



principle of these resolutions into law by means of statutory enactments is a condition not only of our usefulness, but even of our effective existence. (Cheers.) I said, speaking on behalf of my colleagues and political friends in December last, before the election, at the Albert Hall—I have not a word to withdraw or to explain—(cheers)—I said it was idle for us here to hold office unless we could secure safeguards—the safeguards which experience had shown to be necessary for the legislative utility and honor of the party of progress.—(Cheers.)

"It is for these reasons and on behalf of the Government that I think if not only convenient but necessary to give notice to the House and the country, now that these resolutions are passing to the control of another people, of our future intentions. If the Lords fail to accept our policy or decline to consider it when it is formally presented to that House we shall feel it our duty immediately to tender advice to the Crown—(prolonged Ministerial cheers)—as to the steps which will have to be taken if that policy is to receive statutory effect in this Parliament. What the precise terms of that advice will be—(Opposition laughter, cries of "Ask Redmond," and some uproar)—what the precise terms of that advice will be will, of course, not be right for me to say now. But if we do not find ourselves in a position to ensure that statutory effect shall be given to that policy in this Parliament we shall then either resign our offices or recommend a dissolution of Parliament.—(Loud Ministerial cheers.) And let me add this, that in no case can we recommend a dissolution except under such conditions as will secure that in the new Parliament the judgment of the people as expressed at the elections will be carried into law." (Loud Ministerial cheers.)

## T. P. O'Connor Tells About the British Political Situation

Chicago, April 20.—Mr. T. P. O'Connor cables the following to the Tribune:—

"As was bound to be the case sooner or later, the King is now freely brought into the struggle between the House of Commons and House of Lords. No party wants to do so, but in the end every party probably will have to do so. The King hates the whole business, and this was one of the many reasons why he so strenuously objected to the rejection of the Budget by the House of Lords last year.

"He is a very shrewd man, taught by the long years of apprenticeship he had before he came to the throne to understand thoroughly the people over whom he rules. He has a keen instinct of how ugly they can be when they get into a big fight, and he realizes that if he is compelled to take a side in a struggle so bitter as that between the Commons and the Lords, he is sure to get some very hard knocks.

### Ministers in Quandry.

"It is a sign of the times that the Prince of Wales is coming down to either the one House of Parliament or the other more frequently than his father ever did before him. He evidently is trying to spell out the situation for himself, and everybody knows that he also is very anxious. The throne of England is much too pleasant a heritage to be subjected to any risks.

"On the other hand, the members of the Liberal Ministry are in no happier frame of mind about the position into which they are drifting. Many of them have no desire to embroil the throne in the conflict, for they believe the throne to be a necessary element of British institutions. They also shrink from even the appearance of doing anything which might seem wanting in taste or consideration to the King. And those who take a more cold blooded and less chivalrous view of the situation feel on the other hand that a quarrel with the King is bad electioneering.

### Haldane and the King.

This state of mind creates one of the difficulties of the situation. What is going to happen when the House of Lords rejects or shelve the veto resolutions? What will Mr. Asquith then do? He is bound not to go on holding office unless he is able to tell the Liberals and the Irish that he has got from the King the means of carrying the veto resolutions into law. But can he, will he, ask the King to give the guarantees?

The general impression is that he will not do so, or that if he does ask for guarantees he will ask for them, as the popular phrase in private is, with his tongue in his cheek. Indeed, one of his own colleagues already has given the case away. It is an eloquent sign of the internal dissensions by which the Cabinet—as, indeed, with most Cabinets—is divided that Mr. Haldane, the War Minister, should have spent his few days' vacation at Easter time in trying to make things hot for his own colleagues and as easy as possible for the King. He has described the result of the last general elections as indecisive.

### An Indecisive Verdict.

This is to give away the whole case. This is what the Tories have been contending. And except from the Tory point of view, the statement is not true. A majority of 120 votes, which is what the Ministry has, according to precedents of English history, is a big, even a huge majority. When Gladstone had it he was able to revolutionize half a dozen things. When Disraeli had it he was master for a while of the destinies of Europe. The only criticism of this huge majority which can be made is that it is not homogeneous—that is to say, that seventy-two of those who compose it are Irish Nationalists. But this is an argument that does not lie in the mouth of a home rule Liberal.

Why, then, did Haldane use such language? The purpose is plain: it is to save the King. How can Mr. Asquith go to the King and ask for guarantees to carry a resolution by the revolutionary method of creating 500 new Peers if the nation has only given an indecisive verdict in favor of the Ministry against the Peers?

## Dinner at Buckingham Palace.

### HOW THEIR MAJESTIES ENTERTAIN IN LONDON.

A State banquet at Buckingham Palace is one of the most ceremonious functions at Court. The guests, apart from Royalties, are usually composed of diplomats, Ministers in office, Leaders of the Opposition, high officials of the Household, and perhaps some distinguished foreigners who may happen to be in London. From fifty to a hundred guests are invited to a State banquet, the invitations being issued by the Lord Chamberlain, in the form of a command, usually five days beforehand. A recipient of such an invitation need not answer it unless he is unavoidably prevented from accepting it, when of course an apology must be sent to the Lord Chamberlain.

Dinner is served in the State-dining-room at a quarter to nine, but all the guests are expected to be assembled by eight-thirty.

When a dinner guest arrives he is ushered first of all into a cloak-room by a groom of the chambers on the first floor, where he leaves his hat and coat, and is then shown into one of the large reception-rooms (usually the Green Drawing-room), where the guests await the arrival of their Majesties.

Two equies are present to receive the guests, who arrange the order in which they will go into dinner; this is a matter settled by the Master or Marshal of the Ceremonies, a copy of his instructions being given to each of the equeries.

A minute before a quarter to nine the King and Queen enter the room, the guests curtsying and bowing as they enter. Their Majesties then at once lead the way to the apartment where dinner is served.

At a large banquet the King and Queen sit at one table at the head of the room with any Royalties and members of the Diplomatic Corps who may happen to be present, and the remainder of the guests at separate tables ranged in rows below the Royal table. The tables are round and six sit at each. The floral decorations are a notable feature: in the centre of each table is a massive silver bowl filled with white flowers, and opposite each guest is a flower-holder containing a small bunch of very rare blooms, such as orchids or forced roses. These tables are all lighted by electric lights from overhead, which shed a soft glow through pink coloured shades.

At these State banquets the massive Georgian silver dinner service is used, and an exquisite service of clear crystal tumblers and wine glasses which has been immensely admired by those visitors to Buckingham Palace who can appreciate their rare beauty. There is by the way, no gold dinner service in the possession of the King, although the celebrated service at Windsor Castle has been frequently so described. The late Sir Arthur Ellis once informed the writer that the service in question contained only a few gold pieces and was made in reality of silver gilt. It is, as a matter of fact, very doubtful if any person in this country possesses a gold dinner service, though several are reputed to do so.

A copy of the dinner and wine menu framed in silver is placed before each guest. On one occasion a distinguished French scientist, who was asked to dine at Buckingham Palace on the occasion of a great State banquet, informed the guests at the table at which he sat that he was making a collection of autographed menu cards, and asked them if they would sign his menu, a request that was readily granted by all at the table. Their Majesties subsequently heard of the incident, and graciously offered to add their signatures to the card—an offer that was, of course, most gratefully accepted by their guest.

A distinguished foreigner invited to a State banquet always sits at a table with some members of the Royal Household, and an equerry is specially instructed to look after him and to see that he is made perfectly at ease. The Royal servants are in full Court livery and are in charge of the Chief Groom of the Chambers, who does not wait at table himself, but merely sees that his subordinates carry out their duties properly; four servants are allotted to each table. A State banquet is rather a long affair and lasts usually two hours. On such occasions the guests generally take their departure at the conclusion of the banquet, after their Majesties have left the room.

If the King and Queen wish their guests to remain after dinner, each is informed of their Majesties' desire through an equerry. In such circumstances the guests follow the King and Queen when they rise after dinner into one of the State reception rooms, where they remain usually for half an hour until their Majesties retire to their personal apartments.

At ordinary dinner parties at Buckingham Palace, which are regularly given throughout the season, less ceremony is observed, the guests sitting at the same table with the King and Queen. Dinner is served in one of the smaller rooms and never lasts longer than an hour.



### Justice to Bell Island.

The publication of the debates is still dragging on its weary way, and to-day we are furnished with the official report of the debate on the Bell Island Ore Tax.

Although late, eight weeks old, it affords us another opportunity of directing attention to the plea of justice advanced by Mr. J. M. Kent on behalf of Bell Island, which was cavalierly brushed aside by the Premier. Mr. Kent said: "I would like to see in this Bill, before it passes through the House, some clause or section which will apportion a part of the money received from the companies to the local needs of Bell Island. I have referred to the matter before and have pointed out that this royalty is coming entirely from that small island. All the work and labor on the island is done by men in the employ of the companies, but the public conveniences there are totally inadequate and insufficient for the large number of men employed there and business affairs conducted there. As a matter of fact, the per capita distribution of money for road work and marine work on the island is based on the number of residents there before the opening of the mines. Those who live on the island all the year round, who use its works for their business and other purposes, but who belong to other districts, are not considered in the grants, but their proportion goes to the districts to which they belong. The result is that the island does not receive an adequate allowance for the upkeep of its public works. I think the Government should, in justice to the people of Bell Island, earmark a portion of the revenue derived from the companies for the local works on the island. We are told that one of the reasons justifying the Government in the recent contract for the construction of railways is this tax received from the mines on Bell Island. It is not fair that this special revenue from Bell Island should be

for the interest of railways elsewhere. I think that at least ten per cent. of the money received by the Government from the mines ought to be given towards the upkeep of the public works of the island."

### Schooner's Quick Run.

The schr. *Christie*, Capt. C. Thomey, arrived here last night molasses laden from Barbadoes to A. S. Rendell & Co. after the remarkably quick run of 12 days. The vessel had fine weather and fair winds the whole voyage. She left Barbadoes at 8 a.m. on the 18th inst. The vessel made the quickest run from Cape Race ever recorded. Passing that point at 4 p.m. yesterday she had a gale of wind after her, and was in the Narrows at 8 p.m., just four hours after passing the Cape. This vessel is a clipper and was formerly the American fishing smack *Golden Rod*, purchased by Mr. Moulton and altered. Only one vessel, the *Grace Carter*, made this trip in similar time. It is said, however, that a Harbor Breton vessel did the 2,000 miles in 7 days some years ago. But the Thomey's hull under the water line was dirty, Capt. Collier thinks he would have reeled off 14 knots and performed the voyage in 10 days.

### Firemen Photoed.

At 4 p.m. yesterday most of the firemen of the Central, Eastern and Western Stations were photographed by the two representatives of the London Daily Mirror now here. I. G. Sullivan was present at the Central Station when the manoeuvres took place, and the men under Chief Dunne and Chief Winsor had with them the two steam engines, chemical engine and three hose waggons. They lined up in the Barracks Square and brought their apparatus from that point down Military Road as if responding to an alarm. Excellent views were obtained and we hear that these will be reproduced some months hence in some of our motion picture shows.

### The Beothic's Salvage.

Negotiations are now in progress between the owners of the S. S. *Beothic* and the underwriters of the Brick in connection with the salvaging of the latter ship by the former in bringing her from the icefields into port in a disabled condition. We learn that an offer of \$10,000 has been made, but that the owners and crew of the *Beothic* will not accept and ask for \$12,000. The matter should be finalized by the middle of May.

**SEALERS RETURN HOME.**—The S. S. *Louisa* sailed at noon to-day for Bonavista, Westleyville and Greenspond with the crew of the *Beothic* and Capt. Geo. Barbour and Job Kean.

### Improvements at Bell Island.

The big boiler house which is being built out on the pier at Bell Island by the N. S. S. Co., is 90x60 feet, of brick with an iron frame and 36 feet high. In it will be installed a large and powerful boiler for driving heavy machinery and new, higher and improved cars are now being constructed for carrying out ore from the pits. The cars will take 25 tons, whereas those at present in use take only 1 1/2 tons. The D. I. S. Co. are erecting heavy trestles with timbers 12x12 inches of pitch pine to bear the added weight which will go over the line when the new cars are completed. There is a big boom at present at the island.

# Cable News.

## THEODORE'S LATEST BOOM.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
THE HAGUE, April 29.—Theodore Roosevelt was received here at midnight with astonishing demonstrations. The masses were waiting at the railway station, and when he alighted from the train they swept him along toward his carriage. The police were powerless to check the violent rushes in which numbers of persons were thrown to the ground. The great orderly assembly of townspeople, cheering and waving the Stars and Stripes and handkerchiefs, remained outside long after Col. Roosevelt had entered his hotel. Finally he came out on the balcony and bowed, then withdrawing. The crowd, however, remained some time afterwards singing patriotic songs, and then dispersed. Altogether Col. Roosevelt's visit to-day to the land of his forefathers was a notable one.

## HEAVY FIGHTING.

SERIOUS LOSSES.  
Special to Evening Telegram.  
CONSTANTINOPLE, April 29.—The Turkish forces have not succeeded in dislodging the Albanians who hold a strongly fortified position in the Kackhank Pass. Sherifet Pasha commanding the Turkish troops lost 200 killed or wounded Tuesday, and their waiting for reinforcements, he opened fire with a view to having the rebels surrender. This failing, he again opened an attack Thursday night and the battle proceeded throughout the night and well into the next afternoon. The Albanians contested every foot of ground in force. The losses on both sides were heavy. The situation is serious.

## FINANCE ACT IN FORCE.

LONDON, April 29.—The Budget which had kept politics in a turmoil during the past year received the royal assent this morning. It is coming into force on the anniversary of its introduction. The House of Lords and the House of Commons met in formal session to-day, not more than a dozen members being present. It bears the Royal assent read. Both houses adjourn until May 26th.

## A STRANGE ORDER.

ST. PETERSBURG April 29.—The Cabinet to-day revoked the order of the Minister of Commerce which called for a strict enforcement of the law limiting to 15 per cent. the proportion of Jews admitted to the Commercial Schools and authorized the admission temporarily of Jews to the proportion of 45 per cent. The Commercial organizations have protested against the minister's order, citing the fact that the Jews were strong financial supporters of the schools.

## NEWMARKET RACING.

The 1000 guineas stake of 100 sovereigns each for 3 year olds distance one mile, was won by Ninkipoo, a foal of sorrel, with second and Rosaline third. 11 horses ran.

## NEGRO LEADER DEAD.

HAVANA, April 29.—Martin Morua Delgado, Secy. of Agriculture in the recently reconstructed Cuban Cabinet and former President of the Senate, died last night. He had been in ill-health for some months. He was 65 years old and was the most prominent Negro Leader in Cuba.



### Mr. Fred. Fitzpatrick

#### CONTESTS THE CIVIC ELECTION.

Mr. Fred. Fitzpatrick, grocer, of the West End, makes his official bow to the civic electors of St. John's in another column of to-day's Telegram. He therein sets forth some of his views and ideas and solicits the influence and support of the citizens towards his successful return as a Municipal Councillor. Mr. Fitzpatrick is a man of independent means which position he has attained by energy and brains, combined with an honesty which has won him a first class reputation in all his dealings with the business community of St. John's. Besides being a property holder of no inconsiderable extent, he is also a shareholder in many of our manufacturing and other industries, notably in several of our steel rolling firms, the Standard Manufacturing Co., the Imperial Tobacco Co., and others, so that in seeking a position at the Council Board he is not actuated by any selfish desire for personal profit but to conserve the taxpayers' interests, to guard against extravagance and to bring about such reforms as would meet with public approval.

### Meeting of City Council

The regular weekly meeting of the City Council took place last night. All the Councillors were present. Mr. W. G. Dryer sent in a complaint that the new excavating on the sidewalk had undermined the fence. The Road Inspector will be asked to attend to the matter. Dr. Macpherson sent in a letter in reference to the water having been turned on at Mr. Karpov's house, Gower Street, and the damage caused thereby. Water Inspector Donnelly reported that the water was turned on.

Harvey and Co. asked for use of hydrant on their premises to sprinkle same and fill water cart. They offered to sprinkle the cove in return for the privilege. The Council refused to let the hydrants go out of their own control. The Council will do what they can to accommodate the applicants but will have to do everything possible to conserve the water supply in view of the possibility of a long continuance of dry weather.

Mr. W. G. Dryer sent in a complaint that the public right of way from Duckworth Street, near where the Clothing Factory bought ground, had been closed up. The Council will make an enquiry into the complaint.

R. A. Squires asked that the drains on Bannerman Street be cleaned up. The Sanitary Department will make enquiries.

It was ordered that Central Street be cleaned up.

The Horwood Lumber Co. ask that a sewer running through their lumber yard be closed up.

Messrs. Sampson and House say they drain their houses on Robinson's Hill by a septic tank.

J. J. St. John complained about refuse matter being dumped at the rear of his land. The Council will be willing to co-operate with him in preventing a continuance of the practice provided the owners of the land there will build a wall as expected. It is open to Mr. St. John to take action under the Nuisance Act.

The Superintendent of the A. A. Telegraph Co. asked leave to erect poles in certain streets. The Solicitor will be asked to draw up regulations on this subject, including the height of the poles.

A. W. Martin wants compensation for land taken on Hamilton Street. He will be made an offer.

H. Relace and J. Walsh applied for positions in the employ of Council steam roller and Sanitary Department. Deferred for consideration.

E. Butler wants water supply at

### Dunford Street. Engineer will deal with the application.

Steer Bros., who are about to erect a building at the Municipal Basin, Murray's estate, asked for a supply of water, also a paved roadway 12 feet wide across the sidewalk for entrance to the building. The Council will send a plan of alterations to sidewalk and will inform them that the alterations will have to be made at their own expense.

Mr. Harris, of the C.C.C., asked for water service to the Armoury, Harvey Road. The request was granted.

J. W. Leary, Dunford Street, wrote to say that he had not yet water in his house nor had he done any plumbing.

Messrs. Angel & Co. want to build a steel one storey building near Radford's, Water Street West. They will be asked to send in plan.

Messrs. B. Gannon, Pennywell Road, and J. Woodruff, Power Street, had house plans approved on condition that they build stone or concrete walls beneath them.

Mr. McKelvey will be allowed to use the store in rear of the Army and Navy Depot for a laundry on certain conditions.

Some residents of Hamilton Street, who were annoyed by the Water Inspector, were written to by pay up. Rennie's Mill Road will be repaired.

Closets will be erected in the Parks and policemen will be stationed there the coming season.

Residents of Water Street, Queen Street, Prescott Street, Bond Street and Duckworth Street, who have not yet connected with the sewer will be given one month's notice to do so.

After the accounts and estimates of the week were passed the meeting closed at 1.30.


