MONTREAL, June 2.—The interdicted members of the French Canadian community of Maine in conflict with Cardinal O'Connell have been refused admission to the floor of the coming session of the French language at the University of Montreal.

Some Records Go In Philadelphia

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., June 1.—A world's record and a collegiate record were broken, while five intercollegiate records went by the board at the intercollegiate track and field championships on Franklin Field this afternoon. The Pennsylvanians won by a margin of 104 points over Cornell their nearest competitor. The New world's figures were made in the pole vault by R. S. Gardner of Yale and was the most notable performance of the meet. After he and H. S. Babcock, of Columbia had broken the intercollegiate record of 12 feet 8 1/2 inches made by Babcock last year, by going over the bar at 12 feet 9 1/2 inches, the stock was put up to 13 feet 1 inch. Though Gardner and Babcock were vaulting in fine shape, few believed that either would better it, but the Yale man on his second try cleared it and came down amid the cheers of the stands. Babcock tried three times but failed. The world's record which stood at 12 feet 10 1/2 inches, was made by S. Scott of Leland Stanford University in 1910. After winning the event Gardner tried to be higher without success. In the shot put L. Beattie of Columbia who broke the intercollegiate record yesterday bettered his throw today and exceeded the collegiate held by himself. His new figures were 48 feet 10 1/2 inches against his old figures of 48 feet 7 1/2 inches. C. D. Redpath, the speedy runner of Syracuse, lowered the intercollegiate record of 48 4-5 seconds in the quarter mile event, held by the late J. B. Taylor of Pennsylvania and D. B. Young of Amherst to 48 seconds. Redpath also came within one-fifth of a second of equaling the intercollegiate record in the 220 yards dash. In the half mile run J. P. Jones of Cornell lowered his intercollegiate record made last year from 1:54-45 to 1:52-15. P. R. Withington, the tall runner of Harvard after a terrific struggle won the two mile race and broke the intercollegiate record of 9:25-15 made by T. S. Berna of Cornell last year, to 9:24-25. Jones, holder of the mile record, failed to win that event entirely. He had it well in hand, but in the last quarter N. S. Taber of Brown university, made it a dead heat.
