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

DIRECTORS' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1883.

The prominence given during the year to the affairs of the Dispensary through the press, and the facts then elicted concerning its prudential and medical management, render a report from the Board almost superflous. But as Subscribers and friends expect a formal statement of proceedings and the expenditure of the means they bestow for carrying on the work entrusted to them, the Directors beg to submit herewith the important and interesting reports of the Medical Staff, together with that of Dr. Dodge ; the financial statement of the Honorary Treasurer, and offer the following remarks in their own behalf. The work of the Dispensary in its several departments has been as satisfactory as hitherto, and also more extensive, while under the good Providence of God means sufficent so far, to meet all its requirements, including the additional outlay, for another physician in the North District, have been received. This last measure was undertaken in faith, and almost immediately

voted for the doctor (\$100) for the year. Having paid off the mortgage at the close of 1882, the Board felt they would be justified in making some necessary renovations and repairs to the premises, lest by deferring longer much heavier disbursements would be entailed for such purposes. Commencing at the Morgue and basement, the whole building was thoroughly cleansed, whitened and color washed, painted, etc. The "local habitation" being thus improved, it was in keeping that "a name" should follow, therefore one of "the signs of the times" appears in neat gilt letters over the door, and notices of the hours for patients and doctors on either side.

The directors issued six thousand circulars just before hospital Sunday, requesting individual inspection as well as liberal contributions, and they anticipated that a liberal response would be made to so urgent an invitation in both respects. As to the funds the result of that appeal to the Christian public attending the various churches in the city and vicinity, was a gratifying

The returns in these churches where special appeals were made (a church at the south end for instance) afford proof of the value of this mode of bringing the objects and needs of this Public Charity before the people. The private subscriptions obtained by the efforts of the sub-committes were not only greater in amount, but quite a number of new names appear on the Annual list. In this eonnection the Board regret that a prominent National Society have not favored them with their customary annual donation of \$40. The Board applied to several charitable societies for similar assistance and are very thankful to the North British Society for \$40 granted for 1883.

On the subject of mal-nutrition common amongst the sick poor, the suggestion of the medical board last year was used as

A PLEA FOR SPECIAL AID.

The Assocation for aiding the Poor (city) acted upon the communication of the Directors by kindly transmitting \$30, with an assurance of further help. The season being late this fund was only partially used, the balance being reserved to be expended this winter. The Medical Board have asked for a convenient portable mode of conveyance direct to the City Hospital for the wounded in sudden accidents, or other disabled patients. An ambulance is therefore required. Perhaps some generous friend will provide, or assist in procuring this useful appliance. In addition to gradually increasing demands for City poor, the medical staff has for some time past extended medical aid to Indians. Though this interesting class of unfortunates does not strictly have a claim upon the Dispensary under its specific arrangements, yet

impel us to relieve them, and they have therefore never been denied. The directors intend applying to the Indian Department of the Dominion for a small subsidy, so that medical aid may be continued to them, and preliminary steps have been taken in that behalf, The services of the second Visiting Physician at the North end will be continand the vacancy caused by the retirement of Dr. D. A. Campbell has been filled up. Of Dr. Campbell's long and faithful labors for eight years, the Board desire to express their hearty appreciation, wishing him much success in his future practice, and appointing him a member of the Honoary Consulting Board. No special donotion of \$100 has come to hand this sesson for the new district, but doubtless some considerate Christian will devise a way to raise it for this purpose. When

as this year (vide subscription list) others may well follow their example.

In order to afford definite information regarding the Constitution, standing, objects, membership and regulations of the Dispensary, the Directors revised and caused to be appended to the last Annual Report the corporate principles, bye-laws, etc., of the Institution. A large number of copies were futu than espe to I Eye anyo

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were distributed, and the Secretary has a few on hand for future applicants. The Directors close this report with thankful acknowledgements to all friends and co-operators, especially the Clergy and the Press, for special favors; also to Dr. Dodge, who continues his excellent services in the Eye and Ear Department, without fee or reward. And lest anyone should forget it, they repeat

THEIR HOSPITAL SUNDAY INVITATION :

"The directors invite and earnestly request all friends of the Institution to call at the Dispensary any day (except Sunday) between 12 and 1 o'clock, when the daily throng of applicants may be seen, and daily entries made in Visiting Physicians' books inspected. Examination of the work done will show that this indispansable Chority is well fulfiling its Heavyn-borne mission to the Sick Poor of the City and viciniy and in Dartmouth, in a far more extended and efficient manner than was probably contemplated by its founders; and that even a temporary suspension of its work would be a public calamity."

The statistics show an increase in the number of applications over that of the previous year. This is no doubt largely due to the division of the north district, which seemed to bring with it an increased number of new applicants for relief. Acute dysentery and diarrhea prevailed during the summer months in the north districts, but not to the same extent as as in the south and central districts during the summer of 1882, nor were the cases so fatal. Light epidemics of measles and mumps have also prevailed during the year, while in the western suburbs scarlet fever was prevalent and in the north suburbs typhoid fever. In the report of last year reference was made to the complaints arising from applicants giving wrong addresses. We again wish to direct your attention to the suggestions made at the time, viz : — That printed cards be handed to each applicant or his

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messenger stating that: (1) Patients able to come to the Dispensary will not be treated by physicians of the out-door department. (2) Application must be made each day before one p.m., at the Dispensary, and not at the residence of the doctor. (3) In cases of emergency the prescription of the nearest or any doctor will be dispensed. (4) If the doctor has not attended before six p.m., renew the application, as the wrong address has probably been given. The suggession made in previous reports that a basis of co-operation be established between the visiting physicians and the various charitable societies was responded to only by the City Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, whose managers kindly placed at the disposal of the Dispensary the sum of thirty dollars and a promise of more if needed. Of this sum a portion only was expended, but this carried comfort and joy to several families who were found destitute as well as sick.

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EYE AND EAR DEPARTMENT.

To the Board of Directors of the Halifax Dispensary:

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GENTLEMEN,—During the past year ending Dec 31st, 175 patients have been under my care; 130 of the eye, and 45 of the ear. In the previous year there were 176 in a period of 13 months, the time embraced by the report of that year.

The great majority of these were cured, some were improved, and a few received no benefit from treatment. As the advantages of the Dispensary become better known the proportion which the latter class bears to the first is smaller each year. The average length of attendance on the part of each patient becomes less also, from the fact that recent or acute cases require less time than those which are chronic. There are two classes of people who should be better informed as to the objects of the Dispensary. Those who are really poor need have no hesitation in applying for treatment, any who are of this class should not allow foolish pride to stand in the way. But any who can afford to pay need not apply.

The attendance has been very regular, as a rule, and I have rarely had any reason to find fault with any of the patients. Although the year's service involved a good deal of labor, it affords me much satisfaction to know that the services rendered have been generally appreciated.

Of the incurable cases two only are really blind; one of them, a sailor from the country, received no treatment. He was unfortunately at sea when prompt and vigorous treatment would have arrested his disease and preserved his sight; but when I saw him no remedies could possibly benefit him. The other was sent by a lady who has on former occasions given substantial proof of her interest in the institution. He had a progressive disease of his eyes (atrophy of both optic nerves), which rendered him nearly blind when he came to see me, and I gave him a very unfavorable opinion. His case is complicated, with an affection of the nervous system that, I am satisfied, will ultimately render him still more helpless than he is now from the loss of his sight. Wishing to let him see that I was willing to do all I could for him, I treated him daily for some time at my office, as it was difficult for him to find his way to the Dispensary. Finding no improvement after three or four weeks' attendance, I told him it was useless to continue. With the assistance of some of his countrymen, as well as other friends, he went to Boston for six or eight weeks, but returned unimproved.

As usual, there is a large number of suppurative diseases of the ear. If more attention was given to this organ during the progress of measles and scarlet fever, the number of persons afflicted with discharge of matter from the ear would be largely reduced.

One little patient, whose eye was seriously injured, required to have the eye-ball removed. A little boy, who is deaf and dumb, had cataract in both eyes, complicated with a large amount of atrophy of both optic nerves. I removed the cataracts, and, though the unfortunate condition of the optic nerves interferes seriously with his sight, yet he promises to have considerable vision. A little child was operated upon for strabismus (squint). Two cases were operated upon for iridectomy, or artificial pupil, and five for obstruction of the tear duct, besides minor operations.

It affords me much pleasure to testify to the satisfactory manner in which Mrs. Webber discharges her duty in connection with the Dispensary.
