Protecting the Old Fort at Annapolis.

-In the Dominion Parliament, on Mon-day, Sir Hector Langevin introduced a bill to prevent mail carriers, other than railways and steamboats, that is, contractors by horse and vehicle, from transporting with the mails—spirits for malt liquors. This bill is similar in its provisions to one drafted for-representation to the house years ago, by prohibitionists in Colchester county, Nova Scotia.
