FARR HAS COME BACK

Got Liberal Money to Leave Canada; Promised \$500 to Return and "Split." He Says—Jerry Collins Goes Into Fresh Details.

James Farr of Goderich, the man who took so important a part in the Holmes-Maclean by-election in West Huron that he had to skip to Detroit, took the stand at the London conspiracy trial yesterday afternoon, and said that he understood, when he came back to Canada, that he would receive \$500 from the Conservative party if he would give the whole game away. As yet he had not received the money.

Farr was very amusing in his evidence. Led by Mr. Stanton, Farr identified Pritchett as the man who taught him to switch ballots in Goderich. He could not tell to whom he gave the good ballots after the election.

The statement that was printed in the Globe shortly after the election, which was purported to be sworn to by Farr, was read over clause by clause by Mr. Johnston. The witness said that the greater part of it, dealing with his action when deputy returning officer, was true, he had not made the statement, and that he was hatched up by Jim Vance, who also got him the money to get out of the country.

In this affidavit Farr denied that he had found a ballot on the floor of the polling booth and torn it up; that he had referred to a crowd from the "back" "there is a 4-n good votes for James," or that he had gone to Goderich on a certain Friday and that he had affirmed to a crowd from the "back" that he was a deputy returning officer in that election.

Raphael MacNab, a linenman living in Brockville, testified that during the White-Conservative election, he was furnished with \$50 to buy votes. Gorman gave him the money. He was told that George Taylor, the Conservative whip, had sent letters out with money enclosed.

"Bribery on both sides" was Mr. Johnston's comment. John Stevely said he received \$20 from Reid for election expenses. He also got \$150 in envelopes from some parties, but he did not know where the money came from, how many envelopes he got, or who made up the list of doubtful voters. The money was left on his desk, that's all he knew.

"This happened two years and a half ago," said the witness as an excuse for his poor memory. "The money, like the list, must have dropped thru the chimney," remarked Mr. Stanton.

Stevley's testimony yesterday morning differed from that given in the police court, and as a reason he said, "I knew better now."

"Ben talking to someone, eh?" "Only my wife." "What you know about these matters?" "As much as I do." Collins in Box. Jerry Collins was the next witness. MINISTER AND DRUNKEN OFFICER

Did Messrs. Fielding and Clouston Conclude Some Relief Measures?

MONTREAL, Nov. 21.—(Special.)—The Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, was here for about a quarter of an hour this forenoon, on his way to Halifax, and during that time he had what is believed to be a very important interview with E. S. Clouston, the vice-president and general manager of the Bank of Montreal.

That the conference, brief though it was, had great significance, as bearing on the present financial situation, can hardly be doubted, as there was an exchange of documents and the conversation was carried on with great earnestness until about five minutes after the usual time for the starting of the I. C. R. maritime express, the train being held for the minister to finish his conversation.

Mr. Clouston drove up to the station a few minutes before the Grand Trunk train from Montreal was due, and his interview with Mr. Fielding he drove back to the bank. It is understood that the conference marked the completion of arrangements that were under discussion when Mr. Fielding was here on Monday, the minister having in the meantime had time to discuss with the premier and other members of the government the proposals then under consideration for the relief of the situation.

The Financial Situation. A prominent bank man said yesterday: "Things in Canada will begin to mend when we get over the next three weeks. In that time the grain of the west on the C.P.R. and in elevators at Port William can, a lot of it, be got to market and the proceeds distributed in Canada. Each day of marketing improves the situation on the day preceding. If we have good weather, and the harbors keep open for a few days more, we will have turned the corner, and a lot of the wheat will be ready for export by circulation. We must also be clear of all entanglements with the situation in the United States; we must get the people of the two countries, which are different in Canada from the United States.

Occasional Teachers Should Be on Salary. So Trades Council Say—Will Support an Aldermanic Candidate.

At a meeting of the Toronto District Labor Council last night at the Labor Temple, it was decided to give Wm. Worrell the endorsement of the council in his coming campaign for alderman in the first ward. He will enter this election as a trades unionist.

Mr. Odell as a delegate from the Boot and Shoe Workers' explained to the council some interesting facts concerning the union label on boots and shoes manufactured by local factories. It seems that a number of shoes sold by retailers and called by certain registered names are sometimes made in different factories. Some of these factories use the union label and others do not.

Not Murdered, Married. Sensation Exploded and Arrested Man Threatens Legal Action.

CALGARY, Alta., Nov. 21.—The great mystery surrounding the disappearance of Jacob Schneider, the Crossfield farm boy, has been cleared up, and Leonard Schan, the man held in custody six days on suspicion, has been liberated. It transpires that the murder theories were all so much nonsense. Schneider has gone to his old home in North Dakota to get married.

Anarchists in Lisbon. Popular Excitement Growing in Portuguese Capital.

LISBON, Nov. 21.—The investigation of the explosion of an internal machine here Nov. 18 when two anarchists who were manufacturing bombs were killed, and a third man arrested, has revealed the existence of a far-reaching plot against the dictatorship. Over seven hundred bombs have been seized, and the police have made eighty arrests. The machine, which exploded, was intended for use in the Sanzar Theatre here.

Place Blame on the Dead. Pembrooke, Nov. 21.—(Special.)—That Engineer Hendrie, now dead, was guilty of criminal negligence in running his light engine on the time of No. 8 (the Soo express), was the verdict of the jury to-night. Engineer Hendrie was running without orders in the wreck in which seven lives were lost a few days ago.

AN ELECTIVE COMMISSION TO MANAGE CITY SCHOOLS

To Consist of 3 Paid Members—Suggestion Made By Trustee Shaw—Inquiry Proposed Into Manual Training.

Dr. Embree's report on the high school system of Toronto was brought before the board of education last night and referred back to the legislative committee on a vote of 5 to 3, the minority being Trustees Parkinson, Dineen, Hunter, Ogden and Chairman Kent.

Dr. Ogden supported the appointment of a supervising principal, while Mr. Brown moved that the report be referred back to receive further consideration, as he would prefer, by a select committee.

Following this, on motion of Trustee Shaw, the legislative committee was requested to consider and report at their next meeting on the advisability of seeking legislation to enable the city to place the entire city school system under an elective commission consisting of not more than three salaried members, who should devote their entire time to school interests with full power of control and direction.

Miss Martin moved, that specialists in the teaching of composition in the public schools be appointed. She rather severely criticized the teaching of the higher studies in the city schools at the expense of the essentials, language and composition and the management committee will consider it.

On motion of Trustee Brown the property committee will consider the advisability of procuring the large lot to the south of Jameson-avenue College building, for the purpose of providing for increased accommodation for pupils, and the inspectors are requested to report to the board as to the number of pupils who are unable to keep up with their class mates and as to what means should be adopted to provide the individual help such pupils require.

On motion of Trustee Brown the teachers who are absent attending to examinations for the purpose of improving their standing in the profession will be allowed their salaries for time absent, providing same have received permission from the management committee or inspectors, but in future no teacher shall be allowed salary when writing for examinations unless leave has been previously granted them and reported to the board.

Two deputations were heard, one asking for increased accommodation at the Morse-street school, and the other for the change of name of the Gladstone-avenue school to Gladstone school.

THE ONE POINT TO REMEMBER

City of Toronto is to Distribute, Not to Produce, the Power.

When the controllers meet the Electric Light Company at 4 o'clock to-day they should be quite clear that what the city proposes at present is to build a plant to distribute power thru the city. The plant is not to produce power, but merely to distribute power. All the arguments, therefore, which are based on the cost of power by means of producer gas, or coal, or steam, or any other means, are wide of the mark.

Toronto is not considering the production of power, but the distribution of power. Any attempt on the part of the Toronto Electric Light Company to-day at the conference with the board of control to obscure this issue should be carefully noted by the controllers. If electric power could be produced by producer gas, or coal, or steam, or any other means, it would not pay to install a producer gas plant to relieve the peak load. But the question is one of distribution, and as the plants of the old system, the controllers will not be disposed to attach any artificial value to the argument on the cost of producing power, or the value of the old steam plant belonging to the company. It is clear that if producer gas is going to supplant Niagara power, the Toronto Electric Light Company must be very anxious to dispose of their plant to the city. But the city does not want a producing plant. The city wants a distributing plant. If the Electric Light Company's proposals include lighting at five cents per kilowatt hour, and the other terms laid down by the hydro-electric power commission, including a free gift of the very last thing needed in power, their franchise, they will be respectfully heard.

Father Captured Young Man After Chase, But Lets Him Go Again.

Fifteen-year-old Victor Hurley, daughter of Francis H. Hurley, 33 Wellesley-street, was the victim of a daring assault at the very door of her house Wednesday night.

The man who had been following got off his wheel and advanced upon the children. He seized the older girl, while the younger fled down the street.

The cries of the girl brought her father to the aid, and at his approach he assaulted the man for his wheel and, mounting, rode east, the father pursuing.

He caught the man at Amelia-street, and there held him for several minutes while a crowd collected, attracted by the cries of the father and the younger child whom the man had overtaken and knocked down in his flight.

He was finally let go after giving his name as Fred Hall, 14 Frederick-street. He said he was a telegraph messenger. A complaint was laid at the Wilson-avenue Police Station. Enquiry disclosed the fact that no such address is to be found on Frederick-street, and that no such messenger is employed by either the C.P.R. or G.N.W. Telegraph Companies.

G. T. HIREMAN BRINGS SUIT. Asks \$5000 Damages for Injuries Sustained in Collision.

BROCKVILLE, Nov. 21.—(Special.)—A G.T.R. fireman named W. Miller, has commenced a suit in the high court to recover \$5000 damages from the company for injuries received in a wreck near Brockville on Sept. 15. Miller was a fireman on one of the trains, which collided. The claim is based on the negligence of the company's employes.

George Davidson, a citizen of Prescott, aged 31 years, is to-day suffering with a broken collar bone and other internal injuries caused by falling downstairs. The doctors say he will hardly survive the shock on account of advanced age.

SHOT COW MOOSE. Game Inspector is Searching for Wm. Overland.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Nov. 21.—(Special.)—T. A. Hand, game inspector at the Soo, is looking for William Overland, supposed to have left the country and cannot be located. Overland is charged with shooting a cow moose before the opening of the season. The charge is a heavy one, as cow moose are protected this year and cannot be legally shot under any conditions. The offence was committed on Goulais Bay-road ten miles from the Soo, Township of Pennyfather. Hand heard of the matter thru those who overland had boasted of his prowess as a marksman, and visited the place Saturday. Part of the carcass and hide of a moose were seized. TWO WARTS ON HIS NOSE. Evidence of Importance Given in Famous Druce Trial.

LONDON, Nov. 21.—The Druce case, in which the prosecution intends to prove that the fifth Duke of Portland and Druce were one and the same man, was resumed to-day. Miss Mary Robinson, who was under cross examination, said that when she first met Druce, whom she afterwards knew as the Duke of Portland, in 1822, he did not have a bulbous nose, but it had two warts on it. She was severely questioned on this point, as Robert C. Caldwell of New York testified that the Duke of Portland at that time was being treated for bulbous nose.

ARREST PROMINENT BROKER. Thieves Said to Aggregate Twenty Thousand Dollars.

NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—James H. Haslam, manager and confidential man for Eddie Brown and Sanderson, bankers and brokers of Wall-street, was arrested to-day on a charge of larceny from his employers. The specific charge upon which the arrest was made was larceny of a \$500 cheque.

SEVEN MEN KILLED. Premature Explosion on Grand Trunk Pacific Railway.

KENORA, Nov. 21.—An terrible dynamite explosion on the eastern contractor works at the Grand Trunk Pacific Railroad, about 20 miles from Dryden, at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, caused the death of seven men and the more or less serious injury of four others. The accident occurred at Phillips' construction camp, No. 6, about 5 o'clock.

Presented With Loving Cup by Enlisted Men of U. S. Navy. NEW YORK, Nov. 21.—Because she is a friend of the sailor and because she gave nearly \$500,000 toward the Bluejackets Y.M.C.A. Home in Brooklyn, 6000 enlisted men of the United States navy presented Miss Helen M. Gould with a silver loving cup to-day. The presentation was made in the auditorium of the building and the 800 men present represented all war vessels now in the harbor. The men loudly cheered Mrs. Gould. Tamillo, third-class yeoman, presented the cup to her.

AIRSHIP APPROPRIATION. Hundred Thousand Dollars for Battleship of the Clouds.

BERLIN, Nov. 21.—It was announced to-day that the Imperial government will ask for a supplementary credit of 100,000 for the construction of a new airship, which Count Zeppelin has built in the greatest haste and which he has already begun to permit in the first favorable weather next summer. This amount is in addition to the \$200,000 collected in the budget of the interior department. Payment of the latter sum will depend upon results attained during the night by balloons, intended to, in part, remunerate Zeppelin for the expenditure of his private fortune on airship experiments.

SIX HOUSES BURGLAR. AYLMER, Nov. 21.—Aylmer was visited during the night by burglars, who made a complete round of the town, ransacking six houses but getting very little for their trouble and risk.

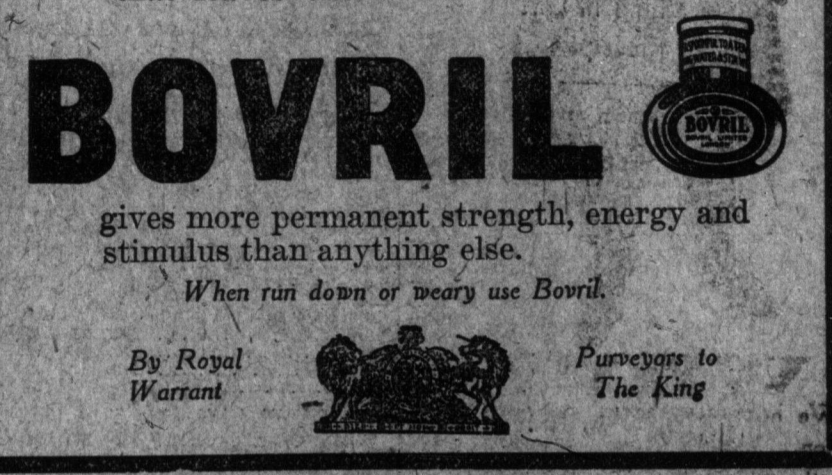

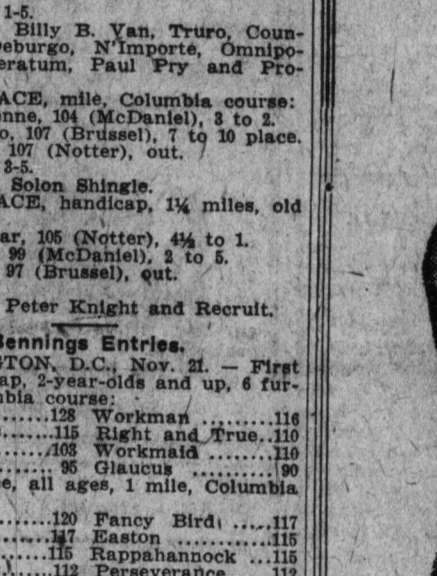

Everybody is held to the point of football, but no excuse from study. But last night probably no man could work in that sea of noise. The team is practicing desperately, and perhaps, after all, the leaders of next Sunday's work may not see quite a Waterloo chalked up for Harvard. An Exile.

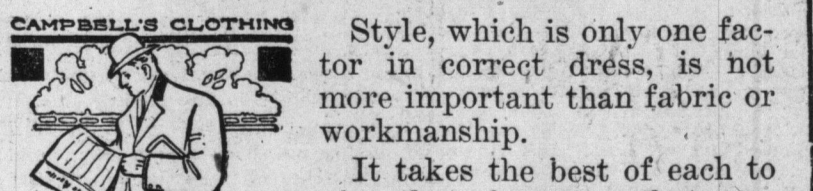

JUDGE CANNOT EXAMINE WITNESSES IN PRIVATE

Injunction to Prevent Investigation in Camera is Allowed by Chief Justice Meredith.

Chief Justice Meredith yesterday allowed the application of T. C. Robinson, K.C., for an injunction to prevent Judge Winchester from examining books and witnesses secretly in connection with the charges against Park Commissioner Chambers.

Mr. Robinson explained that the injunction was desired to restrain the defendant from subpoenaing witnesses and taking evidence or statements in camera. He added that he had three subpoenas as exhibits and that they were issued out of the county court. The judge, examining the subpoenas, ruled that Judge Winchester was not responsible for them, as they had been prepared by the city.

Mr. Robinson objected to the judge having subpoenaed Messrs. Martin and Lightfoot, and Justice Meredith remarked that it was somewhat peculiar that witnesses thus subpoenaed should not have been placed under oath.

"What difficulty would there be to summon these in the presence of the accused or his counsel?" he asked.

Mr. Robinson retorted that the content of the plaintiff was that Judge Winchester's powers were those of an arbitrator. Justice Meredith asked what Mr. Raney was doing, and the latter replied that he was not present why Judge Winchester should not be satisfied himself, instead of merely waiting for evidence to be laid before him.

"I should hardly have thought that the magistrate intended to put a high judicial functionary to the work of a detective," commented the chief justice. Mr. Raney suggested that time would be saved. Sir William returned that this consideration was not of moment in the presence of the character of a public official. He added: "The accused is entitled to see that nothing gets in to affect the judgment which the commissioner is called upon to form. I should think there should be no investigation except in the open light of day and in the presence of the accused."

TRAVELER'S SUDDEN DEATH.

R. C. Philpott Seized With Heart Failure While Driving at Galt.

GALT, Nov. 21.—(Special).—R. C. Philpott of Toronto, one of the best-known traveling salesmen in Canada, representing the Dominion Car and Foundry Co., died suddenly today near this town from heart failure. He came to Galt this morning and was driven around town by a friend, who later took him into the country for a spin. While there Mr. Philpott complained of feeling ill, and finally, expiring in the arms of his friend.

The family, who live in Toronto, were notified. Deceased was 45 years of age.

Mr. Philpott was fourth in the standing of the list of travelers at present in a newspaper competition for a trip around the world.

MUST COMPLY WITH ACT.

Railway Board Calls Attention to Necessity of Vestibules on Cars.

A circular has been addressed by the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board to the electric railway companies of the province, calling attention to the requirements of the Railway Act with regard to the provision for vestibules for motormen, and requiring that accounts be reported to the board. The board has approved the appointment by the Ottawa Electric Railway of J. E. Hutchinson, Robert Ingram and George W. Lang as examiners of motormen.

WINNIPEG, Nov. 20.—(Special).—A spectacular fire took place to-night when the Rat Portage Lumber Company's east and door factory, Frost & Wood's three-story warehouse, and Dyson's pickle factory were completely destroyed.

The fire started in the Frost & Wood three-story frame warehouse, which was soon destroyed.

There was a heavy wind at the time, and the Rat Portage Lumber Company's factory soon caught and the firemen could do nothing but try to contain it. A report will be had from Property Commissioner Harris.

VALUING OF ILLINOIS.

Assessment of \$1,338,622,398, an Increase of Ten Per Cent.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Nov. 20.—The total equalized assessment of personal property, lands and lots for the year 1907 aggregates \$1,338,622,398, according to reports by committees of the state board of equalization, which were adopted this afternoon.

This year's figures show an increase of \$122,987,726, or almost 10 per cent. over the aggregate assessment on these three classes of property last year, when the total was \$1,015,634,672.

No change was made by the board of equalization in the assessed value of personal property and of lots. The total reduction by the board in the value of real estate is \$101,648.
