PANIC IN GERMANY.

LONDON, Sept. 27. The publication in Berlin of semiofficial papers of Bulgaria's armistice request was the cause of the greatest panic in the German capital, according to advices received at Copenhagen, and forwarded by the Exchange Telegrajph correspondent there. Admiral Von Hintze, the German Foreign Secretary, according to the advices in a speech before the main committee of the Reichstag said that the difficulties of the Bulgarians between the Vardar and the Serna evidently had not been favourably explained by Premier Malinoff and the Bulgarian government, because on Thursday Bulgaria proposed to the Entente commander to open peace negotiations. There were indications, he said, that remier Malinoff's move be disavowed by later developments.

NEW ATTACK OPENED.

PARIS Sept. 28. The Allied troops began an attack on the front north of Ypres to-day, and the advance at some points has been more than two and one half miles. 



How to Fight

Fraser Macaulay, city health officer, Sydney, "is a very contagious disease and it is no uncommon thing for whole families to be afflicted with it When asked what precautions one ures, Dr. Macaulay replied that the best scheme of prevention was to fol-low as closely as possible the regular well-known rules of health:

Sleep with your windows open and air the house thoroughly at least twice a day.

Find occasion to get out of doors each day and take regular

exercise. Eat good nourishing food and drink plenty of pure water.

Keep the body built up and free of congestion.

Keep away from those afflicted with the disease. If one of the family should be taken down with the malady, see that he or she is isolated at once and do not permit other members of the family to visit the sick-room. Call in the family physi-cian and follow his instructions regarding the care of the patient

Relative to the outbreak of influenza and the precautionary measures which should be taken to prevent the spread of the disease, Bernard W. Carey, epidemiologist of the Department of Health of the State of Massachusetts, has issued the following "Influenza is a markedly infec-

tious condition, being perhaps one of the most readily transmitted by per-sonal contact of any of the infectious diseases. The incubation period is apparently from a few hours to four days. Our greatest means of pre-vention and of checking this outbreak appears to be the isolation of all perginning coryza with its inflamed eyes, discharging nose and symptoms of a beginning 'cold'. To make this effective, all persons who show any of the above symptoms should be immedi-ately sent home from their places of

"We advise that all persons ill with influenza should receive competent medical advice, and should remain in bed until fully recovered from their
