



increase which has been n t'ced is believed to be the result of breid ing and not migration. This is very encouraging.

Originally the caribou returned to New Brunswick from (ue) c via the Matapedia Valley. It is believ ed that they came from the Gaspe Peninsula.

Some years ago New Brutiswick was an excellent caribou country and may be again. The animal bas a migratory instinc: and frequently changes its district of hab'tation.

A theory which is strongly supported by fact, is that with the increased number of deer; the caribon move out of the ed country





Mr. Barnjum has for years devoted whis great talents, his aggressive fighting spirit and his wealth to convincing the powers that be in Canada that they must put an embargo on the export of pulpwood if our rapidly diminish ing supply of this essential raw material is not to be carried off holus bolus, to the United States He tells us in his letter, exactly how much we Canadians are robbed off when a cord of pulpwood is exported to American mills instead of being kept in Canada to feed Canadian mills, to earn wages for Canadian workmen and to create customers for Canadian merchants. manufacturers and farmers.

As an argument, his letter is irresistibly convincing. It is well worth the study of any man at all concerned in the future of this country. But is is even more inter esting for another announcement it contains. Mr. Barnjum tells us sciemnly, that he will presently offer all his holdings in Canada for sale, because he is convinced that under our present policy, there is no future for Canadian development. It will be nothing short of a national calamity if Mr. Barnjun carries out his threat-and he is a man of his word. Coupled with the recent tragic loss of Sir William Price, it would deprive us of the two most outstanding figures in the fight for forest conservation. What is needed is an immediate embargo on the export of pulp wood-which will automatically stop the threatened export of Frank Barnjum







> Officials of the provincial Depart ment of Agriculture are investigating an unusual situation which has last year a drop of 55 per cent.

A most encouraging example of what can be accomplished by coordinated effort in the prevention of fires is contained in the repor issued by W.K. Keeson. Director of Insurance of the Canadian National Kailways, on the result of the prevention week c ampaign on the lines of the National System in Canada and the United States This report shows that during that week only three fires were reported on the whole of the 23,000 miles of the system, that caused losse in excess of \$10,000. This contrasts

ing period last year. Mr. Keeson in his report says: "Duing and immediately prior to fire prevention week approximately 3000 agents of freight and pasenger stations, located at points which car be but seldom visited by the insur ance departmen't inspectors, made a self-inspection of the buildings under their charge and prepared a report on forms which were designed both with the object of calling to the agents' attention those fire hazards which are the most common source of fire, and the best means which might be taken to prevent or com bat them, and also, to furnish the company with information as to the condition of these buildings. "It should b a matter of encours gement and satisfaction to the of ficers and employes of the Canadian National Railways to know that dur ing fire prevention week only three fires, causing losses in excess of \$10,000 were reported on the entire Canadian National system, including the Grand Trunk Western Lines as contrasted with 11 fires during fire prevention week in 1923. When the size of the Canadian National System is taken into consideration this is about as near to a 100 per cent. record as it is reasonably possible to attain.

"While the company with the assistance and cooperation of the officers and employes, has been en deavoring to develop its fire fighting resources, the matter of prevent ing fires has not been overlooked, and as evidence that the effort pu forth in this direction is now start ing to pay dividends, it may be mentioned that the fire losses for the first six months of this year amount to \$197,659 as contrasted with \$4f5448 for a similar period,

Jondon Ost 8-Great Britain's first Labor Government virually came to an end at 11 o'clock to night when by a combination of Conservative and Liberal votes the House of Commons carried a motion demanding that a select committee of the House investigate the action of Attorney General Sir Patrick Hastings in withdrawing prosecution in the case of the Com munist, James K. Campbell acting editor of the Workers Weekly charged with inciting His Majesty's forces to sedition.

The Government declined to accept the motion and treated it as a vote of censure which if adopted by the House would involve an ap peal to the country against Parlia ment's verdict. The debate was sharp and exciting and after it was closed the Opposition wanted to drop Sir Robert S Horne's motion of censure and vote on Sir John A. (Simon's amendment callingf or an investigation. On the Govern ment's refusal to accept this coursthe House divided on the question as to which it should vote on. By a vote of 359 to 198 it was decided to vote on the Simon amendment This was equivalent to the defeat of the censure motion and . the Simon amendment became the substantive motion and was caried 364 to 198.




# PRESBYTERIAN CONGREGATIONS **ASKED TO VOTE**

In cases where the congregation is not financially able to do so, there will be aid given by a special fund.
