



Refiners Say There Is Big Demand For Sugar Since Booze Supply Was Cut Off.

Ottawa.-That Canadian sugar reiners were bound absolutely as to their selling prices by the New York raw sugar prices, and that present world conditions were such that consumers must look for further increases in refined sugar prices, was the information given to the Special Agricultural Committee of the House of Commons by sugar refiners who were examined as to costs. Refiners declared that consumption in the United States had increased "enormously" and the world's supply of raw sugars appeared low. The present advances were apparently based on actual shortage. Prohibition, with the absence of alcoholic stimplants, has created an enormous demand for sugared drinks one refiner stated.




