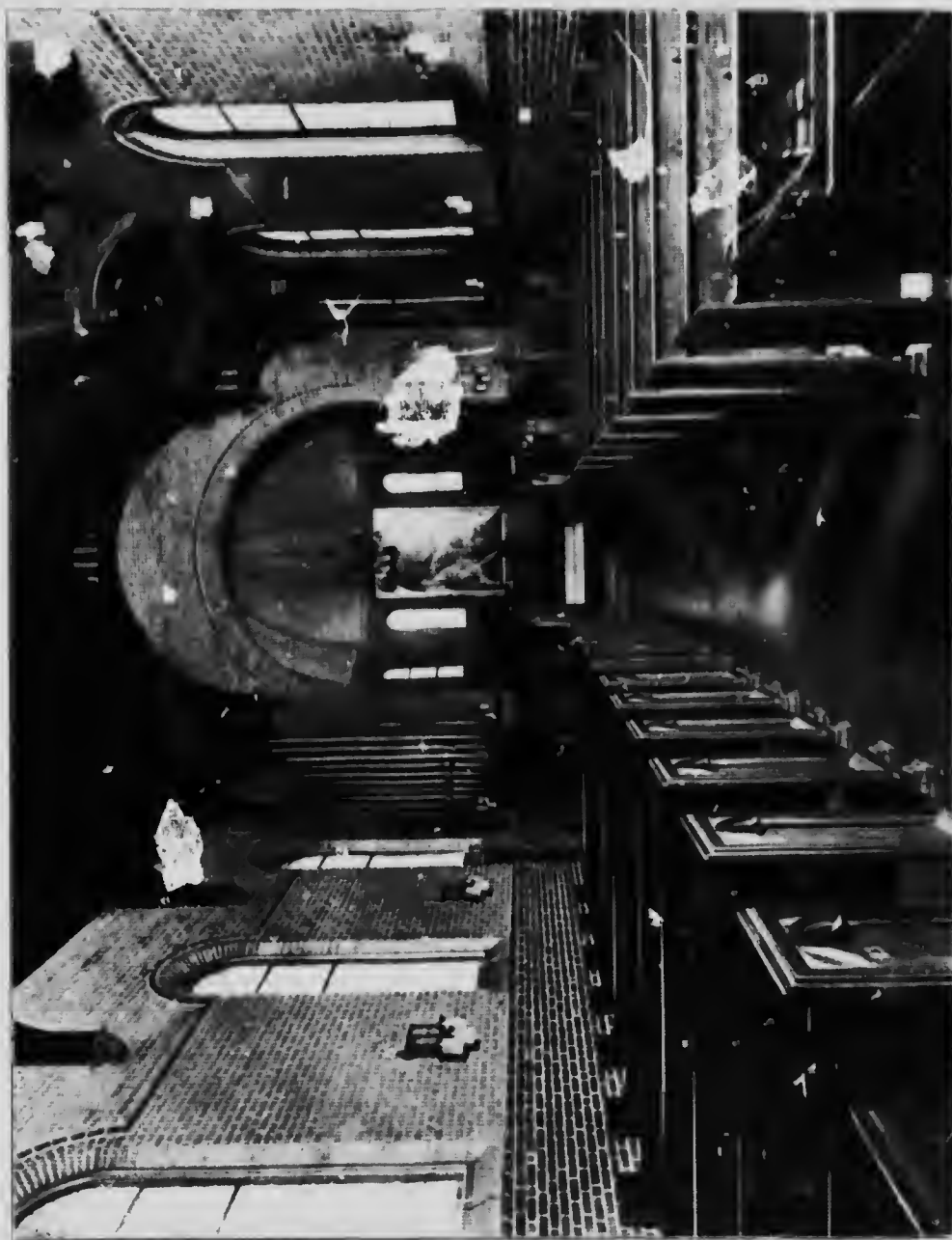

Theological Colleges of our Church, on an equal basis with those of other centres of Educational and Church life in Canada. Its graduates are received by all the Bishops as candidates for Holy Orders. The Primate and many of the Bishops are Visitors of the College. The course of study throughout the period of training is so arranged as to lead up to the examinations for the degrees of B.D. and D.D., set by the Board of Examiners of the General Synod, upon which body Wycliffe College appoints its representative from year to year.

From its relationship with our Provincial University, Wycliffe College derives great advantages.

1. THE OFFICIAL STATUS—In 1885 Wycliffe College was, by statute of the University Senate, confirmed by the Governor-in-Council, affiliated to the University of Toronto. In 1889 the College was, by Act of the Ontario Legislature, federated

and made a constituent part of the University. Wycliffe elects annually three representatives on the University Senate.

2. UNIVERSITY COURSE IN ARTS—The teaching of the entire curriculum in Arts, including the General Course, and the fifteen Honour Courses of Classics, Philosophy, Modern Languages, Scientific Languages, etc., (see University Calendar), is provided by the University, and is open to every student of Wycliffe College.

3. COLLEGE COURSE IN THEOLOGY — With the Arts Course and general literary training provided by the ample resources of the University, all the resources of Wycliffe College can be devoted to the ad-

vancement of theological training. Moreover, certain subjects in Wycliffe College are constituted "options," and made a portion of the ordinary course required for the B.A. degree. A necessarily high uniform standard of teaching is thus required throughout all departments.

4. **UNIQUE ADVANTAGE**—Wycliffe enjoys the unique advantage of being the only Theological College connected with the University of Toronto which possesses its Residential and Teaching Equipment situated within the University Grounds.

The benefits derived from this intimate relationship with the life and teaching of the University, are self-evident. The easy access to the Staff and Lectures ; the economy of time made possible by close proximity with the University buildings (including the splendid new gymnasium in course of erection, etc.) ; and not least the influence of a life spent in common association with a large body of students—these are factors which make the position of Wycliffe College unique in opportunity for life and teaching.

Student Organizations

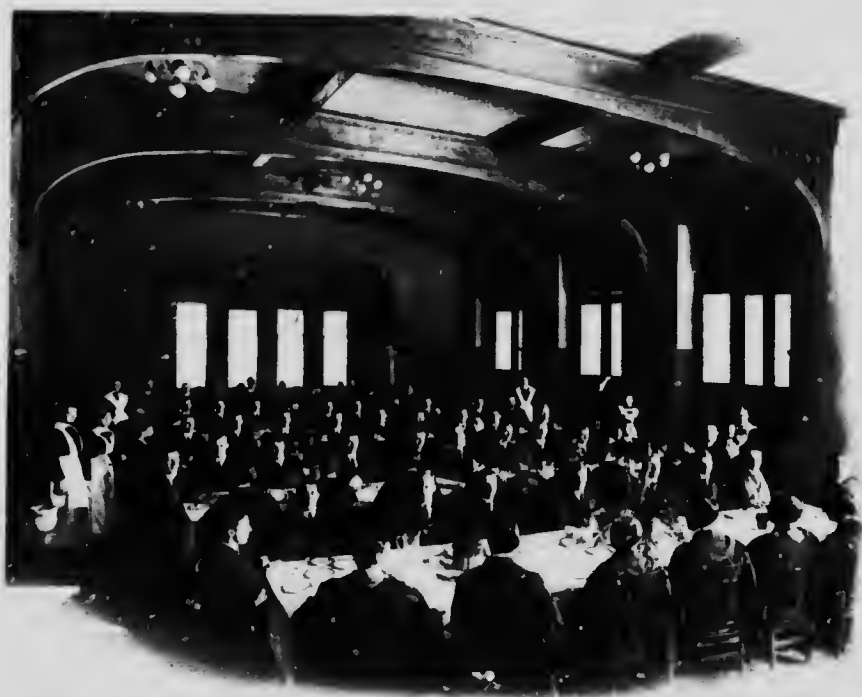
That the College life is many-sided may be seen from the various organizations existing among the students, all of which are in a flourishing condition, and which exert no small influence on College
