There are exceptions, such as Singapore, which is a great clearing-house. Contrast, for example, Galway and Liverpool, So far as natural advantages are concerned, Galway lies on one of the finest harbors in the world, and in the sveenteenth century, when all trade was on a comparatively small scale. Galway was a port of some consequence as ports went then. But it has no economic hinterland. Nothing lies at the back of it to feed it with outward passengers and freight, and to draw them to it from across the sea. 
