# Patronage in the Church of Scotland.

Many of our readers will remember that some six years ago the ques-tion of abolishing patronage in the Church of Scotland was freely discussed in the General Assembly of that body, and a strong expression of opinion in favour of such a step made by many leading ministers, the late Norman Macleod being prominent among the number. It was hardly expected, however, that such an important change in church gov-ernment would be carried so soon as it is likely to be; for the bill lately introduced by the Duke of Richmond in the House of Lords, to accomplish this object, will in all probability be carried, as it is supported by the Conservatives both in the House of Lords and in the House of

The Hamilton Times says:—"We regret to hear that the Great Western Railway Company have found it necessary to reduce the time of the men employed in the shops here to eight hours per day. We doubt not this step has been taken by the Management with ruch reluctance, as the Company has always endeavored to insure to its employees full work and at the best wages, but in common with most other interests at the present moment our transportation companies, both rail and steam, find it absolutely necessary to curtail their expenses in consequence, first of all, of the low margin that rates are yielding, and of the comparatively decreased tonings on the move.

"A most unheard-of thing at this time is the fact that, just after the opening of navigation, there is so little demand for transportation that large numbers of vessels are tied up to the docks at Chicago and Milwaukee, and the great East and West lines, which have all, during the past two years, been so largely udding to their facilities, find a considerable portion of their rolling stock in the side-tracks waiting for the tide, which we hope will soon turn, and with it turn all the eaglwheels and steamer-wheels with produce for the seaboard."
