INTERESTING ACTIONS AT LAW.

After a Defaulting Official—Will Cases Up

When the accounts of John T. Grant, then Collector of Customs at Barrie, were examined by Government officials a shortage of \$2000 was discovered. Next week the case against Grant and his sureties is to be tried at Barrie. Before the Court of Appeal yesterday application was made by the Dominion Government to have the jury struck and decision was reserved. When application was made to Justice Robertson the jury notice was struck out. This decision was subsequently reversed by the Divisional Court, and the Government carried the case to the Court of Appeal. The application is opposed by the sureties, Charles Ross and John Davidson, who were sureties for Grant.

An estate of \$30,000 was left by Chas. Moore, a Toronto merchant, who died in 1875. The warehouses, 7 and 7 Wellington-street, east, which formed part of the estate, were left to Mrs. Warren, one of the testator's daughters. There is some dispute as to whether the legatee or the executors, Rev. J. P. Lewis and F. J. Stewart, should pay out of a portion of the mortgage. Charles F. Moore also claims a share of the estate. Chief Justice Armour was yesterday asked for a construction of the will.

A similar case to the foregoing was the suit of the Toronto General Trusts Company, executors of the William Irwin estate, against Richard Irwin. In this case Chief Justice Meredith yesterday decided that the executors should pay off a \$1300 mortgage on property left to the defendant.

The Senate will meet on Tuesday. A motion was made yesterday on behalf of Senator O'Donoghue, for an injunction restraining C. E. Bourne from selling some Jarvis-street property on a mortgage, which the plaintiff says is voided by lapse of time. Defence succeeded in obtaining an order of ejectment, which is not to have effect, however, until a decision has been given in the Senate's action.

Messrs. Clarke, Bowes & Hulton, barristers, have issued a writ against Sol. White of Windsor, to recover \$708.83 claimed for professional services and agency work.

WORKING GIRLS' HOME OF REST.

Island site may be Granted—Cold storage

Project—Island Matters

The request of the T.W.C.G. for a piece of land on the island at the west Point, on which will be erected building to be used as a place of rest and recuperation for working girls during the summer months was considered by the Property Committee yesterday. Mrs. Harvie, president of the guild, urged that the home was a necessity, and the committee decided to recommend that the request be granted.

The lot will be selected by the committee when it visits the island on its tour of inspection next week. The draft agreement presented by the sub-committee with the Dominion Cold Storage Co. was adopted with a rider attached, that the rates charged in Toronto should be no higher than in other cities.

Consideration of the Heber and other Island lots was postponed until after the visit next week. Inspector Ayde's report showed that during the past three months 170 licences had been issued, amounting to \$223.

It was decided to recommend the erection of two lavatories at St. Lawrence Market, at a cost of \$150. One for men and one for women. Some plan of disposing of the Alkins, Pemberton, Oeler and Sweeney houses at the Island will be adopted at the next meeting.

The estimates were sent on to the Board of Commissioners. The committee will visit the island next Wednesday.
