

The schooner Antelope, manned by a large crew, and accompanied by the steam barge Gordon Jerry, went to the Augusta's assistance, and efforts were' made to unload her cargo. About 100 tons of coal were transferred to the Antelope, when the work had to be given up. Since then the weather has not permitted 'ne work to continue. Yesterday moraing three more pumps were sent up to the vessel by the Donnelly Wrecking Company, with the hope of getting the water out of her hold. The pumps, however, could not be operated, the water being too rough. The Augusta is already showing signs of going to pieces, and she may now be wrecked at any hour. Already her decks are twisted, and the oakum is all torn away from her sides.

The Blenheim Madonna.

The costilest picture in the world is owned by the Duke of Marlborough, who has a large and very expensive collection of pictures, which has come down to him from the original Duke of Marlborough. The rarest of them is the Blenheim Madonna, painted by Raphael in 1507, and now valued at \$350,000. The picture was originally painted for the Church of the Newl at Perugia. It is eight feet high, representing the Madonna and child seated on a throne, with a figure of St. John the Baptist on the left and that of St. Ni holas of Barl on the right, the last two being life size. Its high value is due to the fact that it is one of the best preserved of the pictures of Raphael which are now in existence. It has been proposed to the British Government to buy this picture. 
