THE CABLE IN THE COMMONS

Negotiations for Its Construction Are In Progress, But Will Not Be Made Public
London, Feb. 14.—In the House of Commons to-day Mr. Maurice Healy, member for Cork City, asked if it was the intention of the Government to communicate with the United States with a view of obtaining a reduction in the tariff of the country on cable mackerel.

Mr. Sidney Buxton, in reply to Sir George Baden-Powell, stated that negotiations for the construction of a cable in the Pacific cable were in progress, but it was not considered advisable at present to announce any public statement on the subject.

Mr. Thomas Ross, member of Parliament for Derby, asked the Minister if he will ask the Government what information has reached them in reference to the imposition of a protective duty upon W. H. Rickard, a British subject, for alleged participation in a revolt in Hawaii.

Mr. E. J. Harland, member for North Belfast, asked if the Government would make urgent representations to be made at Washington against any of the provisions of the Morgan-Nightingale bill, which were detrimental to British shipping interests. He also requested the Government to make representations favorable to the creation of a joint Niagara Canal commission.

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NO CURRENCY BILL WILL PASS

The Bill to Authorize the Issuance of \$50,000,000 Bonds Defeated by a Majority of Sixty-Seven
Washington, Feb. 14.—Another day's debate in the House upon the financial question has just served to emphasize the fact that no legislation affecting the financial situation is to be expected from the 58th Congress.

A week ago the House refused by vote of 102 to 135 to adopt the first Springer banking and currency bill which contained a provision authorizing the issue of long-time low-interest bonds and today by the still more decisive vote of 187 to 120, declined to authorize the issue of \$50,000,000 3-per cent. gold bonds which would place the 3-3/4 per cent. bonds negotiated with Morgan-Belmont syndicate in payment for the purchase of \$200,000,000 of gold coin. The consideration of the joint resolution for this purpose occupied all of the session. The debate followed in a general way the lines of the debate on the Springer bill last week.

Mr. Hopkins asserted that the President was not animated by patriotic motives in his desire to see the currency bill passed, but by a desire to unload upon the country the responsibility for a transaction which would result in the loss of \$200,000,000 of gold coin.
