We were under sealed orders, which on being opened, proved to be instructions for us to go to Vicksburg, and there take on 300 wounded soldiers and transfer them to Louisville. Our down trip was unattended by anything more than a stray shot now and then from the guerillas in the thicket. be stopped: Our crew consisted of a full complement of officers, fifteen men on deck, and 100 soldiers as a consort to guard us against an attack from the enemy. When we were safely moored at Vicksburg carpenters were set to work converting the boat into a hospital. All things being ready we backed out with our 300 Confederate soldiers, that were being taken to a Northern hospital. Our voyage was unusually quiet, the woods seemed less dangerous than at any time since the war, no shots having been fired at us since our downward trip. We were at the foot of Island Thirty-seven when the incident occurred that prompted me to write this sketch, an incident that caused my blood to almost freeze in my veins as my fancy wanders back to the
