THE PRINCE OF NAPLES

Was Amended the Day Before the Cronstadt Feast.

SECURITY AGAINST GERMAN INVASION

Was the Object of the Military Convention as Originally Prepared.

The Document as Amended Provides That if France is Attacked Russia Will Consider the Treaty of Frankfurt Non-Existent—French Government Clinched Nothing Until After the Prince of Naples Visited Metz—The Compact is Also to Prevent the Sultan of Turkey From Making a Military Alliance With Germany—The Bank of England and Silver Bullion.

London, Sept. 16.—The Paris correspondent of The Daily News says: "I learn that the day before the Cronstadt feast, during the recent visit of M. Faure to St. Petersburg, the Franco-Russian military convention already existing was amended. Two articles and a protocol were arranged on Eastern affairs. The original convention gave France security against German invasion in return for French support of Russia in the Levant, and in certain contingencies naval assistance in the Baltic. Under the amended convention, if France should be attacked, Russia would consider the treaty of Frankfurt non-existent."

BANK OF ENGLAND AND SILVER

Will Hold One-Fifth of its Bullion in Silver if the French Bullion is Sold.

London, Sept. 16.—At the semi-annual meeting of the Bank of England to-day the Governor, Mr. Hugh C. Smith, said: "You are probably aware of the proposals laid before the Government in the summer by the United States and France, whereby this country might increase its use of silver, and thereby to the benefit of the world at large, while not affecting our gold standard, might enable the United States and France to resume free coinage. Among the proposals was one asking the bank to hold the amount of silver permissible under the act of 1841, as against its notes."

The Governor then read a letter, dated July 29, addressed to the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, as follows: "Referring to our conversation, we beg to say the bank is prepared to carry out what is laid down as permissible in the bank charter, viz., to hold one-fifth of the bullion, held against its note issue, in silver, provided always that the French mint is again open to the free coinage of silver, and that the prices at which silver is procurable and saleable are satisfactory. The Governor, in reply to questions, the Governor said that he had no negotiations with the United States, monetary commission, which he has been invited to join. "We have bought no silver. All we have done is to agree, under certain circumstances, to hold a certain amount of silver under the act of 1841."

The Weekly Statement. The Bank of England shows the following changes, as compared with the previous account: Total reserve, increased £2,234,000; circulation decreased £221,000; bullion decreased £52,129; other securities, increased £381,000; public deposits, increased £124,000; notes reserve, increased £185,000; government securities, increased £1,000,000. The Governor of England's reserve to liability, which last week was £2,000, is now £1,700,000. Discount unchanged at 2 per cent.

The letter read at the Bank of England meeting to-day excited surprisingly little comment in the city, and did not affect silver stocks. Great satisfaction, however, is expressed at the headquarters of the Bimetallist League. The Governor of the Bank of England declines to discuss the matter, saying the letter spoke for itself.

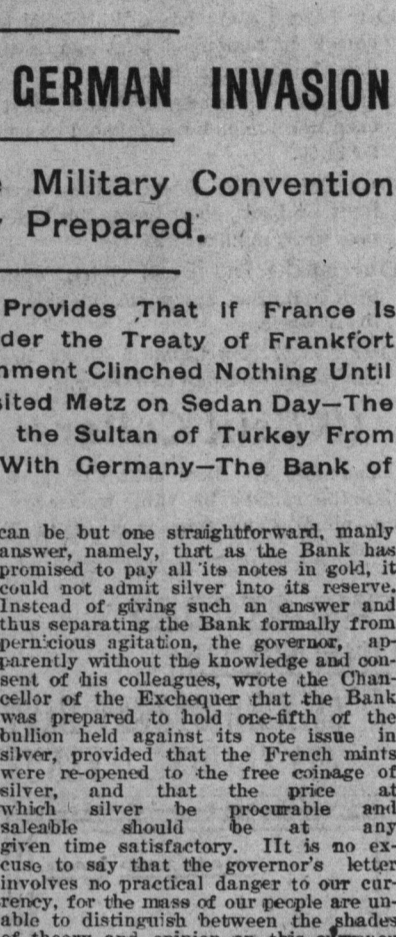
As the Gold Men see it. Manager Ross of Glyn, Mills, Currie & Company, ardent supporters of the Gold Standard Defence Association, voiced the opinion of the bankers. He said: "The letter, with such qualifications, does not pledge the bank to anything, and its only effect will be to encourage the bimetallic agitation. If the plan was carried out it might raise the price of silver temporarily, which would be followed by the reopening of the American mines, over-production, and another fall in the price of silver."

SOME STRONG COMMENTS. London Standard says the Governor's Letter is Mischiefous and Perfidious.

London, Sept. 16.—The Standard's leading editorial deals with the letter of the Governor of the Bank of England to the Chancellor of the Exchequer. A more absurd and mischievous letter has seldom been written by a man of position and high responsibility. It may be assumed that the question was put to the Governor in the name of the bimetallic agitation, for Sir Michael Hicks-Beach is neither a bimetallic nor a man of weak character. To such a request, whatever its motive, there can be but one straightforward, manly answer, namely, that as the Bank has promised to pay all its notes in gold, it could not admit silver into its reserve, instead of giving such an answer and thus separating the Bank formally from pernicious agitation, the Governor, apparently without the knowledge and consent of his colleagues, wrote the Chancellor of the Exchequer that the Bank was prepared to hold one-fifth of the bullion held against its note issue in silver, provided that the free coinage of silver, and that the prices at which silver is procurable and saleable should be at any given time satisfactory. It is no excuse to say that the Governor's letter involves no practical danger to our currency, for the mass of our people are unable to distinguish between the shades of theory and opinion on this currency question. But India has been even more converted to bimetallicism and the devotees of that transcendental cult will be slow to boast another victory.

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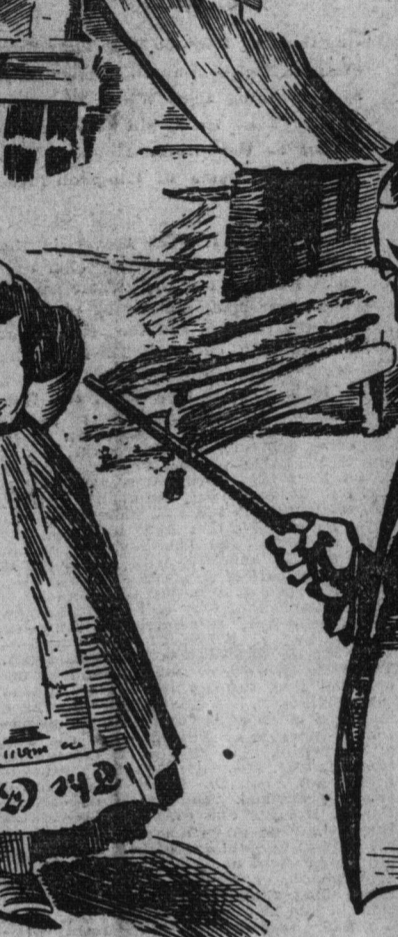
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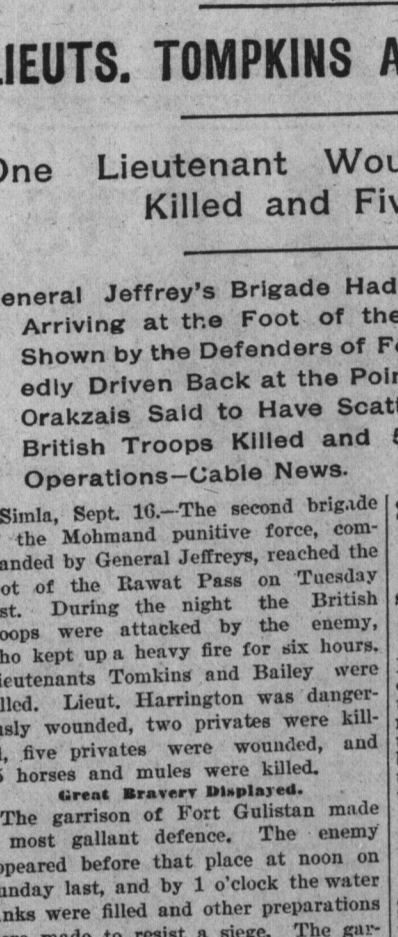
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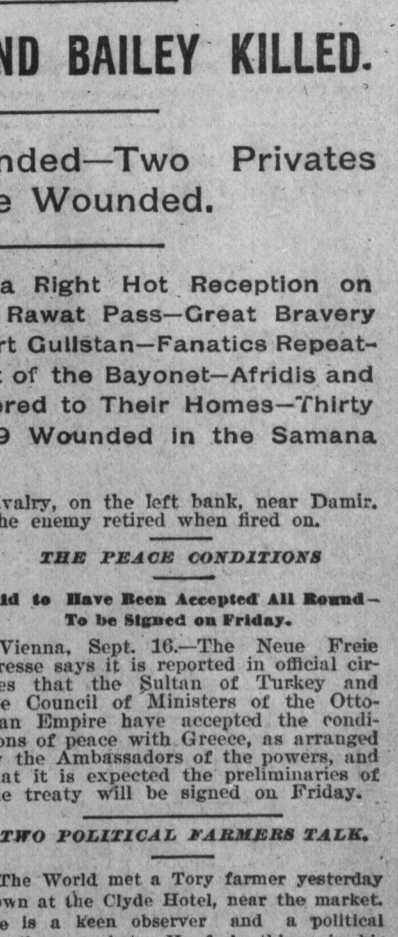

Although there are plenty of king salmon for the winter, the fish are selling at Dawson at \$10 each, one selling as high as \$60.
