In the report of the Cathedral School in our last number the name of Bryan Chadwick was omitted from the list of those who had obtained over fifty per cent, in examination.

The boys of the choir, under the charge of Mr. Matthews, have been in camp near the lake shore about four miles from Niagara-on-the-Lake for the past three weeks. We need hardly say that their absence has been greatly felt on the two past Sundays, but it is impossible not to recognize that their services during the year have fully entitled them to the holiday.

The Rev. B. C. H. Andrews has gone out of town for about three weeks. During his absence his place in St. Alban's is to be taken by the Rev. E. N. English, M.A., of Huron College.

Robert Arthur Colclough has been appointed sexton of St. Alban's, and entered on his duties on 1st August. During the preceding month, while the position was vacant, Mr. John J. Parry attended to such of the duties as could not be dispensed with.

The Tennis Club lately established seems to attract a good many to the neighborhood of St. Albans, where we have noticed as many as thirty members of the Club and their friends assembled for practice in the evening. On a recent Saturday afternoon the Club held a tournament, in which the winners of the semi-final games were Mr. George Howland and Miss E. Toque, and Mr. Grayson Smith and Miss Pechell, the latter two being the final winners.

The Bishop has had a narrow escape from a serious calamity in his family, his younger son, Mr. Charley Sweatman, with two young friends, Miss Kemp and Mr. Harry Ardagh, having been upset in a squall, while sailing in a small boat, about a mile and a half off the Eastern gap. Clinging to the boat they soon found that, although they discarded everything possible, even to a good portion of their clothes, the boat was not able to support all three, when Mr. Charley Sweatman desired the other two to hold out while he would take his chances in an effort to reach the shore by swimming. The steamer Lincoln passed near them, and they hailed her, but although their signals were answered by some persons on board, the steamer held on her course. They were rescued, however, by a boat which put out from Ward's, and picked up Charley Sweatman when he had only about two hundred yards further to go to reach the shore, but was completely exhausted and beginning to sink. The other two also were rescued none too soon as they could not have held out much longer.
