Americans conversant with inside British sentiment feel certain that any would not only be foredoomed to failure, but would arouse the most bitter resentment of the Allies and also permanently eliminate Washington as a possible mediator.

Every indication points not only t the oneness of purpose of all the Allies to continue the war until a de-cisive peace is obtainable, but to the fact that the army, the navy and political leaders are thoroughly united in the determination to assume rensibility if necessary, for the war's tinuation after Germany is will-

HISTORY WILL TESTIFY.

If this does become necessary, they will leave it to history to justify the additional carnage in the interests of the removal of the menace of mili-

Germans Happy in Ginchy Battle.

Munsters and Dublins Had a Feast of Hand-to-Hand Fighting — German Losses Heavy—Kaiser's Men Struggled to the Last, Battallons Being Cut to Pieces—"You Old Damned Well," the Brigadler General's

London, Sept. 11.—The Irish troops who captured Ginchy seldom had a more acceptable task, telegraphs a correspondent at British Headquarters in France. The assault of this well fortified village was the kind of fighting the Irish like, bayonet thrusts, close range bombing, plenty of hand-to-hand struggles in narrow trenches. "There were fewer breathless rushes after panic stricken fugitive Germans," says the despatch, "than when Guillemont was taken. The Germans at Ginchy stood up to the Irish and did not turn tail. It was a good fight, but the Irish won it.

"They found Ginchy far better defended than they had expected. The

fended than they had expected. The village had been razed by successive bombardments, but the cellar refuges under the ruins afforded accommodation to many German infantrymen and machine gun sections. The loopholes, cut flush with the ground and cunlingly disguised, gave the Germans in the dugouts an excellent field of fire

The "Ruins of London"

(Birmingham Post.)

German prisoners, buoyed up by the airy imagination of the Wolff Bureau, are sadly disillusioned, it seems, when they find that London still stands where it did. Several days ago a wounded officer arrived at Charing Cross, manifestly cheered by the prospect of seeing London largely in ruins. His first disillusion was at the terminus itself, which he had been told was a shapeless mass; and, as he passed through Trafalgar Square and towards the West End, and his British guard in answer to repeated questionings pointed to building after building which the unverscious Wolff had declared to be destroyed, his gloom grew deeper, and he seemed a stricken man. MR. GEO. O'RIELLY.

The remains of Mr. George O'Rielly who died Tuesday night at Placentia, arrived here by train Wednesday night accompanied by his widow, niece and ccusin, Magistrate O'Rielly, and was brought to his late residence, Barnes' Road, followed by relatives and a large number of friends.

Born in Placentia, October 18th, 1853, Mr. O'Rielly was the third son of the late Patrick O'Rielly, of that place. Mr. O'Rielly later went to St. Pierre and for ten years was manager of the business of Houmbre's firm, where his genial disposition and sound business methods soon made a host of friends for him in the French city.
