Blind Trout in Frozen Lake.

Fourteen years ago rainbow trout were put into the Sagistalee, a lake lying at an altitude of 6,000 feet above the sea, in the Bernese Oberland, not far from the Faulhorn. The fish are said to have bred in the lake, but two-thirds of those caught are more or less blind. As the lake is frozen an average for eight months out of the twelve, and the ice covered deeply with snow, the London "Fishing Gazette" suggests that the complete darkness which reigns below is the cause of the blindness, but Dr. Hofer, the great authority on fish biology, is of opinion that it is more likely to be caused by eye-parasites, which are often found in lakes. He says an examination of the trout would soon settle the point.

 strains of Mendelssohn's Wedding

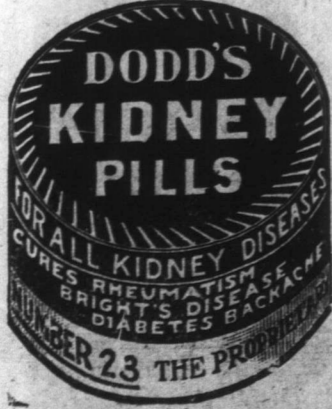
March gave a very nice finish to

The Pulp and Paper Question

The Central Shareholder, which is a financial journal of standing, has a notable article recently dealing with this important subject. It points out that during June, in the United States and Canada, new companies interested in paper manufacture were organized with a total capitalization of \$20,000,000. Including paper dealers, printers, publishers and other allied interests, the total capitalization was almost \$50,000,000, and the largest portion was in Canada. Six new Canadian paper companies alone had an aggregate capital of \$11,500,000, while eleven others increased their capital stock by \$7,550,000. The Shareholder therefore says:—

"These developments and changes, taking place in connection with the pulp and paper industry show that reciprocity is already being discussed and that manufacturers of these commodities are preparing for the increased business which is expected to come from closer trade relations between Canada and the United States. There is not the slightest doubt but that Canada will become the great paper manufacturing centre on this continent. This country has the pulp wood, the water power and the labor necessary to make her the leading manufacturing country. That business men both here and abroad recognize this is shown by the fact that during the past month seven pulp and paper companies were incorporated with a capitalization of over \$25,000,000. It looks very much as if Canada intended not only to cater to her own wants in the paper trade, but to capture the export business from the countries which have previously held this monopoly. Recent statistics published by American paper men showed that Canada could manufacture paper much cheaper than was possible on the American side of the line. With the new mills going up and the increased output, which will take place, Canada will become a serious competitor of the established American mills and eventually capture the paper trade of that country."

The Shareholder quotes figures to show that the United States is importing more pulp and paper and less pulp wood from Canada. We quote again:—

"Recent statistics show that there has been a substantial increase in the imports by the United States of Canadian manufactured news print paper. There were, all told, imported into the United States during the eleven months ended May 31st last, 104,371,392 lbs., valued at \$2,265,686, of which Canada supplied 94,474,736 lbs., valued at \$1,805,843. Last year during the same period the imports were 82,828,109 lbs., valued at \$1,716,706; Canada's share being 77,086,228 lbs., valued at \$1,438,096. There was therefore an increase in the total imports of 21,543,000 lbs., and in value of \$548,000, as compared with 1910. The indications are that this will continue to increase, Canada being the big factor in the supply of newspaper. Another interesting fact is that there was less pulp wood imported during the eleven months of 1910-11 than during the 1909-10 period by 96,511 cords. This indicates that more raw pulp wood is being manufactured in Canada and less exported to the United States. Another interesting feature is that the cost of pulp wood has increased at the point of shipment from \$5.98 per cord in 1909 to \$6.34 in 1910, and \$6.37 in 1911. The quantity of wood pulp imported during the same period showed an increase amounting to 997,000,000 lbs., value at \$12,702,000, as compared with 771,000,000 lbs., valued at \$10,747,000."

"These various increases show," says the Shareholder, "that Canada is beginning again to prove a serious manufacturing centre and consequently is exporting more and less of her raw pulp wood to the United States. The information in these seven new pulp and paper mills, with a capitalization of over \$25,000,000, indicates that Canada is to become more and more an important factor in the manufacturing of paper."

STRIKES THAT HAVE PARALYSED COUNTRIES.

If all seamen decided to come out on strike, then a week of it would be enough to paralyse half the world, and a fortnight would see countless thousands dying of starvation. Few people realize, indeed, how much a country depends upon other countries for its food supplies. Luckily, it is the most unlikely thing that the seamen of the world would act in concert. But the few who have struck have forcibly brought home to many countries in England the fact that their eggs and butter and other foods are not English, for the prices of them have jumped up in a week.

France's Postal Strike.

In August, 1909, business in Sweden was almost at a standstill. A general strike was ordered, and 300,000 men were idle. Crossing to Sweden from Denmark, it was amazing to come into Stockholm. The chimneys were smokeless, there was no movement in the docks, and no noise anywhere. All labourers, practically, were out on strike, and when the fear of such a strike became a reality many families in Stockholm and other cities laid in supplies of food for a month ahead. No trams were running, no cabs, no motors, no ships were sailing. Sweden was paralysed, literally and truly.

The postal strike in France, just over a couple of years ago, upset the whole system of communication between France and other countries. For days telegrams from London to Paris were sent via New York, because it was quicker! Thousands of

Quite Helpless.

Germany was faced with her biggest strike in 1888. It gave her severe shaking, and so bitter was the feeling of the strikers that even the personal intervention of the Emperor failed to bring about a reconciliation. In a week the number of strikers had risen from 39,000 to 140,000. The military were called out and fierce fighting took place between them and the strikers, involving loss of life and limb. Eventually, after trade all over Germany had been at a standstill for several months, the strike was ended by the arrest of the whole of the principal leaders of the workers, some forty in all. Without leaders, the men submitted to terms and resumed work, after having made the Fatherland feel pretty helpless.—Tit-Bits.

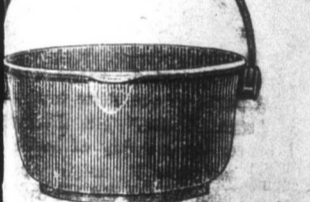

The Cow and Tuberculosis.

The final report of the Royal Commission on Tuberculosis marks the conclusion of a piece of scientific work of which it would be difficult to speak too highly either in respect of the thoroughness with which it has been accomplished, or of the caution which has restrained its findings within the limits of the ascertained. The Task Which Was Set. "The activity of the Commission has extended over a period of ten years; but during this time it has been engaged in the prosecution of a duty of the gravest importance to the community, a duty only to be fulfilled by observations and experiments conducted under conditions so framed as practically to exclude error, and continued, in many cases, throughout the lives of several generations of animals. "It was appointed at the instance of Mr. Long, in consequence of statements made by the late Professor Koch in July, 1891, at the International Congress on Tuberculosis held in London, statements which threw doubt upon the correctness of the previously accepted view that tubercle bacilli derived from human sources, and tubercle bacilli derived from lower animals (the bovine animal, for instance), were equally potent causes of tuberculosis in man. Upon this basis, indeed, regulations had been established for the prevention of infection of the human subject by the milk of the cow, or by the flesh of such animals as the ox or the pig; but Koch held before the Congress an account of experiments which led him to believe that bovine animals were practically immune to tubercle bacilli derived from man, and went on to assume the truth of the converse proposition that man is practically immune to such bovine tubercle bacilli as may be ingested by him with his food. "This contention was by no means universally accepted by the Congress, and Lord Lister strenuously protested against it; but no one was in possession of a sufficient body of experimental facts bearing upon the question, and the members of the milk and milk trades strenuously demanded that the various restrictions upon their businesses which had been framed in the interests of public health should be relaxed or abandoned. The administrative difficulties arising from discarding scientific opinions became so urgent that Mr. Long's Commission of carefully selected men of science was appointed to ascertain the truth concerning the facts in dispute, and especially to inquire and report whether the disease in animals and man is one and the same; whether animals and man can be reciprocally infected with it; and under what conditions, if at all, the transmission of the disease from animals to man takes place, and what are the circumstances favourable or unfavourable to such transmission. "The Commission has definitely reported that the milk of tuberculous cows, even when their udders are not discoverably affected, constantly contains an abundance of tubercle bacilli of the bovine type, and also that a considerable amount of the tuberculous of children can be ascribed to infection with bacilli of the bovine type transmitted to children in meals consisting largely of the milk of the cow. "The matter can hardly be suffered to rest in this position," concludes the Times. "The surrender of Lord Blyth's farms (which he loaned to the Commission), the dispersal of the trained workers who have now for several years been engaged upon them, and of the animals many of which afford examples of facts ascertained by the Commission, would be a piece of entirely regrettable wastefulness; and worse even than this, it would be a sacrifice of existing opportunities of gaining knowledge of great importance to the community. "GOOD LOBSTER FISHERY. The lobster fishery from Bonne Bay to Flower's Cove, which is now over for the season, is one of the best for several years. The size and number of the lobsters taken are in advance of the past few years. The men engaged in this avocation will make good wages.

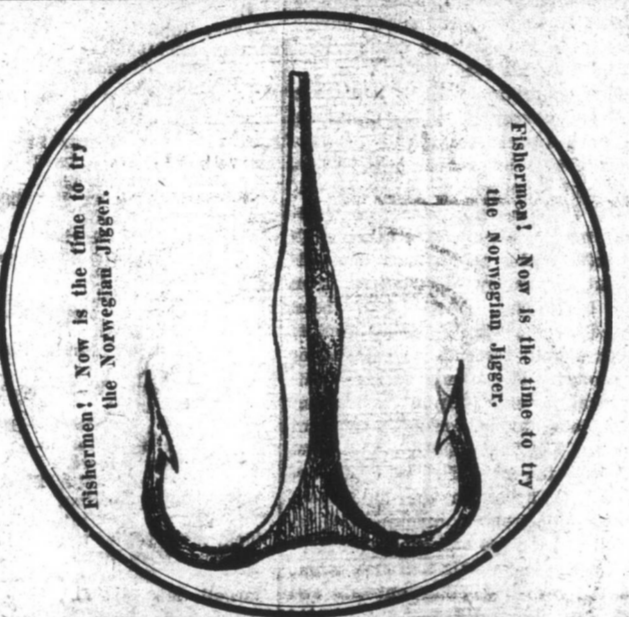

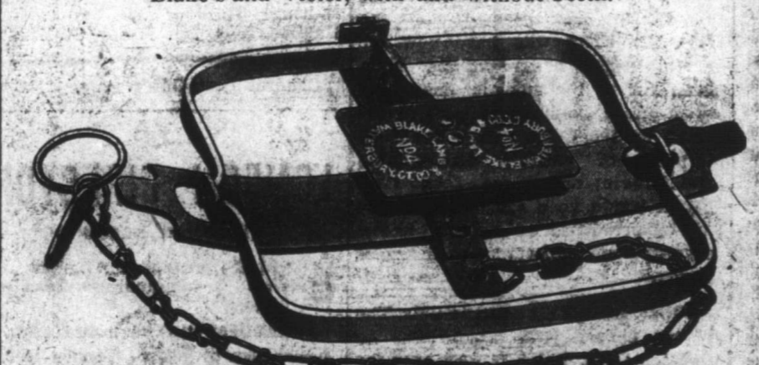
