The dead body of Francis B. Whittemore, the well-known cashier of the Consumers' Gas Company, was found yesterday afternoon, and a revolver clutched in the right hand told the story of another who had ended his life by shooting himself.

Set With a Gust of Gas. The Langstaff house is a semi-detached brick structure, situated just a little west of Jones-street. All the rooms are lighted by gas, and the inmates all accustomed to its use.

Mr. Burkit was awakened in about the same manner as the others, and on trying to get up fell on the floor, where he remained unconscious for several hours later he was taken seriously ill.

Bankruptcy Legislation.

New Measure in 1875.

In 1875 a new measure was substituted applicable to traders and companies, whether incorporated or not, except banks, insurance and railway companies. The measure of 1875 was amended from time to time and in 1892 was amended to include winding-up act, applying to banks, insurance and loan companies.

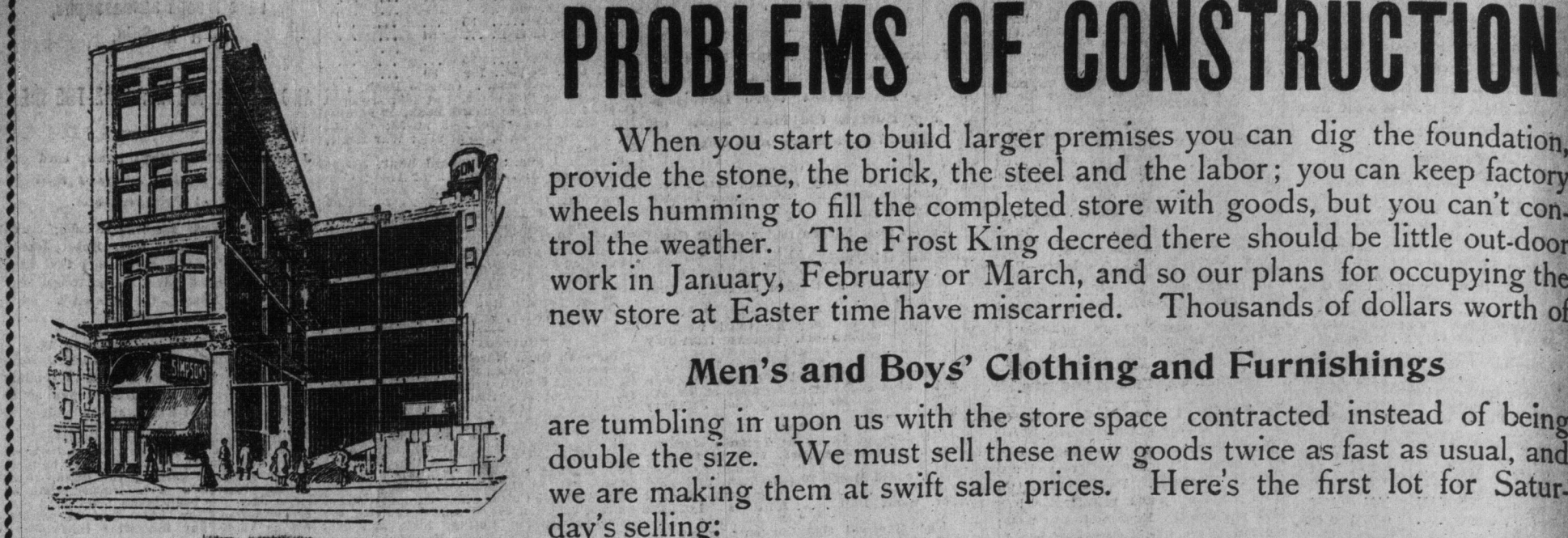
