





REPARATIONS CONFERENCE AGREE TO DISAGREE.

British and French Policies Incompatible— French Press Mourn Viscount Northcliffe— German Newspapers Revile His Memory.

REPARATIONS CONFERENCE BREAKS UP.
LONDON, Aug. 14. The thirteenth Allied Conference on German Reparations broke down today, agreeing to disagree as spokesmen for both France and Great Britain put it. From the commencement the Conference seemed predestined to failure, according to the view of close observers of the situation, and these observers are of opinion that the failure was due to the incompatibility between the policies of Great Britain, and the French towards Germany. The situation appears to be that the Conference has separated without any

idea of a new Conference. The British Government insists upon a moratorium as an imperative precedent to any further negotiations. On the other hand, M. Poincaré resolutely refuses a moratorium, unless accompanied by what he calls guarantees. English critics hold that M. Poincaré feared his Parliament, and apprehended a fall like that of former Premier Briand, if he yielded to British persuasion. The situation is considered all the more serious, viewing the continuous fall of the mark and the fact that nothing whatever had been decided upon, beyond the temporary suspension of the reparations payment by Germany tomorrow. The whole question is again thrown into the hands of the Reparations Commission.

FRANCE MOURNS NORTHCLIFFE.
PARIS, Aug. 14. Viscount Northcliffe is mourned today by the French press as one of the country's best and most powerful friends. Comment of the afternoon papers, which received the news late, can be summed up in the words of the *Freiheit* Parisian:—"France saw in him a singularly ardent friend, true and faithful, who never failed her during twenty years. France cannot forget him."

GERMAN VIEW OF NORTHCLIFFE.
BERLIN, Aug. 14. German newspapers, commenting on the death of Lord Northcliffe are outspoken in their condemnation of the man, as the *Allgemeine Zeitung* designates him. "Who organized the campaign of German baiting throughout the world." This paper charges that he systematically built up a world coalition against Germany. "The blood of millions cling to his hands," say the *Pan German Tageszeitung*, who believes that Lord Northcliffe spent billions on propaganda, which eventually accomplished the entry of the United States into the world war. Viscount Northcliffe's genius as an organizer is amply recognized in German editorial opinion, although some express the belief that his influence in the press of England proved demoralizing. It is recalled that he planned to issue a daily paper in Berlin in English and secured the German government's permission in the spring of 1914.

THE POPE'S MESSAGE OF SYMPATHY.
ROME, Aug. 14. Pope Pius has sent a telegram to Mrs. Arthur Griffith, expressing profound sorrow at the death of her husband.

D'ANNUNZIO INJURED.
GARDONE RIVIERA, Italy, Aug. 14. Gabriele D'Annunzio, Italy's noted soldier poet, was seriously injured in the head by a fall on Sunday in the garden of his villa here.

PRIZE RING.
CHICAGO, Aug. 14. Kearns, manager for Jack Dempsey, and Leo Flynn, manager for Bill Brennan, to-day posted forfeits of \$10,000 each, for the appearance of their men for a boxing contest at Floyd Fitzsimmons' arena in Michigan City, Indiana, on Labor Day. Fitzsimmons posted a \$20,000 guarantee.

Feast of the Assumption A Film of Eternal Mother Love.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF ITS MEANING AND SIGNIFICANCE.

August 15th is recognized the world over as the feast of the assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The word assumption means lifting up to heaven, carrying away from earth. The assumption of the Blessed Virgin is the mystery of the happy death of the mother of God, of her miraculous resurrection, and her assumption into heaven, where, being invested with the glory of her divine son, she reigns forever, Queen of Heaven. A poor lowly Virgin, Mary was born at Nazareth four thousand years after the fall of Eve, and about 15 years before the incarnation of the Saviour. She lived in the Temple at Jerusalem with holy women consecrated to God. Espoused to St. Joseph, her relation, and the descendant, like herself, of David, Abraham and Noah, both took the vow of perpetual virginity. She passed thirty years with Jesus and Joseph in prayer and poverty and daily work. She followed Him during his three years of teaching and she was with Him through all the phases of His dolorous passion. Mary was the first, according to the Fathers, to whom the risen Jesus appeared. When the Apostles set out to teach all nations after the descent of the Holy Spirit, Mary followed St. John the Evangelist to Ephesus afterwards returning with him to Jerusalem, and there at the age of sixty-three, or some say seventy years, the Virgin Mary, surrounded by Apostles fell asleep in Jesus on August 15th (the forty-eight (or fifty-eight) year of the Christ's birth). Her sacred body was buried and laid in the Sepulchre by St. Peter and the other Apostles. They kept her raiment, and amongst other things her veil, of which a portion is said to be at the Church of Chartres in France. There is a tradition that God had permitted the Apostle St. Thomas to be absent at the death of Mary, in order that her glory might be more clearly manifested. St. Thomas arrived in Jerusalem three days after her body had been placed in the grave. Deeply grieved, St. Thomas earnestly requested to be allowed to look once more upon the much loved face of the mother of his Saviour. The Apostles yielded to his prayers and accompanied by a large gathering of Christians of Jerusalem they all went together to the Sepulchre. They opened the tomb, but what were the surprise, admiration, and rejoicing of all present, when, instead of the body of Mary, they saw the linen clothes reverently folded, and the grave filled with flowers.

Keep Away
From the Bees.

NEW YORK.—Ever since a bee census was ordered in Goshen, N.Y., metropolitan of the buzzing honey makers, tender hearted persons have been shuddering at the thought of the danger assessors might undergo in plucking each bee from its workroom or garden and counting it. But they might as well stop worrying, for W. E. Thorndyke, who knows bees from stem to dregged stern, said today that all the census takers have to do is count the hives. "Even if they did have to number each bee, it wouldn't be so bad," he said. "Some men could count them one by one and never have to use a mask. Of course, a lot would depend on whether the bees are aristocratic bluebloods or hybrids. The hybrids are usually the fierce ones. Still, when it comes to getting intimate with bees, discretion is the better part of valor."

Girls with perfume and men who use hair oil, smelly pomades or scented talcum better get out of the way whenever they see a bee coming, Mr. Thorndyke says. He has a theory that the little honey-makers just naturally dislike certain odors. When a bee likes an odor it noses right in to gather raw material for its manufacturing plant, but it turns its back on disagreeable smells. And when a bee turns its back, somebody is liable to experience discomfort. Bees have domestic troubles, too, and these often put them in a bad humor. It is to ascertain how many of the baby bees at Goshen are suffering from "foul brood" and causing worry to their queen and their papa bees that the census was ordered. Foul brood is something like summer complaint among human infants, but more devastating. It comes from impure food given during the period of incubation. The adult bees are not bothered by the disease, as they thrive whether the larva contains good food or bad. But when the queen bees get sick, then the physical strain of weakness ultimately affects the whole hive.

A Square Deal for Our Soldiers.

Shall men who used their legs to rush upon Fritz and the Turk be outdistanced in life by men, who from 1914 to 1919, sat by the office fires toasting their toes? No! We want our place in the sun as well as the rest. It is our due and we will try to get it, and when we do, to keep it. There is no happiness to which we are not entitled and no work for which we are not capable, with a little help, and exercise and training. I am sorry, Sir, to have taken up so much of your valuable space, but I sincerely hope that these words will arouse in the hearts of our merchants a little more patriotism, and they will help the boys who helped them to keep the roofs over their business places from 1914 until the Hun dropped his gun to shout "Kamarrad" to his opposers.

A late Canadian Press dispatch from Sydney as published elsewhere, declares that a one hundred per cent. strike is now on at that mining point. This means that all operatives have gone out, including helpers, as the message indicates that the office staff is keeping the pumping machinery in motion, in order to prevent flooding of mines and congestion of poisonous gases.

Our New Governor.

SIR W. L. ALLARDYCE, K.C.M.G. Sir William Lamond Allardyce K. C.M.G., is in his 61st year, and has been Governor of Tasmania since 1919. His father was an army officer, the late Colonel James Allardyce, LL.D., and his wife, whom he married in 1895 is an Australian lady, daughter of Moleworth Greene, Esq., of Melbourne. Sir William was educated at Aberdeen and the Oxford Military College. At the age of 18 he was appointed clerk and interpreter for the provisional department in Fiji. At the age of 20 he was Acting Resident Commissioner at Rotumah, and at 21 Stipendiary Magistrate in Fiji. In 1889, at the age of 23, he was appointed a member of the Native Regulation Board and a Commissioner of the Supreme Court. The next year he became Assistant Native Commissioner, and in 1893, a member of the Executive Council. In 1894 he was gazetted as Native Lands Commissioner and made a member of the Legislative Council, becoming Native Commissioner the following year. His next step was to the position of Deputy Governor of Fiji, Administrator and Acting High Commissioner for the Western Pacific. From 1902 to 1904 he held the dual office of Receiver General and Colonial Secretary. In the latter year his connection with Fiji terminated, and he received his appointment as Governor of the Falkland Islands in the South Atlantic, a position which he occupied for ten years. From 1914 to 1919 he was Governor of the Bahamas being recalled to Tasmania two years ago. Sir William has been a member of the House of Commons on several occasions, and in 1892 for the north of Scotland against Lilywhite's team. For 9 years he engaged in newspaper work, editing from 1890-1899 a native paper "Na Mata." He is also the author of a Digest of Native Regulations published 1877-1900. In 1916 he was given his Knighthood.

Nova Scotia Coal Miners Go Out On Strike

Office Staff Keeping Pumps Going--Operatives Evidently Have Refused Agreement Terms.

STRIKE IMMINENT. SYDNEY, Aug. 15. Virtually every important coal mine in Nova Scotia would be closed down to-day by a strike of upwards of twelve thousand miners of the Province, according to indications and figures available at an early hour this morning. Five thousand Cape Breton miners, at a mass meeting at Glace Bay, and at another large meeting at New Waterford last night, repudiated the agreement their officers had come to on Sunday, with the British Empire Steel Corporation, principal operators of the Province, and declared for the strike originally scheduled for to-day. All locals of Southern Cape Breton Fields, the biggest producers of Nova Scotia coal, at meetings last night, decided to strike at midnight. More than two thousand miners in Cumberland County, and twelve hundred in Pictou County, mainland coal areas, adopted the decision of the Cape Breton men. In Cumberland County, the strike call included pumpmen, but it is thought in the rest of the provinces that these will not be taken out immediately, but possibly within twenty-four hours. Strikers will demand a rate of pay about twenty-two per cent. below the wage of 1921, which miners are asking. Nova Scotia mines are enjoying boom conditions recently, as a result of the United States strike, which has not obtained since the postwar slump of 1921.

WHERE'S H. R. THOMSON? CALGARY, Aug. 15. The Premier's of Alberta and Saskatchewan have decided to abandon the Wheat Board this year, and have so informed the Federal Government. The action is taken because of the apparent impossibility of obtaining a strike acceptable to both belligerents.

Alfred Charles William Harmsworth. LORD NORTHCLIFFE.

Alfred Charles William Harmsworth (Baron Northcliffe) whose death was announced yesterday, was born July 20, 1865 at Chapelizod, County, Dublin, Ireland, his father being the late Alfred Harmsworth, of the Middle Temple, barrister-at-law, and his mother, Geraldine Mary, daughter of William Maffett, Pembroke Place, County, Dublin. He was married in 1893 to Mary Elizabeth, eldest daughter of the late Robert Milner, of Kingston, Oxford, and St. Vincent, West Indies, from which union there is no issue. In 1888, Mr. Harmsworth founded the weekly periodical, Answers, which had an immediate success. In 1894 he purchased the Evening News, and in the same year equipped at his own expense the Jackson's Expedition. Two years later (1896) he founded the Daily Mail. In the following six or seven years he and his brother started the Daily Record, (Glasgow) and acquired a number of periodical daily papers, among them being the Leeds Mercury, and the Birmingham Gazette. The taking over of the "Thunderer" (London Times) was followed by the formation of the amalgamated Press, Mr. Harmsworth was knighted as a reward for his journalistic abilities, and was created a baronet in 1904. He was an Honorary LL.D. of Rochester University, U.S.A. was Chairman of the British War Mission to U.S.A., 1917; Director of Propaganda in Enemy Countries 1918 and of the Civil Aerial Transport Committee 1917. His one personal publication was the book "The War," which came off the press in 1916.

WAR ACTIVITIES. Henry Wilson, Assistant Editor of the London Daily Mail, Lord Northcliffe's most successful publication, has contributed an autobiographical sketch of his chief to the new volumes of the Encyclopaedia Britannica of which the following extract covers his war activities:— In the World War he took the lead in advocating almost every measure of reform that was carried through in Great Britain, usually weeks or months before it was introduced. He was indeed described by L. J. Mase as "the great driving force in our country during the war" (National Review, July 1917). He was one of the most vigorous possible opponents of the struggle, and was from the first to be long and desperately contented. The chief newspaper campaigns which he carried out, always with the aim of victory and close liaison between the Allies, were: (1) the removal of Lord Haldane from the War Office in Aug. 1914; (2) for the organization of the munition sup-

Proposition of Mr. Collishaw. WORTH CONSIDERING. Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir—In connection with the proposal of Mr. Collishaw to build thirty-five houses this fall and later on 65 more for working men's homes I notice by the Halifax Chronicle of August 10th that the Housing Commission of Halifax has asked the City Council for an additional grant of \$500,000 to carry out their house-building scheme. This presupposes that they have already had a grant of money to carry on their work, and is an example that our own City Council would do well to imitate, provided of course that the proposition of Mr. Collishaw is a sound one and will not entail any undue financial risk on the City Council. This I propose to analyze as I go on. I find also by New York papers that the Housing Committee of that great city have within the past two years with the aid of civic guarantees on Bonds built houses sufficient to accommodate 500,000 people, chiefly workmen. These houses have been built after a standard plan for which the architect who drew the same received a prize of \$5,000, in a competition advertised by the City Council for the best and most economic plan of a working-man's house. They are all uniform on the inside, but the exterior latitude has been given to suit individual tastes, and variety has been encouraged to show individuality which the Council as well as the purchasers of the houses regarded very rightly as improving the appearance and enhancing the value of the houses in the total ensemble. Now it was too much uniformity on the outside that derogated from the architectural appearance of the Anderson houses and those built at Quidi Vidi Road by Mr. John Coaker for the City Council. These ranges suggest the appearance of a Government institution such as a Poor Asylum or a penal settlement. If they were detached houses with a little garden in front they would be much more attractive and inviting to the intending purchaser even if they were a little more expensive. Such houses should be built detached wherever and whenever possible wherever a new clean street can be opened. These are the kind of houses that make better citizens and give them the needed encouragement and inspiration to keep their houses, their streets and surroundings clean and beautiful. Dayton, Ohio, is the particular town in the United States that is held up as an example in this respect. It is a town of detached houses with gardens in front bordering on the public streets with beautiful shrubs and multi-colored flowers to protect which not a fence or a wall is needed. The general public spirit and the local pride in their city is the best safeguard against any depredations or encroachments of their property. This desirable state of affairs is mainly due to the "Czech Register" Mfg. Co. who have their headquarters located in Dayton, Ohio. Everyone of their large number of employees owns his own home and takes an interest in keeping it clean and attractive on the outside as well as on the inside. In this our city of St. John's we dare not even hope to ever achieve such desirable results, except in rare cases on the borders of the town, but by considering what the people of other cities have done in this direction we may be animated with the desire to attempt some measure of improvement on existing conditions. It may be possible that Mr. Collishaw is the man destined by Fate to be the pioneer in inaugurating a system that will mean better houses and cleaner streets. If his proposition is a sound one, by all means give him a chance to show what can be done. He is no theorist, but a practical man of business, a producer of lumber himself, who should know this business from the growing tree up. Being a producer of lumber for housebuilding with no middle man between him and the man who buys the finished house he does not have to charge exorbitant prices, and if any man can build a house cheaply surely it ought to be he. He has been a worker in our midst for the past 20 years. In 1920 he employed every man on the West Coast who

appointment, though with some reluctance. After an audience with the King, he left England on June 2, arriving in New York on June 11, with the understanding that he should not remain more than three months. During the next few months he co-ordinated the work of numerous British Departmental missions; controlled an expenditure of £10,000,000 to £15,000,000 a week, maintained the closest and most friendly relations with President Wilson and the American Government; and in a series of speeches and visits to the Middle West and Eastern Canada he set forth the work that had yet to be done if the war was to be won, and the immensity of the British effort. Having prolonged his stay far beyond the original three months he returned to London on November 12, 1917, when he was created a Viscount, as Viscount Northcliffe of St. Peter-in-Thames, for his services. DECLINED FOR REASONS. In a letter dated Nov. 15, 1917, he declined Mr. Lloyd George's offer of the post of Air Minister, on the ground that he was indisposed to enter the administration with the energy of which he was by no means satisfied. But on February 13, 1918, on the distinct understanding that he was to remain free to criticize and suggest he accepted the office of Director of Propaganda in Enemy Countries. To pave the way for operations in the countries subject to the Habsburgs, he secured an agreement between the Yugoslavs and the Italian Government, which played an important part in the defeat of the Austrian Army and was subsequently embodied in substance, in the peace terms. The evidence of numerous German generals, statesmen, and writers is that the skilful direction of his propaganda against Germany destroyed confidence in the German people, and weakened the German army on the eve of its last offensive (July 15, 1918) when it seemed on the verge of decisive success. Gen. Ludendorff himself says: "Lloyd George knew what he was doing, when, at the close of the war, he gave Lord Northcliffe the thanks of England for the propaganda he had carried out. Lord Northcliffe was a master of mass-suggestion. The headlines of his propaganda lay in its veracity—in emphasizing such facts as the rapid movement of the United States troops to Europe, the full force of the U-boat campaign, and the enormous captures of guns and prisoners. At the Armistice Lord Northcliffe was ill, suffering from an adenoma of the thyroid gland, for which, in June 1919, he underwent a serious operation, and it was only after some months that he gradually recovered. During the complete recovery, the Continental Daily Mail in particular, exerted a powerful influence in the British government, acting from Mr. Lloyd George a promise to fulfil his election pledges and striving to maintain the closest and most cordial relations with France. In July, 1921, he went for a prolonged tour of the world. I mention it to show that he is no amateur and that he is used to big things. He came here twenty years ago as the trusted representative of the biggest corporation in the world—the Standard Oil Co. He has been doing his best ever since to help the country of his adoption by his enterprise and it is poor encouragement that he is not because it is not a good one and a sound one involving no financial risk, and a great benefit to the citizens. MEETING AT HARBOR GRACE.

A deputation from the Newfoundland Women's Suffrage League arrived here from St. John's on Tuesday afternoon last says the Harbor Grace Standard of Friday last, August 11th, to lay before the citizens here the fairness and wisdom of the women of Newfoundland obtaining the power to vote, a right already possessed by the women of the Motherland, Canada, the United States, New Zealand and many other countries. The deputation arrived here at 3:40 p.m. in two motor-cars having left St. John's in the early forenoon. The members were, Mesdames Allan Fraser, Charles Hutton, Vincent Burke, Hector McNeil, Eric Ayre and Misses Southcott, McNeil, Crocker and Kennedy. They proceeded immediately to the Town Hall, the place of meeting. The attendance was perhaps the weak being Regatta week, to the hour being one of work-a-day operations in homes and factories, and of preparation for the forthcoming yearly picnic, was doubtless much smaller than it otherwise would have been. The chair was, on request, taken by Mrs. Higgitt who most pleasingly introduced the different speakers in turn. 

The World's Greatest Gold Reef.

Now that attention is being called to the Transvaal gold industry by the strike of the white miners on the Rand, it may be interesting to describe what the Johannesburg gold reef is really like.

Its developed area stretches from Johannesburg to Heidelberg, a distance of about forty miles, and from the top of some high buildings you may trace it clearly by the enormous mounds of white tailings, up to 3,000,000 tons in weight, that are dotted along its length.

They lie bleached and glaring in the sun, the fine dust of their surface blowing in the wind, and although attempts to grow grass upon them have been made, all have failed through the action of the cyanide with which they are impregnated.

The battery "stamps" are never silent. Night and day they are pounding up the rock, and there are certain spots in Johannesburg where you can hear them as you lie in bed in the stillness of the early hours like the regular beat of distant waves.

And sometimes too, you hear the muffled rumble of falling rocks within old, disused shafts, a rumble that shakes the house and curiously resembles a genuine earthquake. Indeed, the mine in Johannesburg itself are mostly used up, and year after year the industry shifts farther to the east.

The mines themselves are like so many self-contained towns. A large mine for instance will employ 20,000 men, and have a completeness of equipment, both above and below the surface that is astonishing.

I have travelled 3,000 vertical feet into the earth at forty miles an hour in one of these mines and have found down there elaborate pumping machinery, electric trains, a crowd of men going about their business as if on the surface.

And up above, the hoisted rock is being pounded into powder, is passing over the mercury coated slime boards, is gradually being made to give up its treasure.

And then, of course, there is the social side of the mine, the trim quarters for the whites, the native compound with its up to date kitchens and bakehouse, the hospital accommodation. Yes, such mine life, as far as possible, complete in itself.

The final thing they show you when you visit a mine is the finished article. That is to say, when you have observed the whole vast complex energy of the machine, they point out the results in a few bars of dull yellow metal.



Canadian Stamp Tax Regulations.

OTTAWA, Aug. 8.—The new stamp tax regulations are apparently not yet understood by many persons, as Ottawa business men complained today that they were receiving cheques inadequately stamped.

Some persons seem to think that a two cent stamp is sufficient on a cheque up to \$100, whereas the tax is two cents on each \$50 or fraction of that amount. Thus a cheque for \$50 calls for only one two cent stamp, but a cheque for \$75 calls for four cents in stamps, while a cheque for \$101 requires six cents in stamps. 20,000 Girl Athletes.

Paris.—France, where before the war feminine athletics were virtually unknown, now has 20,000 enrolled girls and women competing in track and field events, and from this new army a team will be selected to represent the nation in the international games in Pershing Stadium beginning August 20. The international games may result in amalgamation of the two national feminine athletic organizations whose rivalry nearly disrupted plans for the meet, one with 327 local societies and the other with 120. The Ministry of War is projecting plans for the combination. Until May 1915 French women had never organized for athletics with the exception of horseback riding, tennis, hunting and swimming. French women do not excel as sprinters but they are confident of their prowess in the middle-distance runs, and they have an exceptional performer in Madame Gouran-Morris in the weights.


