Tug St. George. Mr. Snowball gave his men a quarter of a holiday on Monday afternoon for the purpose of procuring their voluntary assistance in hauling up his tug "St. George." He took great pleasure in the entertainment himself.

Boston Markets. Prices of provisions at New York and Boston by latest quotations. Early Rose potatoes, \$2.75 to \$3.25 per bbl., other kinds, \$2.50 to \$2.75; Smelts (Bathurst), 15 cents per lb.; Smelt (Shepard), 12 cents per lb.; Alewives \$3.25 per bbl.; Lobsters (per doz. cans), \$1.35; Mackerel \$1.05. Large quantities of potatoes coming in from North of Ireland, England and Germany are against the speculation.

Fall Prices. The prices are now lowering in fall produce, nearly everyone is getting applied. Turnips are 90 cents per bbl., potatoes are from 95 cents to \$1.00 per bbl. Cabbage averages from 30 to 50 cents per doz. heads; Carrot Herring is \$3.50 per bbl.; Green Codfish is \$3.50 per bbl., and Fry Codfish ranges from \$2.00 to \$3.50 per quintal; Oysters \$1.00 per bbl.

Gone to England. One of our prominent fish exporters has gone to England by last steamer to ascertain if smelt can be introduced into the British market, and also, to ascertain if our salmon can be successfully kept frozen with the refrigerators already in use on the lines via Halifax.

Congregational Meeting. At a congregational meeting of St. Andrew's Church congregation held the 8th Nov. to take into consideration the advisability of retaining the present Manse property, or disposing of it, and funding the proceeds, the interest of which to be taken towards the payment of the clergyman's salary. It was decided that the Manse be repaired in the meantime, and improvements to be made when funds are collected.

Smelts. Advice from Bay da Vin, say that W. A. Loggie and J. U. Loggie, smelt mongers, were here offering good prices to contract for smelt to be delivered at Chatham Station, so the boom in smelt has commenced. These offers have been the means of giving a new impetus to the trade. Every deviation available for smelt fishing has been taken up, and large quantities of new smelt nets ordered.

Diphtheria. Mr. Wilcox buried his second child on Sunday last, which died from diphtheria, and what made it more sad was the fact that he could not attend his children's funerals, leaving a heavy attack of the same disease.

A daughter of Mr. Alfred Peterson, of the Cove, also died of diphtheria. She was seven years of age.

On account of diphtheria being in the family of one of our teachers, she has to be replaced by another for a week or two for fear of spreading the disease amongst her pupils.

A recent meeting of the London Board of Works the question of constructing another tunnel under the Thames was proposed.

The editors of Indiana are forming associations for mutual protection against advertising frauds.

Contracts are offered for large quantities of cedar, hemlock, and timber for sleepers for Montreal and New York markets.

The capital of five millions of dollars for the railway tunnel under the St. Lawrence here will be obtained through the Credit Mobilier, a new French company with a capital of twenty-five millions of dollars, to be spent in Canada in promoting legitimate and promising enterprises of all kinds.

The Government steamer La Cascaeniens went ashore early on Thursday morning on White Island reef, in the Lower St. Lawrence. It is expected that she will be safely floated off.

The trial of Lefroy, charged with the murder of Mr. Gould in a train on the London and Brighton road some time ago, began at Maidstone. The prisoner, who exhibited an impressive demeanor, pleaded "not guilty."

France is said to have demanded from Russia an explanation of the arrest in the latter country of three Frenchmen alleged to have been found with compromising documents in their possession.

His Excellency, the Governor General sailed in the "Samarian" for England on Friday last. Prior to his departure from the capital, he was presented with an address by the Mayor on behalf of the citizens, the ceremony taking place in the City Hall, which had been decorated for the occasion.

When a golden chance is offered, there is always a temptation to let it pass. It is generally credited with controlling over twenty millions. The shares of the institution have risen during the seven years from five pounds, the original value, to eighty-five pounds. It is not capitalists alone who are making haste to be rich, but politicians and members of the learned professions, down to the "gamins," all classes and conditions of men are speculating. "With such prices in the market," says the London Spectator "all industry seems tame, and, from the highest to the lowest, all are speculating; while, as in France, most enterprises can be affected by the State, the solicitations, offers and direct bribes to politicians know no limit. The politicians are crazy for quick fortunes, nearly every journal is influenced by speculators, and if a war with England would pay a war cry would be raised." Rochester has charged Gambetta and other prominent politicians with having brought about the war in Tunis with no other object, than to promote the financial interests of a speculative company of which they are members. The evidence upon which the charges are based has not been published, but he has made enough public to make it apparent that they are not at least groundless. He is being prosecuted for libel, and if the prosecution persists the truth will come out. -Montreal Witness.
